Jeff is still able to play cricket and part of the reason for the family arranging a cricket match was to raise awareness that opportunities for young dementia sufferers to partake in physical activity are extremely limited. Along with other dementia sufferers who attend the café the event was attended by many of the volunteers from the café, lots of local residents and the families and friends of the players. The money raised from a raffle, auctions, a cake stall, a barbeque and donations from the players and spectators, will help CVSU to continue to provide selfless and much needed care and assistance to local dementia sufferers in the future. The organisers are hoping to make this an annual event and Birchanger Cricket Club, who will be celebrating its 125th anniversary in 2020, would be more than happy to play hosts again.



Investing in Our Children Now for their Future

Our latest advertiser, Dynamic Counselling, talks about an important issue

When it comes to getting the best education we can for our children, we are all on board. We know it makes sense to invest now, so we can give them the best possible start in life. However, when it comes to investing in the emotional and psychological wellbeing of our children it seems that we are less convinced. Yet investing in one, but not the other, does seem somewhat counter-intuitive. A well-educated young person without emotional stability will never be able to make the most of the educational advantages you have afforded them.

Children can struggle with fear and worry just as we do, although often don't have the capacity to convey this clearly or, at times, at all. Some appear to have already developed strategies to cope, and appear to weather it well, but others are overcome by intense anxiety. This has a knock-on effect on their cognitive, emotional and social development, even if it can't always be 'seen.'

Why might a child experience such anxiety? Between birth and six years-old, the brain grows faster than at any other time in life. At the same time, a child is absorbing, and trying to make sense of, a vast amount of external information - people, places and the dynamics around them, things that are still 'unknown'

and unexperienced. The problem can be that a child's ability to cope with anxiety and worry hasn't yet been properly honed, leading to the emergence of defence mechanisms. Added to which, a child doesn't usually begin to express thoughts and feelings until they are three years old, and commonly will only do so with some coherence around the age of eight. This is why children and young people may act out, either through a 'temper tantrum' or else simply by becoming withdrawn and lost, as a result of repressing or displacing their worries and concerns.

Unsurprisingly, this can all feel rather overwhelming, not just for the child but also for the wider family unit. Reaching children earlier rather than later can reduce tension in the family dynamic in the short term and give the child a better frame of reference in the longer term, facilitating a more fulfilling life and allowing them to make the very most out of their valuable education.



Stop Stansted Expansion has condemned Stansted Airport for orchestrating a 'Project Fear' campaign aimed at pressurising Uttlesford District Council (UDC) to grant final approval for its 2018 planning application for growth to 43 million passengers per annum.

In recent weeks various local and regional business leaders have issued press releases accusing UDC of causing economic damage to the region and costing jobs as a result of the council's decision to re-examine the 2018 planning application. It is abundantly clear from the content of these press releases that they are based on briefing material provided by Stansted Airport.

"The suggestion that the Council's decision to review the latest airport planning application is damaging the local economy and putting thousands of jobs at risk is preposterous", said SSE Deputy Chairman Brian Ross. Stansted handled 28 million passengers last year and has permission for 35 million. Stansted's own assessment is that it won't reach 35 million for at least four years. If Stansted wanted to introduce flights to China, India or anywhere else on the planet, there is plenty of headroom to do so in the existing planning consent. Neither UDC nor SSE is standing in the way.

Moreover, the contribution of Stansted to the regional economy is highly questionable. Ryanair accounts for four out of every five Stansted passengers and its primary function is to provide cheap leisure flights abroad for UK residents. Stansted caters for more than twice as many UK tourists travelling abroad compared to the number of foreign tourists coming into the UK – and most of these incoming foreign tourists are destined for London. Stansted's main employment impact is therefore to provide jobs for hotel, catering and leisure workers in places such as Tenerife and Torremolinos, rather than in the East of England region.

Birchanger Primary School

By the time that you read this the children at our school will have settled in to the new term. We have welcomed 15 new children to Dragonfly class. These are our youngest children and it is wonderful to have them as part of our school. Every child in this class has a buddy. Buddies come from Year 6 and they support younger children at lunch time and break times and form friendships that last the whole year. The way that our children support each other is a strength of our school and is often commented upon by parents and visitors to our school.

The children within our school have a range of roles and responsibilities which broaden the life of the school and prepare them for later life. As a church school we have a worship



committee and all of our Year 5 children are members of the Friendship Squad. Year 6 have a wide range of roles from Head Boy and Head Girl through to learning ambassadors, librarians, IT ambassadors and House Captains.



All of the children are encouraged to take a part in our school and part of this is to stand for election as a member of our school council. .In order to select the candidates for this year's council we held a 'school election' recently. As we are at the start of the year the children in our youngest class did not vote this time, however they will hold their own election when they have settled into the school. The election started in assembly where Miss Marshall Spence talked to the children about democracy and British Values and she described the voting which adults take part in to elect their MP. Later that day the children stood up in front of their class in the school hall and read out a prepared speech explaining why they felt that they would be good at the role. Each child then had the opportunity to vote in a secret ballot to choose their councillor.

Autumn brings a new season of activity to Birchanger Wood with our group of volunteers beginning coppicing trees. Coppice rotation is a sustainable method of woodland management that opens the woodland floor to sunlight, provides products such as firewood and wood for craftsmen and extends the life of a tree.

Jono Forgham, a science educator and conservationist who writes a regular column in the Bishop's Stortford Independent, staged several interesting, lively, hands-on activities in the wood over the summer months. Bug hunts and moth nights involving people of all ages, including some very enthusiastic children, have helped us assess what is living in the wood and the diversity of our insect life.

Insects are crucial to the food chain and maintaining the woodland ecosystem, but in high numbers they can represent a threat. The spring saw many of our trees blighted by the November moth caterpillar, which munched through the canopy. It's probable that the caterpillar infestation was worsened by a warmer and earlier spring, which meant there were fewer hatchling birds to eat them. The trees appear to have dealt with the problem with some later leaf growth. We observed that in areas where trees had been coppiced, the level of bird predation of the caterpillar increased and there was less tree damage. This underlines the importance of our work in managing the balance of woodland flora and fauna.

Nature is always striving towards a balance and it's likely that the November moth will not pose such a challenge next spring, with predators such as birds and wasps taking better advantage of increased caterpillar abundance. The long-term challenge in Birchanger Wood is dealing with climate change and disease. Last year's drought put enormous stress on trees, leading to significant losses across our countryside and encouraging disease. Ash trees are succumbing to chalara ash dieback across Europe, a fungal disease that researchers led by Oxford University estimate will cost the UK a total of £15 billion – half of which will be over the next decade. Indeed, the Trust managing Birchanger Wood has had to set aside a considerable contingency to manage the disease, which means we are always looking for any funds to support woodland management.

Chalara is not the only disease. The oak processionary moth, whose caterpillars strip oaks of their leaves, is expanding its range and this summer it was identified just a few miles away; it seems inevitable it will reach us. Attacks by the oak processionary moth caterpillars make them vulnerable to diseases, such as sudden oak death – a fungal disease that can affect many other trees and shrubs, from bay to sweet chestnut. All the more reason to keep up our programme of bug hunts and moth nights as well as our active conservation management.

Birchanger Wood Trust is always on the lookout for volunteers to join in the woodland management. We meet up every Saturday morning at the compound next to the water tower on Heath Row, Bishop's Stortford. You can also support the trust by buying our firewood, which has been properly seasoned in our new wood stores. Look out for any future events on our website: www.birchangerwoodtrust.org.
