Speed Watch was out and about for the first time checking vehicle speeds at the corner of Birchanger Lane and Harrisons. No speeders found on this day as drivers were behaving themselves. Over a period of an hour, around 30 vehicles were checked and a maximum speed of 33 mph was recorded.



The speed checks started at 10.00 am and finished at 11.00 am, which was not the best time for a high volume of cars but was perfect to get acquainted with the equipment.

Birchanger Speed Watch has 8 volunteers from the village who have been trained by Essex Highways in the use of the radar speed gun and road safety. Be warned, anyone caught speeding through the village will be reported to the police for further action.

#### Still Time to Register Your Child for Primary School

As a parent you may not know that there is a deadline to register your child for primary school for the coming term in September 2020. If you do not do this you are unlikely to get the primary school of your choice, even then, there are no absolute guarantees. If you have yet to register you can still do so on line at the Essex County Council website by the January 15th deadline. You should hear which school your child has been allocated to by April 11th.

#### New School Hours Lead to Dangerously Full Buses

We are all encouraged to use the bus these days, but there are now times in the day when our buses are dangerously full. Add to the fact that every bus which goes through Birchanger seems to be well past its sell by date and you have an accident just waiting to happen. One of the worst times happens around three pm. School hours at some schools have apparently changed with schools closing earlier which means that buses used by shoppers are now dangerously overcrowded. There is no control at all on the numbers boarding the bus and the situation now is potentially catastrophic. Parents need to be aware of this as do shoppers while those in charge of school transport and those who run the bus service schedules need to learn that one bus at this time is woefully inadequate for the numbers who need to use it. Something must be done urgently to remedy this potentially dangerous situation before it is too late. Long gaps in the day time service timetables simply make the situation worse.

#### Protecting yourself online doesn't have to be complicated or expensive

Online threat is constantly evolving, but there are hassle-free ways you can protect yourself without costing you time and money. Below are our 5 Top Tips for a safer online experience.

- 1. Devices this is a very important first line of defence. You don't need to spend a fortune as there are a number of free, award-winning antiviruses (AV) software for PC, Mac, Android and iPhone. Neighbourhood Watch has linked up with Avast software and you can download their software by searching in your browser for 'Avast free antivirus.
- 2. Ensure your computer and phone software is always upto-date. Software updates often include security patches which are important for keeping your devices safe.
- 3. Use different passwords across your accounts so if one account is compromised, the rest are still secure. Use pass phrases that include a mix of symbols, numbers and characters to make it easier to remember, for example, B0bLov3sFootb@11.
- Change default passwords shipped with new devices. This
  is a relatively easy but effective way to improve the
  security of your internet-connected gadgets and home
  routers.
- Get a password manager to help manage all your passwords and keep them secure. That way, you can choose hard passwords without having to remember them.



#### More rain needed to prevent drought in 2020!

Above average rainfall in September and October has signalled a good start to the recharge season with the wet weather increasing moisture content of the soil, making it more likely for future rainfall to filter down into the aquifer. However, even with the recent above average rainfall, the total rainfall received over the last three years has been below average, and groundwater levels are still low.

The wet weather throughout October, which was 131% of the long-term average, means we are heading in the right direction, but above average rainfall will need to be sustained for the rest of the winter for the situation to continue to improve. If levels fail to recover, we will need to introduce temporary water restrictions (previously known as hosepipe bans) in spring 2020.

#### Restaurant Review - Pub at Audley End

Until recently I had just passed this pub thousands of times, but had never actually been in. It is a well-known landmark for those foresaking the M 11 on their journey northwards towards Cambridge. It is also a cheaper parking venue for those on the daily commute from Audley End Station. Car parking is ample, children seem welcome and there is a large pool table which was well used at the time of our visit. Beer was well looked after and very much appreciated by the gentlemen in our party.

The menu looks good, with most of the dishes purporting to be homemade. However, not everything seemed that way. Halloumi was a delicious starter, the batter on the main course fish and chips was incredibly pale and the gorgonzola lasagne certainly different but had not been roasted and the pasta entirely boiled. Not as had been expected. However, the restaurant redeemed itself with the best pub made homemade ice cream we had ever tasted. # Birchanger **Primary** School



### Happy New Year from Birchanger C of E Primary School

We have had another busy term at our school and by the time that you read this all of the children, staff, governors and volunteers will be enjoying a well-earned rest.

Our topic for the autumn term was called 'Boom!' and it brought together learning across the curriculum. The second half of the term focused on music and the development of the children's skills in this important art form. All of the children have music lessons in the classroom and we use the Essex based Charanga programme to help the children broaden their knowledge through the year. The school has also funded ukulele lessons for our Year 4 and 5 children where these children have learned to play a number of popular songs together. We are also fortunate to benefit from the skills of church organist Ann who visits our school every Thursday morning to play the piano and teach us new songs in assembly. Ann has also developed a choir which includes children from Year 2 – Year 6 who sing when we hold our church services.



At the end of November we welcomed a number of musicians to our assemblies These visitors gave up their time to share their talent and inspire the children from school.

Over the course of a week we heard from a guitarist who played the electric and acoustic guitar,

a clarinettist and an opera singer. The children really enjoyed hearing them play and since their visits we have been inundated with requests from children who are keen to learn a musical instrument.

Currently we offer one to one music lessons on the guitar, piano and violin and we are looking forward to watching the numbers of our musicians grow.

Each year group has their own set of skills for music that they need to develop through their learning and most years need to develop their ability to perform a piece of music with increasing confidence. In KS2 this term the children performed for family and supporters. We were treated to some of the songs that the children will sing at the O2 when they join many other schools to sing together in one of London's iconic venues. During the concerts we also heard lots of children perform, using a range of instruments and we decided that without doubt 'Birchanger's Got Talent!' The collection after the shows raised nearly £400 which was put towards a trip to London to see the West End show School of Rock to provide the children with a wonderful opportunity to watch others of their own age perform professionally.

# NEW RESEARCH SHOWS NO SAFE LIMIT FOR AIR POLLUTION



New research published in the British Medical Journal last month has shown that airborne emissions of fine carbon particles – known as PM<sub>2.5</sub> – can have serious health impacts even when the level of concentration is below the World Health Organisation's guideline limits.

Particulates in aviation fuel cause premature death,

asthma, lung & heart disease, and cancer.

 $PM_{2.5}$  emanates from fuel combustion and transport sources and is one of the major issues associated with airport expansion, not only because of the additional air pollution caused by the increased flights but also from the additional road traffic generated by the increase in passengers.

The results of the research confirm previously established associations between PM<sub>2.5</sub> and respiratory and cardiovascular diseases, as well as Parkinson's and diabetes. In addition, the study found evidence of health impacts not previously associated with PM<sub>2.5</sub> including septicaemia, fluid and electrolyte disorders, as well as urinary and skin infections.

Stansted Airport is already a major source of PM<sub>2.5</sub> air pollution and, in connection with its current planning application to increase its permitted annual throughput from 35 to 43 million passengers, the airport was required to provide a report on the projected pollution levels. This report showed that if its current planning application were to be approved, the airport would be responsible for putting 13.6 tonnes of fine carbon particles (PM<sub>2.5</sub>) into the air annually, 25% more pollution than today.



SSE Health Advisor, Professor Jangu Banatvala, commented "The paramount duty of Uttlesford District Council is to do everything possible to safeguard the health of its local residents. That includes protecting the air that we all have to breathe. In view of this new

research it is inconceivable that our local council could permit any further airport expansion until such time as this can be achieved without increasing the risks to the health of the local population." *Brian Ross*

#### The Hundred Parishes Society

The logo of the Hundred Parishes Society includes birds and trees surrounding a church spire. This tranquil scene, a wood engraving by Eric Ravilious, captures the sights and sounds of the countryside, hinting at church bells, wind in the treetops and bird song.

During a wintry walk as you scan the horizon you may spy a variety of birds. Mixed flocks of noisy corvids, especially rooks and jackdaws, deftly execute their aerial acrobatics in blustery conditions. The larger ravens are increasing in number and you may hear their gurgling croaks which carry far on the wind.



Mature circle-soaring buzzards are patrolling their territories. Hovering kestrels are searching for food. You may also see a red kite with a forked tail and wingspan of nearly 6 feet (1.8 metres).



As a tractor cuts furrows in the damp ground, the corvids are frequently joined by noisy groups of gulls eager to feast on worms and other soil invertebrates.

Farmers do what they can to discourage unwelcome flocks of vegetarian woodpigeons as they attack their precious crops.



Mixed parties of tits keep in touch as they flit among branches searching for insect food. Robins sing and a mistle thrush may proclaim his presence from a lofty perch. In a sunny sheltered spot, starlings whistle merrily.



As you walk, a snap of a twig or the squelch of your boot in the wet mud reveals your presence and a startled pheasant or blackbird may sound an urgent alarm call.



All too often, the background noise of vehicles, sirens and aircraft can intrude, but it is still possible to find locations where the natural sounds take centre stage.
