## SSE Urge Council Not To Jump the Gun!

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) is urging Uttlesford District Council (UDC) to await the final outcome of SSE's High Court challenge as well as the publication of the Government's new aviation policy – both expected at any time, before making a decision on the current Stansted Airport planning application.

Uttlesford planning officers have been pressing their councillors to decide the controversial planning application as soon as possible and have set a timetable which could mean that councillors would be forced to vote at a special meeting of the Planning Committee scheduled for Friday 24<sup>th</sup> January. For more than a year officers have been recommending that councillors should approve the airport planning application.

The central issue in SSE's legal challenge is whether the current airport planning application should be decided locally or nationally. The case was heard in the High Court in mid-November and the judge's decision is expected at any time. SSE says that it would be illogical, and potentially give rise to substantial and unnecessary legal costs, if UDC were to attempt to determine the planning application locally before the final outcome of these High Court proceedings clarifies the legal position.

Also imminently expected is the new Aviation White Paper setting out the Government's long term policy for the future development of UK airports and the wider aviation industry. This will be only the third Aviation White Paper since 1985 and it will define the Government's updated approach towards controlling aircraft noise, air pollution and carbon emissions. All of these matters are highly relevant to the consideration of the current airport planning application.

SSE Chairman Peter Sanders commented: "It is fully appreciated that enormous pressure is being put upon our local council by the airport and various lobbyists to decide the current planning application. We would however urge the council not to be swayed by this pressure, or by any sweeteners offered by Stansted Issue 205

Airport. It is common sense that the Planning Committee should await the decision of the High Court and also the new Aviation White Paper, both of which are imminently expected."

Mr Sanders concluded: "There is no rush to settle this matter. Stansted has plenty of headroom for growth under its existing planning permission and the fact is that passenger numbers have been in decline for the past six months. This is a time for calm reflection, not a potentially costly, hasty decision."

### Local Plan Rejected by Inspectors

The Inspectors hearing the latest version of Uttlesford District Council's Local Plan apparently did not like it one little bit. In fact they have asked the District Council to withdraw the current version and go back to the drawing board - damning indeed! The changes the inspectors are seeking are so extensive that a completely new plan is the only sensible solution.

This may sound like good news for some but is it? If a major re-think on the new settlements is required, this will take some time. In the meantime, the houses which the government dictates the council must provide sites for will have to be built somewhere until the so called new garden communities are up and running, if indeed they ever are.

In the meantime, the council has to attempt to meet government imposed building requirements. In the absence of an up to date plan, everywhere in the district is vulnerable and the council may be tempted to go for a quick fix. This would mean a free for all for developers to make an easy case for their own sprawling developments anywhere in the district. Even if the council refused these applications, the developers would very likely succeed on appeal due to the council failing to meet the housing targets. It could give rise to areas of inappropriate development anywhere in Uttlesford. Birchanger is entirely inside the green belt and should be safe. However, nothing is forever certain. Rochford's Nursery outside Stansted was green belt and that was developed into the Forest Hall Estate!

Countryside and Rights of Way Monthly News has a new on-line E-news monthly publication from the HC Countryside and Rights of Way department.

Herts CC and East Herts are currently drafting a 'Cycle Corridor Study' running up from the Lea Valley via Harlow, and Bishop's Stortford into Stansted Airport'. This is a very detailed survey and is full of interesting possibilities.

Stansted Mountfitchet is in Essex and the latest Essex/Uttlesford Cycling Strategy Document 2018, does not identify any 'flagship route' for Stansted Mountfitchet, although it does state that with the right infrastructure provision and incentives from employers in and around the airport, the share of cycling by employees could grow significantly. There is also a new college at Stansted Airport situated on Round Coppice Road which would benefit!

accounts you have and which accounts contain the most money. When you speak to them, their accent may be Scottish, Irish or any other European nation.

When talking about your bank account, they seem to know all about your accounts. To cover any suspicions you may have they talk about unusual activity, payments sent to unusual destinations, the number of bank accounts you have and with whom.

Banks will never ask for your account details. If the caller asks for your account details or pin number, simply hang up and assume its a scam. If you want to check about the call wait a few minutes and call your bank using the telephone number you know is legitimate.

A new trick the scammers use is to enlist your confidence by saying they are from the staff investigations unit at your particular branch. Cash is going missing from the branch and they believe your account is involved. They would like your help to investigate this. The only thing they are investigating is just how to get hold of your money. Have none of it and hang up.

The Mountbatten serves up curries which are not always to be found in other restaurants. Its spacious surroundings make the meal more of an occasion. On this visit, the food (when it came) was as good as ever but the time it took to come was totally unacceptable. Takeaway diners were in and out collecting meals with hardly any wait while the increasingly hungry in-house diners looked on, becoming increasingly disgruntled. After all there are only so many poppadums you can eat, even if they are accompanied by delicious chutneys, yoghurt sauces and the like.

It seems that the Mountbatten needs to choose a way forward. Focus on takeaways, or look after the in-house diners. If they want to continue to do both they need to find more staff, even if this means training up more local people to cover the very obvious lack of restaurant staff. In a multi-cultural society what is wrong with that? If they do not change their ways, perhaps the decision will be made for them by their customers. In the end, an attractive and popular restaurant may become a victim of the takeaway trade.

### Celebrating 25 Years of Essex County Neighbourhood Watch

### Losing Weight Without Dieting?

We have started the New Year with lots of enthusiasm for the learning and challenges ahead. Our topic for this term is 'Best of British' and during this topic we shall develop skills in English, geography, history and art.

During the first week back at school we invited Linda Morris, a local potter, to join us. Linda's work reflects the history of pottery that we have in our country. During their learning this term, the children are going to find out more about local and national potters and the style of work that they produce. During the day that Linda was with us she presented some of her work in assembly. The children also had the opportunity to hold pieces of pottery that used different techniques. Linda also showed us some of her work and the children asked her questions about being a potter.



Once the assembly was over Linda had time in each of our five classes work with the to children. She supported them to make a class fossil pot and to contribute to one large school pot. The technique that Linda used was simple and involved rolling clay corrugated over cardboard and rolling it up. This turned a normal piece of clay into a clay ammonite

which were placed together by the children and are now going through the drying and firing stages at Linda's studio.

The children really enjoyed the experience and they made comments like, "I liked getting messy", "I absolutely LOVED doing pottery and I hope that we could do it again" and they said "Thank you for helping us to make pottery Linda and we hope that you come back". 

Protecting native woodlands is regarded as crucial in the fight against climate change. Our community is very fortunate to have ancient woodland on its doorstep, Birchanger Wood. The trust that manages the wood was originally set up to end encroachment by housing and preserve it as "green lungs" in an area dominated by the M11 motorway and an international airport.

The wood can only be properly managed with the help of volunteers and support from the community. Over recent months, residents have bought our seasoned firewood,



while the Stort Valley Rotary Club and the Premier Court Care Home in Thorley have kindly donated funds to help support the maintenance and improvement of the woodland.

Yet, nothing could happen without the involvement of our team of volunteers, led by our warden Pat Forrest (Pictured left), a man whose name well suits his lifelong commitment to envi-

ronmental conservation at Birchanger Wood.

Every Saturday during the coppice season, Pat and his team are active in coppicing trees. Coppicing is a traditional method of woodland management which exploits the capacity of many species of trees to put out new shoots from their stump or roots if cut down.



In a coppiced wood, which is called a copse, young tree stems are repeatedly cut down to near ground level, resulting in a stool. This is a sustainable way of managing trees, which regrow and provide the firewood that funds our operations. However, we are always in need of more volunteers for the team and would warmly welcome people who are prepared to be hands-on. If you are interested in conservation and would like to volunteer, even for just an hour or two on a Saturday, please go to the compound next to the water tower on Heath Row in Bishop's Stortford.



Meanwhile, local ecologist and science educator Jono Forgham has been documenting all the species in the wood. He is calling for community involvement in a year-long study of the wood and its natural history by recording the tree species, birds, mammals, insects, arachnids, plants and fungi. He will be visiting two to three times a week with moth trap nights on a weekly basis and would like anyone who is interested, no matter their experience, to join him.

### **The Hundred Parishes Society**

It is easy to take for granted the helpful signposts to be found at many of our road junctions, yet they are part of our culture and heritage. Early road signs were erected by cycling and then motoring organisations as ordinary people began to enjoy the freedom afforded by ownership of a bicycle or motor car. Standards for signage on main roads were redefined in the 1960s to satisfy faster traffic and night visibility. Fingerposts that indicate direction and distance from rural junctions are frequently much older and can merit further investigation.



Fingerposts, with arms pointing in several directions, are white with black lettering, and generally made of wood or iron. Many local examples, some almost 100 years old, were made of iron in Essex at Maldon Iron Works. The

manufacturer's name is now usually obscured by many layers of paint.

Personal favourites include the fingerpost at Matching Green indicating the mileage to London – precisely 26<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> - and one north of High Roding that points to Takeley Station which closed 60 years ago.



On the B1039 between Chrishall and Great Chishill, a finger points to a non-existent 'Great Chishall'. A Henham sign shows the way to the pub, Ugley Chequers. This and all other signposts were removed for the duration of WWII lest they should aid the enemy.





Some signs at T-junctions have information on the back, albeit hidden from view. Usually this is the same as the visible side, but not always: the southerly finger of one on the B1051

in Broxted points to Broxted and Bps Stortford, but the back reveals that it has been recycled and once pointed to Wimbish Green.

As you travel along the lanes, please take time for a second look at our humble, ancient fingerposts.

Whatever gift or skill you have, this time of giving up and giving is regarded as a period of spiritual preparation to grow closer to God. So what will you do this lent?


A prayer for Lent
