Annual Parish Council Report - By Angie Driscoll

The public annual Birchanger Parish Council meeting was held at Last December we were lucky enough to the village church hall on Wednesday 18th March. Below is an abridged copy of my report for the year 2019/2020

Traveller update

The travellers arrived in July 2018 and an enforcement notice was served to them almost 16 months ago in November 2018 but the travellers appealed against this. The process for the appeal as I understand it is that an Inspector is appointed and a letter issued to all parties. This letter was received by UDC on February 24th this year. It also had to be decided whether the appeal should be made as a public enquiry or a hearing. The travellers requested a three day public enquiry but this appears to have been rejected and it is to be a one day hearing. The proposed date for this hearing is June 3rd but so far we have not been given an address for the venue.

New traffic light junction replacing roundabout

We were originally expecting the removal of the roundabout on the A120 to start last summer. However, the work was only put out to tender in the autumn of 2019 and it is reported that all tenders have been rejected due to high costs, so work is yet to start. We have been assured that mitigating measures will be taken to avoid Birchanger Lane becoming a worse rat run than it already is but so far we have no details.

Potholes

Over the last couple of years it has been difficult to miss the number of potholes on Birchanger Lane which have got bigger and deeper. These, of course have been reported on numerous occasions and over time, the number of road defects, which includes potholes, have increased from 59 in 2017 to 104 in February this year. The good news is that we've been informed that the potholes are to be repaired between March and June this year. Don't hold your breath though as bad weather and the coronavirus could hold this up!

Village Safety

The Parish Council often receives complaints about speeding traffic through the village. Last September another traffic survey was undertaken by Essex Highways but, yet again, Birchanger Lane did not meet the criteria for a 20 mph speed limit or the installation of VAS (vehicle activated signs). However, as the Parish Council have sufficient funds, Highways are validating the installation of wig-wags, which are signs that flash during school drop off and pick up times. We are also hoping to get 20 mph advisory signs put up. We hope that these measures will slow the traffic particularly around the school.

We also now have our own Community Speedwatch Group. Members of the group have received training on how to use the speed gun and have had several sessions on the lane checking vehicles speed. Whilst they can't actually issue speeding tickets a register is kept and sent to the police who follow up with any speeding drivers.

get our own Community Special Constable - Martin Hall. Martin has had

many years' experience as a Police Special and he is often seen (sometimes not) patrolling Birchanger, helping to keep our village safe. (By the way, he can and will issue speeding tickets, resulting in hefty fines).

Planning Applications

There are many villages near us that have countless numbers of planning applications for large numbers of houses to be built. Fortunately here in Birchanger we are surrounded by green belt and so far this has protected us. However, last year an application was made for 8 houses to be built on the edge of Birchanger, on green belt land presently occupied by two derelict barns. The Parish Council agrees with the District Council in that the green belt must be preserved, so we have of course objected. The application has now been amended to 6 houses but no decision has yet been made by Uttlesford Planning Department.

Other Business

No doubt our Council tax will increase again this year. However, I'm very pleased to report that as the Parish Council has sufficient funds, we are able to cut our precept this year by around 45%. Whether we are able to do this again next year depends of course on our expenditure but we thought it right to ask for less whilst we were in a position to do so.

Last but by no means least, I must thank Keith Williams, our parish clerk, and all the Parish Councillors for the time they devote to our village and the support they all give to me.

Re-launched Dementia Activity Group in Dunmow

People living with dementia can now benefit from a weekly Activity Group in Dunmow run by Essex charity Action for Family Carers. Over 50 people in the area already attend similar groups mixing with others and participating in a variety of mentally and physically stimulating activities ranging from seated exercise, indoor bowling, reminiscence discussions and games, often including music.

Action for Family Carers has taken over management of the groups which were previously run by the Alzheimer's Society. The Groups are led by a small team of professional and caring staff and a large number of dedicated local volunteers. Morning sessions, called Keeping Active, focus on physical activity and afternoon sessions, called Active Minds, focus on activities to stimulate the mind.

Physical activity is an important part of a healthy lifestyle and can help overall wellbeing. It can give opportunities to spend time with others, reducing isolation and loneliness and support people to continue being independent. Cognitive stimulation involves activities and exercises that stimulate thinking, concentration, communication and memory in the person with dementia. It involves talking about day-to-day interests, reminiscence and information relating to the current time and place.

Speaking about the Activity Groups, Action for Family Carers' CEO, James Clarke said "We are delighted to be supporting people living with dementia in West Essex".

The Activity Group takes place in the Dourdan Pavilion, Dunmow on Mondays from 10.00 am to 12.30pm and 1.00 to 3.30pm. New members are welcome. The sessions are £18 each with a free taster session available. Call Clare Savva on 07851 249707 or email clare.savva@affc.org.uk.





When seeking help, turn to Frontline

Love it or loathe it, the Internet has become integral to our daily lives. However, it's not always easy or straightforward to navigate through hundreds of websites to find just what we're looking for. It's particularly true when matters of health and wellbeing are at stake. Say, for instance, you're a carer looking for some form of support, or you have a loved one with dementia. Where can you turn to find information that is trustworthy, reliable and up-to-date?

This is where Frontline comes in. A digital service pioneered by Citizens Advice and supported by Essex County Council and the West Essex Clinical Commissioning Group (NHS) it enables anyone - the public or professionals - to find sources of help and advice in their local community.

Frontline is a veritable treasure trove of information. It's simple-touse and invaluable when it comes to finding out what's available locally and who can provide genuine assistance. For example, you may want to find out what support there is for someone who's housebound, suffering from depression, needs to exercise or is disabled. Simply enter what sort of help you're looking for or search under the following categories: Advice; Family; Older People; Mental Health; Disability; Addiction; Transport and Wellbeing.

Often surprising, it's well worth browsing through the entire Frontline library to discover just how many services are listed and the range of help that is available locally (there are 196 services currently!) Each includes a full description, contact details and details on how it is delivered. What's more, it's often possible to self-refer rather than having to go through a GP.

Frontline also offers access to detailed fact sheets such as Local Transport Options, How to Complain if you're not happy with a local health provider, Planning Ahead for Later Life, to name just three. Not everyone has internet access, of course. So if help is needed to find a local service, Healthwatch Essex is available from 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday (0300 500 1895 - calls charged at local rate).

Frontline is continuously expanding as both the public and professionals discover the many advantages of this easy, one-stop access to support and advice in the local community.

Plan ways to care for those who might be at greater risk of serious complications.

Choose a room in your home that can be used to separate sick household members from those who are healthy.

Learn how to self-isolate. Guidance can be found on the NHS website: https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/selfisolation-advice/

Create a list of local organisations that you and your neighbours can contact in the event that one of you needs access to information, healthcare services, support, or resources. Consider including organisations that provide mental health or counselling services, food, and other supplies.

Create an emergency contact list of family, friends, neighbours, healthcare providers, teachers, employers, the local public health department, and other community resources.

Learn about the emergency operations plan at your child's school or childcare facility, and your employer's emergency operations plan.

Practice everyday preventive actions including regular hand washing. The NHS provides guidance on how to wash hands: https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/healthy-body/best-way-to-wash-yourhands/.

The World Health Organisation provides guidance on basic protective measures:

Reach out to your neighbours who may be self-isolating through illness or age. You can help in a number of ways. For example you could exchange telephone numbers and phone them for a chat. You could also exchange email addresses or let them know about the social media that you use.

You could pick up their medication and collect their shopping, taking care of course to adhere to hand washing guidelines and avoiding direct contact. A person's recovery from illness can often be helped with social contact and the knowledge that others care.

When helping neighbours, especially the aged and those at risk, please remind them to be vigilant of scammers! There are always opportunists who will take advantage of unwary and vulnerable people. Make sure they do not give out their bank cards or PIN numbers to anyone, including seemingly helpful people on the phone. Scammers and fraudsters will always be on the lookout for ways to coerce and manipulate our most vulnerable residents.

Coronavirus Scam Alert

Cyber criminals are using concerns about the coronavirus to launch phishing attacks

Learn to identify and protect yourself against such attacks



While COVID-19, or the novel coronavirus, is capturing attention around the world, cyber criminals are capitalizing on the public's desire to learn more about the outbreak. There are reports of phishing scams that attempt to steal personal

information or to infect devices with malware, and adverts that peddle false information or scam products.

What Should You Do?

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- If you are looking for information on the coronavirus, visit known reputable websites like the World Health Organization.
- Be on the lookout for phishing emails, which may appear to come from a trusted source. Remember, you can look at the sender's details - specifically the part of the email address after the '@' symbol - in the 'From' line to see if it looks legitimate.
- Although social media companies like Facebook are cracking down on adverts spreading coronavirus conspiracies and fake cures, some ads may make it past their review process. Remember, it's best to seek information on the disease from official sources like the World Health Organisation, NHS sites, or Public Health England.
 - Finally, to protect your devices against malware like the types that can come from a phishing attack, ensure that you have installed virus protection on your devices and ensure it is regularly updated. Peter Sampson

Money saving tips from SSE

The price to pay for cheap flights from Stansted Airport is that passengers get fleeced from the moment they arrive at the airport until the moment they board their plane. So, if you're brave enough to disregard the current health risks and you are booked on a flight from Stansted, here are a few money-saving tips:

Buy your holiday currency beforehand

A survey carried out at major UK airports in February found that Stansted gave by far the worst exchange rate for converting UK pounds into euros. The Stansted Bureau de Change was giving just €395 for £500, whereas on the same day, you could get €565 at Luton Airport and €576 from your local Tesco store – a staggering £181 more. Foreign currency can also be bought at other local supermarkets, banks and Post Offices and so the message is to shop around beforehand. Don't wait until you get to the airport.

Passenger drop-off rip-off

Since MAG acquired Stansted from BAA, annual car parking earnings have soared from £27 million to £91 million in the space of just six years. Stansted's car parking revenues now exceed Gatwick's and are the highest for any UK airport except Heathrow.

On 27th February Stansted increased its passenger drop-off charge by $\pounds 1.00$ for the second time in less than a year. It now stands at $\pounds 5.00$, making Stansted the UK's most expensive airport for dropping off passengers. Neither Heathrow nor Gatwick makes any drop-off charge.

Residents discount scheme

Although it is not widely advertised, Birchanger residents (and other local villages and towns) can avoid the drop-off rip-off by registering for the local residents discount scheme. The scheme provides a reduced charge of only 60p for those living within a 5-mile radius of Stansted Airport and a £1.00 charge for those living within a 10-mile radius. Airport eating and shopping

It's not a good idea to arrive at the airport hungry because everything from a burger to a cup of coffee can cost up to twice as much as in the equivalent restaurant, bar or coffee shop in Bishops Stortford. And, before you splash out on so-called 'duty free' spirits or perfume, consider what the same products cost in your local High Street or supermarket. You'll find that bargains are few and far between. *Brian Ross*

The Hundred Parishes Society

One of the delights of a woodland walk on a sunny April day is the sweet scent wafting from the massed flowers of the English bluebell. One of our best-loved wildflowers, with half of the world's population found in the UK, it is typically associated with ancient woodlands but can also occur at the base of long-established hedgerows.



The narrow glossy leaves and flower spikes are produced from deeply rooted bulbs supported by specialised symbiotic fungi. The flowers are a deep violet-blue, but sometimes white or pink spikes occur. The flowers are narrow, tubular-bell shaped, with tips that curl backwards, and the pollen is cream-coloured. They are arranged on one side of a drooping stem. After pollination by honeybees and other insects many green capsules form which will hold large numbers of ripe black seeds. The seeds are shaken from the capsules by breezes or by animals running through the woods.

The introduced and invasive Spanish bluebell has broader leaves. Its pale blue, unscented flowers are arranged all around the upright stem and are more open revealing blue pollen. Encouragingly, recent research has found that the native species has a genetic advantage due to the sheer weight of numbers and greater fertility and so should continue to thrive.



Apart from the woods in Birchanger, locations where it is possible to see carpets of bluebells include the Hertfordshire Way as it passes through Sidehill Wood, Mill Wood in Much Hadham and Howe Wood in Littlebury beside Strethall Road as it crosses over the M11
