Urgent Action Needed to Defend Our Village Boundary

A potentially very threatening planning application has been submitted by Birchanger Hall Farms for the conversion of the barn on the sand track behind Harrisons to two semi-detached houses.

This is Green Belt land and lies outside the village development limits. If approved, it could become the thin edge of the wedge, leading to further housing development along the length of the sand track. It's also important to remember that the same applicant submitted a development proposal four years ago for extensive new house building on the farmland between the sand track and Birchanger Wood. Fortunately, that proposal was rejected.

The current proposal seeks to circumvent the normal planning application rules and Green Belt regulations by describing the proposal as just a "change of use" of the building from agricultural to residential. However, the actual plans suggest that the proposal is not as simple as that. Follow this link for further details:

In order to defend the village boundary and the Green Belt, the current proposal needs to be rejected because it might otherwise open the door to further encroachment. It is vital that objections are submitted to Uttlesford District Council by as many local residents as possible. Objections should be submitted by email by 3rd May to planning@uttlesford.gov.uk. Your email needn't be lengthy or technical. Simply set out in a few sentences the main reasons why you consider the proposals should be rejected.

Travellers Update

The Planning Inspectorate (PINS) have been in dialogue with the appellant's agent and are now adamant that they are going for written representation route.

The Council does not dispute the traveller's status of the families and is of the opinion that this doesn't need to be tested verbally at a hearing, the PINS agree. They offered a date of 14/4 for final comments. The Council has nothing to add to its already submitted statement, the site is Metropolitan Green Belt and therefore unsuitable for this use.

The PINS will next offer a date for a site visit, possibly indicating that it will be an accompanied site visit (i.e., just UDC officers, possibly just myself). I would consider that the site visit should occur over the remainder of April. The decision of such matters usually takes 6/8 weeks following the site visit.

I personally visited the site on Thursday 1/4 and noted that four statics had been brought onto the site. The tourers which the statics are said to be replacing remain in the site. Firstly, although the statics are large, and probably arrived on low-loaders they do fall within the definition of caravan. As the statics are clearly to replace the tourers there is a need to decant from one to the other. I have been told that the tourers will leave the site shortly. The hard coring at the time of visiting had only been used around the entrance.

It is a fact that any changes to the site including the swapping of caravans and the treating of the surface, does require approval under the terms of the injunction from the High Court. Obviously, the Court has not been operating fully during the pandemic and, as such, some minor changes including the swapping of two vans and the treating of the surface were verbally approved. It is clear that they have exceeded this agreement and, as such, I will be taking legal advice on where this takes us. Obviously, we do need to consider on the timetable of any enforcing of the injunction alongside the now more timely consideration of the appeal.

As expected from discussions on site on Thursday (Maundy Thursday), many travellers have gone travelling for the Easter period. They are likely to return (which they can) during the next few weeks. I intend to revisit the site within the next fortnight. Obviously, residents will see more activities as families return from travelling.

All Change - From SSE to SAW

After 19 years of campaigning, SSE intends to pass the baton to a new organisation, Stansted Airport Watch (SAW) at its Annual General Meeting next month.



SSE Chairman, Peter Sanders, explained as follows: "Regardless of the outcome of the recent Public Inquiry, it is very unlikely that Stansted will apply for any further increase in its capacity for many years to come and so it's questionable whether 'Stop Stansted Expansion' continues to be an appropriate name for our campaign."

As a result of Covid-19, Stansted's current planning cap of 35 million annual passengers is not expected to be reached within the next decade and permission to expand to 43 million annual passengers — i.e., the issue at stake at the Public Inquiry — may never be needed."

Rather than having to oppose expansion proposals, the need in future will be to ensure that the airport's authorised operations cause as little harm as possible.

In the 12 months to 31 March, Stansted handled just 3 million passengers compared to 28 million in 2019, before air travel was decimated by the pandemic.

There is also growing recognition that aviation growth will need to be constrained if the UK is to meet its climate change targets.

A further reason for the new organisation is to help bring about a changing of the guard within SSE. Most of the current members of the SSE committee have been in place since SSE was established in 2002. The current lull in the airport's activities is a good opportunity to bring in new blood who will need to gain experience of dealing with the key issues.

Peter Sanders concluded: "SSE has notched up some considerable successes since it was established in 2002 but now is exactly the right time to refocus and rejuvenate the campaign for the longer term. I have no doubt that Stansted Airport Watch will be every bit as effective as SSE and, as its name implies, will be ever-vigilant in seeking to minimise the negative impacts of the airport."

FORGOTTEN GARDENS OF EASTON LODGE

This time last year, the Gardens were closed to volunteers until further notice, but this year we are now catching up on lost work over the winter and looking forward to the completion of the restoration of the balustrade in time for our Open Day on 23 May.

In April, the daffodils have been a glorious sight in the Glade but also where they have sprung up uninvited in lots of other corners of the Gardens. When they have finished flowering, some will have to be moved to better places and to make way for a new path in the lime wood. However, we are confident that after dividing and moving them, they will come back much stronger next year.

At our open day in May, the Italian Garden will be the star of the show, closely followed by the restored balustrade which finally provides a proper surround to the first waterlilies of the season. The lupins will be in full bloom in the outer borders and the helianthemums will be ablaze along the inner borders.



We will also be celebrating the Countess and her animals — we often mention her monkeys to visitors, explaining how one caused a major fire at Easton Lodge in 1918. The Hundred Parishes Society

Many of us wait anxiously for the outcome of the recent public inquiry into a possible increase in the passenger cap at Stansted Airport, yet the local community's love-hate relationship with Stansted Airport is only the latest in a series of significant aviation events that have occurred within the Hundred Parishes.

In a field at Standon Green End in the parish of Thundridge, a monument marks the spot where Italian balloonist Vincenzo Lunardi landed in 1784 after completing the first manned flight in England. He took off from London beneath a balloon filled with hydrogen.

In 1913, Bentfield Hucks was the first Englishman to loop-the-loop in his Bleriot aeroplane. He was born in 1884 in Bentfield Cottage, Stansted Mountfitchet and thus acquired his unusual forename.



Duxford airfield, now the site of Imperial War Museum, Duxford, first became operational in World War I. Some of its buildings, constructed by German prisoners-of-war, still stand. In 1938, Duxford was the first airfield to take delivery of Spitfire fighter planes. Frank Whittle flew regularly from here while he was developing ideas that eventually led to the invention of the turbojet engine just before the end of WWII.

Altogether, twelve military airfields operated within the Hundred Parishes during WWII. Andrewsfield, straddling the parish boundary between The Salings and Stebbing, was the first American-built base in Europe, becoming operational in 1943. Stansted was another American-built airfield. Thousands of Americans were based in this area; many never saw home again.
