High Court Success - But What About The Future Of Our Green Belt?

In a landmark decision for Birchanger residents, the High Court has overturned the planning approval granted by Uttlesford District Council (UDC) for the conversion of the barn on the sand track behind Harrisons into two semi-detached houses. The Judge also ordered UDC to pay all the legal costs incurred by Harrisons Residents Association (HRA), amounting to just over £4,700!

This follows a five-month battle by Birchanger residents which was not simply about opposing the building of two houses. There were two important principles at stake, namely, to maintain the long-established village development limits and to prevent development on the Green Belt around Birchanger. There was concern that two houses could just have been the thin end of the wedge.

02 June 2021 - UDC ignores objections, grants planning approval

06 June 2021 - HRA formally notifies UDC of intended legal action

12 July 2021 - HRA files High Court application for Judicial Review


06 Sep 2021 — High Court quashes approval, awards costs to HRA

The importance of this legal victory over UDC and the landowner cannot be under-estimated, especially at a time when UDC is looking for suitable sites to build almost 1,000 new houses a year for the next 15 years.

Developers Circling Birchanger

UDC is currently working on a new local plan which will identify sites to meet the housing and other needs of the district over the next 15 years. As part of the preparatory work, earlier this year the Council invited

landowners, developers and others to submit sites for consideration. The results, published at the end of July, show that a total of 299 sites, all across Uttlesford, have been submitted for consideration. The list includes 11 potential sites covering almost every piece of agricultural land around Birchanger, as shown in the shaded area on the following map.



This may not be surprising because, as we all know, Birchanger is a great place to live, but it is potentially worrying for those who want to maintain the rural character of the village.

At this stage, no decisions have been taken as to which sites to include in the local plan because the sites are still being assessed. A draft local plan, which will include the proposed sites for housing development, is expected to be published for consultation in March 2022.

If it then transpires that Birchanger is threatened with major new housing development either to the north, south, east, or west, our most important protection will be the fact that almost all the land around Birchanger is designated Green Belt. (Continued on Page 5)


Unsung Heroes at the Club

They are targeting not only bargain break style holidays, but also new targets, such as major events and even scam you on the new Global Health Insurance Card which replaces the old EU Health Card. The new Global Health Card is free but unlike its predecessor the new card can be used for health treatment worldwide. Use the following link to apply for a card: https://www.gov.uk/global-health-insurance-card If you unwittingly order a fake card from the scammers, they will happily sell you a new card, which of course is never going to arrive. These fake card websites are popping up everywhere.

Winter is Coming Time to Join the Big Energy Switch

This scheme gives all Essex residents a chance to reduce their energy bills by participating in the Essex-run Energy Auction, where all the major companies bid on behalf of those who join the scheme. Participants in the last Energy Auction saved an average £150 per household. The scheme is run through Essex County Council. All intending participants need to do is to log on to the Essex Switch Campaign, with a copy of their last energy bill, download the communications tool kit and follow the instructions. The more people who register for the scheme the lower the gas and electricity cost will be for every participant. If you join the scheme, you will receive an offer after November 23, but it is just an offer. No need to accept it. Should you decide to switch from your current supplier, this is easy. Even I could do it! Remember the choice to switch is yours, if you do not like the offer you don't have to switch.


Hare Coursing Happens on Fields Near Here

Controversial Helicopter Landing at the Club Field



A helicopter landed at the clubs' sports ground around midday on Friday 10th where a party of six disembarked for Hallingbury Manor and later to a garden party in Bishop's Stortford. The following day, around the same time, the helicopter returned to pick up the passengers for their homeward trip.

The club was approached by Atlas Helicopters Ltd, providers of business helicopter flights and private helicopter charter in the UK. Club committee member Ross Leavers, who happens to work for the Civil Aviation Authority, was asked to liaise with Atlas and discuss their requirements. After some in depth discussion, the club decided as a one-off exception, to allow the landing in exchange for a much-needed donation for the club which has suffered financially during the lockdown. Ross underlined the fact that this would by no means be a regular occurrence and was a single event. Even so, a number of complaints were voiced on the Birchanger Facebook Page, especially from residents who have been complaining to Stansted Airport for years about the noise from helicopters flying low over, or close to the village. Others, however, saw the landing as an exciting and entertaining event.

Sarah Mathews, on behalf of the club, stated "Unfortunately we were not aware of previous discussions with Stansted Airport regarding helicopters flying over the village. We received the request and agreed to it. Perhaps in hindsight this was not the correct decision. There is no connection with the operator to the club. Many members have seen this as an exciting event, and this was wholly the intention. We now appreciate that not everyone saw this as an exciting event and that there are split opinions within the community. There are no plans to repeat this, and the club certainly had no desire to upset anyone. The company was checked thoroughly, and all licenses and insurance were in order. They are a reputable and highly regarded company, had they not been the landing would not have been entertained. The committee continually strive to do their best for the club, but we are only human and apologise for any upset this decision has caused.

The Augusta 109 Helicopter picked up guests from Leeds for the



one-hour trip to Birchanger and was reported to have been chartered by a well-known former rugby league player who played for Hull Kingston Rovers, Leeds Rugby, and Great Britain.

Birchanger's Green Belt

Birchanger village is nestled amidst significant development all around, separated by the Green Belt. The residential areas of Bishop's Stortford are just 600 metres to the south and southwest, and the residential areas of Stansted Mountfitchet are just 800 metres to the north. Stansted Airport lies 500 metres to the East and the M11 motorway runs between Birchanger Parish and the Airport perimeter.

For these reasons, the Green Belt around Birchanger is of exceptional importance as a safeguard against convergence with Stansted Mountfitchet and Bishop's Stortford, as a vital recreational asset for the community and as a buffer to protect the distinct identity of Birchanger village, which has existed for a millennium or more and is recorded as an established settlement in the Domesday Book of 1086.

The purpose of the Green Belt is to prevent urban sprawl and prevent towns and villages merging into one another by keeping land permanently open. These are particularly important issues for the Green Belt around Birchanger. However, planning permission for development on the Green Belt can still be given in exceptional circumstances, for example, where the local authority (in this case, UDC) can demonstrate that it has fully examined all other reasonable options for meeting its identified need for development.

To summarise, Birchanger needs to be "on full alert" for the next 12 months or so, and ready to defend the village development limits and Green Belt if a threat of major development emerges.

The recent High Court success sends an important signal to UDC and others that Birchanger residents are prepared to take whatever steps are necessary to defend the village development limits and our Green Belt.

It's All Slow Ahead in Birchanger

Action Needed on Night Flights



Earlier this month, SAW sent the Department for Transport (DfT) a detailed submission in response to a consultation on the future arrangements for night flights at Stansted Airport.

The DfT wants to continue to allow Stansted 13,700 nights flights a year (an average of 37 per night) for another four years. By contrast, SAW is calling for night flights to be phased out, starting next year, and eliminated by 2030, except for emergencies.

Stansted is presently allowed more than twice as many night flights as Heathrow and the DfT defines "night" as just the $6\frac{1}{2}$ hours from 11.30pm to 6.00am. The normal definition of night, endorsed by the World Health Organisation, is the 8 hours from 11.00pm to 7.00am. SAW has called upon the DfT to adopt this definition and impose restrictions accordingly. SAW has also called for a ban on aircraft using reverse thrust when landing at night.

Sleep deprivation arising from aircraft noise at night causes fatigue and higher levels of stress and anxiety with evidence indicating that those living in the vicinity of airports have a higher risk of cardiovascular disease. There is also evidence that sleep deprivation caused by aircraft noise has an adverse effect on the cognitive development of schoolchildren who live in the vicinity of airports with night flights.

SAW's noise adviser Martin Peachey commented: "We are told that night flights are essential to provide economic benefits for the UK but many of these are holiday charter flights to Spain, Portugal, Greece etc. It's far from clear that these night flights benefit the UK economy and it's even less clear why they can't operate by day. We should start by phasing these out."

As well as the health impacts, there is also an economic cost of night flights. Sleep disturbance reduces the efficiency of people at work and many local residents have jobs which are of vital importance to UK society and the economy.

FORGOTTEN GARDENS OF

EASTON LODGE

We have started preparations for our last Sunday Open-Day of the season, on 17th October, but this year with the prospect of continuing to welcome visitors on Thursdays until the end of November.



After such an unusual growing year, it is a relief to see the Gardens close to their best at this time of year. The Italian Garden is still full of colour, setting off the pale honey colour of the fresh stone in the restored balustrade. The dahlias, in their

border in the walled kitchen garden, are covered in flowers. The bees and butterflies love them, particularly the orange and yellow decorative dahlia called Pooh. Did you know dahlias arrived in Europe (Spain) from Mexico in the late 18th century? There are 14 classes of dahlias, we have examples of many of them, and managed to win the pompom class at the Countess of Warwick show with our stunning 'Lady Linda'. 'Pooh' came second in its class.



The October Open-day in the last few years has been a lovely day, often with warm sunshine (unlike this summer!). This year, on the 17th October, we will have an array of pumpkins and squashes and our jam and jelly tombola. Our archivists will feature Peto's Japanese gardening legacy and we will showcase the work our volunteers are doing to extend the Japanese style area at the bottom of the Glade. Some of the Acers there and elsewhere in the Gardens may be taking on their autumn colours. There will be a range of stalls – a good chance to stock up on bulbs for the spring! Our volunteers will provide refreshments, hot and cold drinks, savoury rolls, and homemade cakes.




The Hundred Parishes Society

Recently, climate change has brought examples of extreme weather all over the world. Part of the solution to global warming is to use natural energy. Our ancestors harnessed the power of water by means of water mills, thought to have been invented by the Greeks. The Domesday Book of 1086 AD recorded no less than 5,624 watermills in England alone. Most were used to grind wheat. They continued as a prime source of energy until the Industrial Revolution.

The Hundred Parishes has a wealth of these mills, many retained through their conversion into private homes. Several may be seen on Hundred Parishes walks whose descriptions can be freely downloaded from www.hundredparishes.org.

On the River Cam, Hinxton once had three water mills. One remains, a 17th-century mill built on the site of on older one mentioned in Domesday as worth 8 shillings. It ceased to operate commercially in 1955 but now works again on days when it is open to the public – the final opening in 2021 is on October 3rd from 2:30pm to 5pm. It can be seen at any time from the outside – and is on our walk number 14.



Linton's watermill on the River Granta dates from the early 18th century and there has been a mill on the site since the 13th century. It stopped working in 1972 and has now been converted into apartments. Walk 109 passes it.



Weatherboarded 18th-century Kings Mill in Littlebury was originally powered by the River Cam and then steam until it stopped working in 1924. Walk number 165, only 1.4 miles, passes Kings



Mill during a short exploration of historic Littlebury. What remains of Great Bardfield watermill can be seen on walks 103 and 104, while the remains of Tilty watermill are on walk 120.

In 2013 the church was visited by members of the Bat Conservation Trust (BCT) who, after conducting investigations, found evidence of Pipistrelle bats living in the church. Subsequently, there have been occasions when these small creatures have been seen flying around inside the church. Sadly, we have over the last few months, found five dead bats in the church and there are concerns that environmental changes are adversely affecting the colony. The deaths have been reported to the BCT for investigation.

A reminder that our churchyard remains open for burials. Please note that only people who, just prior to their death, lived in the village, or those whose names appear on the church electoral roll and who have a close relationship with St Mary's, are entitled to be interred there. If there is a family connection to an existing plot, then sometimes it is possible for ashes to be included.
