Travellers Win Appeal

Travellers – Where Next?

The short answer is that, as matters stand, the Travellers aren't going anywhere! Following a ruling by a Government Planning Inspector, the Travellers have been granted permission for permanent residence on the site at the end of Birchanger Lane, where they have been for more than three years. The Travellers won their case despite the site being designated Green Belt and despite having unlawfully moved onto the site in July 2018 without residential planning permission.

In reaching his decision, the Planning Inspector attached significant importance to the fact that this was Green Belt and, as such, development could only be approved in exceptional circumstances. However, he concluded that, in this case, there were very special circumstances. The Inspector pointed out that Uttlesford District Council ('UDC') had not fulfilled its duty to maintain an up-to-date assessment of the need for sites for Gypsies and Travellers, and failed to show that it had made adequate provision.

UDC has a legal duty to identify and update annually a supply of suitable, affordable sites for Gypsies and Travellers. However, UDC has not assessed or reviewed the need for such sites since 2017 and did not provide the Inspector with any evidence to indicate that there were any suitable alternative sites in the area. Accordingly, he concluded that: "Eviction from this site would necessitate a return to a largely roadside existence." The Inspector is required by law to treat the best interests of the children as "a primary consideration". That is what ultimately persuaded him to grant planning permission.

UDC is entitled to appeal but, to date, seems reluctant to do so, despite pressure from our two local councillors and many local residents who believe there is scope to appeal, at least to seek a variation of the conditions imposed by the Inspector. For example, the Inspector has granted permanent permission but circumstances may change in the future which could enable a restoration of the Green Belt.

Protection of the Green Belt is a central issue in this case, particularly at a time when developers are encircling Birchanger with speculative housing proposals. A shortlist of potential sites is expected to be published next March.

A Public Meeting for Birchanger residents has been arranged for Friday 5^{th} November at $8.00 \mathrm{pm}$ in the Village Hall to discuss all of the above issues and consider options – see page 4.

Parish Council Response

The Planning Inspectorate have decided that the travellers can remain on their site on Birchanger Lane. The Travellers originally arrived in July 2018 having purchased the land by the A120 roundabout and obtained planning permission to keep horses and build stables. As the site is part of the Metropolitan Green Belt it is not unusual for permission for stables to be granted. However, the travellers moved caravans on the site with no intention of keeping horses.

In November 2018, Uttlesford District Council (UDC) took out an enforcement notice requiring the travellers to leave. The travellers immediately appealed but it took the Planning Inspectorate almost 3 years to reach a decision, despite a number of requests for information by the UDC.

The pandemic may have played a part of the delay but the decision was eventually reached on a written appeal whereby the inspector decided that the human rights of the travellers, including their right to healthcare and education, overruled the fact that the site is within the Metropolitan Green Belt.

In reaching this decision the Inspector made several conditions which, if they are not met, will mean that the travellers will have to leave. Amongst the conditions it states 'that only those named individuals and their dependents who are presently on site are allowed to live there'. The full appeal decision document can be found in the Parish Council website at www.birchanger.com. The appeal decision is extremely disappointing and the subsequent decision by UDC not to challenge this by requesting a judicial review is a further blow.

Residents deserve an explanation and UDC have been invited to attend a public meeting to explain their decision but have declined. They have also been asked to make a statement for this magazine to explain how their decision was reached but this has not been forthcoming. As you will no doubt be aware, whilst the Parish Council are notified of planning applications and can make comments, they cannot make any decisions. The District Council, as the planning authority, make such decisions.

Birchanger Parish Council Chairman Angie Driscoll reported that she has been in constant touch with the district councillors who have in turn been in contact with UDC planning officers, the legal team and the new CEO, Peter Holt, in an effort to get them to change their decision for a judicial review. The time to request a review is extremely limited but so far UDC have been unresponsive.

Information on Step House

Dear Birchanger residents,

Although I live in Kent, I grew up near Takeley and then in Heath Row, just the other side of Birchanger Wood. As part of family and history research, I am trying to find out where "Step House" was in Birchanger. I am also interested in its occupants between 1937 and 1945. Step House is hardly mentioned anywhere, except in the 1939 national register.

I have seen the 1939 national register entry which suggests that Step House was near to Sion House. Living there was a Violet Vincent, a number of her children, as well as a probable partner to Violet, a Mr Percy Tant who was a thatcher. Violet and her family lived at Step House until about 1945. Reportedly, she was a housekeeper, presumably either in Sion House or Step House. I wonder if anyone would be able to shed further light on Step House and its wartime occupants? Any information would be appreciated.

How Not to be a Victim of the Christmas Pet Scam

Unless we have been asleep it is hard to claim we are unaware of the rapid approach of Christmas. Time to buy all those presents again, which possibly the recipients never wanted, and which will probably be thrown out with the Christmas trash. Some of us might be thinking of something a little bit different. Is this the year you might be considering a Christmas pet?

Just a small warning. Although the bulk of people who sell puppies, kittens and all the other pets are straightforward and honest, the market in the recent months has suffered from fraudulent sellers who advertise pets of all sorts for sale which they do not own or that do not even exist. These fraudsters invite the buyers to secure their pet with a large deposit having not seen it first. Further demands for money follow for inoculations, pet insurance and even pet delivery. Needless to say, you see neither hide nor hair of the animal.

There are things you can do to protect yourself. Look up the website of the person you are buying your pet from. Check the reviews and feedback history. If you cannot view your prospective pet in person, ask for a video call. If the seller declines, ask them why. Whatever you do don't pay a penny until you are sure the sale is genuine. If you do finally decide to buy, don't pay by bank transfer. Use your credit card or PayPal which give you more of a chance to get your money back if you have been a victim of fraud. If despite all your precautions things go wrong contact your bank immediately and report the crime to actionfraud.police.uk or call 0300 123 2040. Remember if something is too good to be true, it probably is.

My Shocking 2.00 am Phone Call

A few weeks back I was awakened at 2.00 am by the phone ringing. Expecting someone was perhaps ill or in hospital, I answered it. The dry recorded voice at the other end told me that there was illegal activity on my account and I needed to take action. What account? What action? Another scam? I got nothing from that cold recorded little voice, so I went back to sleep, cursing the scammers again. Except this time, it wasn't a scam! The next bank statement showed that a number of items had been purchased (not by us), all below the value that requires a pin code. That meant somehow our card had been cloned and all our bank cards were now useless and our accounts frozen until new cards could be issued. Thankfully, the bank in this case, compensated us for the loss. You can't win can you!

Be suspicious of every email, text and call you receive when it is about money. Remember legitimate organisations will never ask you to transfer money to a safe account. Never download software or share your details with someone who calls you unexpectedly. Check callers' identities before committing yourself to anything. My latest call was about washing machine insurance which I have never taken out. Easy to spot and to deal with but they are rarely as simple as that! Take five to protect yourself. Stop and think before parting with any money or information. Challenge the caller if you suspect it could be fake. It is ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush and panic you. If you think you have fallen foul of a scam, contact your bank on a number you know to be correct and also call Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or alternatively online at https://www.actionfraud.police.uk.

Another Online Hazard

This one affects anyone who uses online banking. A harmless looking little email from your bank arrives asking you to take a satisfaction survey with the promise of a prize draw on completion. It is printed in the bank's usual colours and has the familiar logos etc. It looks genuine. However, it is unlikely to have come from your bank. Some nasty little tribe out there has been running a very successful little scam for a while now. The request looks genuine, and people respond to it, but hopefully not for too much longer. If anyone feels they may have been conned in this way tell your bank immediately. By replying to this questionnaire, the victims have given a lot about themselves away and the scammers will be reaping as many benefits as they can. Remember if in doubt about anything check with your bank as soon as you can.

A Perfect Storm in Stansted

One Saturday in September, Stansted was brought to a halt, to the irritation of the usual Saturday shoppers. Having fought their way into the village through a chaotic queue for fuel at the garages, they then found the car park full up. That is if they could even get there through the line of octogenarians blocking the entrance as they queued to get their third coronavirus jab.

The Stansted Surgery was a hub for all the surgeries up to and including Elsenham and Dunmow. The car park was full and despite the many disabilities the patients were cheerful and orderly. However sick they were, they were determined to get their protection. Their love of life apparently undiminished by all their various handicaps.

Good to know that the fighting spirit is still there despite what must have been some very difficult months.

Nitrous Oxide Canisters Found at Duck End

20 + nitrous oxide canisters were found in the lane near Duck End last month. This is not the first time such canisters have been found in the village and is of real concern to residents and police alike.

Nitrous oxide sometimes nicknamed "laughing gas", is a colourless gas used by dentists as a sedative and anaesthetic agent. When inhaled, it can make people feel euphoric and relaxed but can make some people hallucinate. The effects are caused by the drug slowing down the brain.

Nitrous oxide is normally bought in pressurised canisters. It is then transferred to a container such as a balloon to be inhaled. The drug causes dizziness, and affect the user's judgement, creating a risk of accidents. In large quantities it can also cause the user to faint or pass out. If nitrous oxide is inhaled through the mouth from a pressurised gas canister or in a confined space it can cause sudden death through lack of oxygen. Heavy, regular use of the drug can cause a deficiency of vitamin B12 and a form of anaemia. Severe vitamin B deficiency can cause serious nerve damage.

Villagers are asked to keep an eye out for people using the canisters or where cars are seen in odd places who are possibly supplying the users. Any such suspicious actions should be reported to Essex Police on 101 or online at https://www.essex.police.uk/

Airport in "Shameless" Bid for More Night Flights

Last month I reported that Stansted Airport Watch ('SAW') had sent a detailed submission to the Department for Transport ('DfT') in response to a consultation on the future arrangements for night flights at Stansted Airport. Briefly to recap, SAW questioned why Stansted is allowed 13,700 night flights per annum, more than twice as many as Heathrow, and we advised the DfT that our three main priorities were:

- 1. An unequivocal commitment to phase out all night flights at Stansted, starting next year, and with a complete ban in place by 2030, except in the case of genuine emergencies.
- 2. The restrictions on night flights to apply, not just from 11.30pm to 6.00am, but from 11.00pm to 7.00am, so that 'night' truly means 'night', as defined by the WHO; and
- 3. An immediate ban on all night time aircraft landings at Stansted using reverse thrust, except in the case of genuine emergencies.

We have now seen the submission made by the Manchester Airports Group ('MAG') replying to the same DfT consultation. In stark contrast to the SAW submission, MAG is proposing that the limit on the number of night flights at Stansted should be completely removed. MAG has also told the DfT that it opposes the proposed night time bans of the noisiest aircraft types.

In making this submission, MAG has shamefully disregarded the terms of a planning agreement which Stansted Airport signed with Uttlesford District Council in 2003 "...not to seek any relaxation of the night flight restrictions currently in force ...".

This raises questions about the level of trust we can have in MAG honouring its planning conditions, including the conditions attached to the recently approved planning application to grow Stansted to 43 million passengers a year. This is 50% more passengers than have ever been handled by Stansted in a single year. Whether it can achieve this level of growth in a post-Covid, highly competitive world, remains to be seen. It may prove to be a hollow victory.

FORGOTTEN GARDENS OF

NEWS FROM THE GARDENS OF EASTON LODGE

The days are drawing in now. Outside, there is still joy to be had from being in the peaceful Gardens but it is also a time to be inside and enjoy pictures of the Gardens. You can learn about their fascinating history from Gary, one of the trust's volunteers, who provides talks to community groups.



The Gardens remain open to visitors on Thursdays until the end of November. Opening hours are from 11.00 to 3.00, last entry 2.00. In November most of the leaves come down from the trees so the views open up (there's fun to be had kicking through the leaves) and we sometimes get beautiful early frosts. Visitors will see the volunteers starting their autumn jobs in the Gardens—planting bulbs and trees, pruning perennials and roses and tidying up the pond, flower and vegetable beds for the winter. Gary's talk, entitled A History of Easton Lodge - the Countess and her Gardens, tells the story of the estate from the late 1500s to the present day, focusing primarily on the period since 1865, when three-yearold Frances Evelyn Maynard inherited the mansion and lands and the vast fortunes that came with them. Little Frances, known as "Daisy," went on to become the Countess of Warwick. The talk outlines Daisy's life at Easton Lodge and in the wider community – including her intimate friendship with King Edward VII and then becoming a fully paid up Socialist. Gary also speaks about the work being done today by volunteers to maintain, restore and renovate these Grade II registered historic Gardens. The Hundred Parishes Society

"Please to remember the Fifth of November, gunpowder, treason and plot.

We know of no reason why gunpowder treason should ever be forgot."



This traditional rhyme appeared soon after the failed plot to ignite barrels of gunpowder beneath the House of Lords on the occasion of the state opening of Parliament by King James I on 5th November 1605. The man found with the gunpowder was Guy Fawkes, one of a group of English Catholics whose intention was to assassinate the Protestant King James so that one of his young Catholic children could assume the throne, thereby restoring a Catholic monarchy. Some four hundred years later, the preservation of the monarchy and parliament is still celebrated by many with a bonfire and the burning of a Guy.



Like other major events in British history, there is a link with The Hundred Parishes. In this case, the primary link is Sir William Waad (pronounced Wade) of 17th-century Battles Hall in the parish of Manuden. Waad, who lived from 1546 to 1623, had pursued a distinguished career in the service of the Crown and in 1605 held the position of Lieutenant of the Tower of London, responsible for those held prisoner there and specifically for the interrogation of prisoners. The king gave permission for the use of torture, including the rack, to assist in this questioning. It was not long before most of the plotters were rounded up, interrogated, tried and executed by being publicly hung, drawn and quartered for their involvement in the Gunpowder Plot.

Manuden's most famous former resident is remembered on a tablet inside the parish church. There is a second local link to the Gunpowder Plot. It is believed that Tiptofts, a 14th-century house in Wimbish, may have been used as a meeting place by the conspirators.

Stansted

At the end of September about forty of us set off for Weymouth on a 5-day trip arranged by Nigel Johnson through 'Just For Groups'. On the way down we visited Mottisfont House, an 18th century building with a medieval priory at its heart and the largest plane tree in Britain. On the way home we visited Kingston Lacey, a lavish family home re-imagined as a Venetian palace in the rural Dorset countryside. In between we visited the market towns of Dorchester and Bridport, Corfe Castle and the model village and then on to Swanage and the Heritage Steam Railway.



In October we visited Knowle which has the last dedicated deer park. Originally an archbishop's palace, the house passed through royal hands to the Sackville family – Knowle's inhabitants from 1603 to today. It is also home to some of the last surviving furniture from Whitehall and Hampton Court Palaces and to splendid 17th century tapestries. It was a most enjoyable day and they made really good scones there too!

As part of the u3a's 40th Anniversary in 2022 the trust is creating a u3a anniversary woodland situated in the Brecon Beacons. This will benefit the environment, wildlife and climate for future generations. The target is to plant five thousand trees by March 2nd. You can buy a tree at the u3a Brand Centre online.
