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Parish Councillors Pushed Beyond Their Limits

People have on the whole little expectations of their Parish Councillors, but they still expect them to do extraordinary things. Council members have been asked to do a multitude of tasks in their time; from unblocking ditches, tree work, hedging, salting the roads, clearing public footpaths, and fixing park play equipment, to name but a few, all of which have actually happened in Birchanger over the years. Officially, Parish Councillors can do none of these tasks for the simple reason that they are uninsured and untrained to do so. Yes, there are Parish Councillors who may have the requisite skills, but they do not have the authority or insurance to conduct any form of public works. Yet there are many people who expect them to do just that. If anything happened who would be liable?

Parish Councillors are mainly reporting the work needed to the relevant authority then fighting until the job is done. When they see something is wrong, they can arrange for it to be put right. When it takes time for the work to be done, they can only apply pressure to try to get the work done. They monitor planning applications, footpaths, bridleways, play areas, allotments, lighting, and roads to name but a few and do their best to try to get the right result quickly. The Parish Council pays for additional police presence in the village, arranges for speed watch and does its best to ensure in many different ways that the residents can live in a safe and attractive environment. So please, give your parish councillors a little credit – they do not get paid and if you really have something to say or want to make a difference why don't you get involved and become a parish councillor yourself? I'm always available to discuss how you can do this.

The safest way to renew your vehicle tax, driving licence, or passport etc., is to use the official Government website <u>https://www.gov.uk/</u> and search from there.

January Blues? Try The Brasserie in Stansted

We are spoilt for choice in Birchanger with the pub and club, both good and easy access, but for a very special night out you could try the Brasserie in Lower Street Stansted. The food is good. Not entirely plain cooking but good ingredients are used. Items like sole and lobster are not cheap, but they were very good. Two courses are really enough, but with a very tempting dessert menu, it was too easy to succumb. There is a wine list to suit most tastes. If there was anything to criticise, the food was perhaps left too long in the oven or a warm place. It was slightly over cooked. A minor irritant was the door curtain hanging by three hooks, which was necessary with the constantly opening main entrance door. The restaurant appears to supply the wine bar next door with food so there is enhanced coming and going as dishes are delivered across. It was a shame that there was no other exit that could be used. Verdict. Not cheap but a good venue for special occasions or when you just fancy a special meal.

Road Deaths in Essex are Soaring

Someone is killed or seriously injured every 20 minutes on Britain's roads. Most of these incidents are unnecessary and are caused by plain and simple bad driving. We have all experienced it, even without leaving Birchanger Lane, as other drivers push us up against the hedge or kerb on the bends. They drive so fast that they need to brake suddenly at every bend or obstruction and take up most of the lane while they do so – and that is just in our Lane. What are they like when they reach the main road? 47 preventable deaths on Essex roads in 2020 is a shocking total and very hard for grieving families to attempt to come to terms with. Some selfish bad driver has stopped a life and ruined a family for ever. All motorists need to attempt to take stock of their own driving skills. You may think you are a good driver, but would you pass your test if you had to take it again? Could you even attempt the written paper? What you can do is to remember how you drove when you first took your test and with your current car, attempt to emulate your pre-test self, or better still, book in for an advanced motorist course. Somehow that shocking total of deaths in 2020 must not happen in 2022. We do not mean to kill, but every driver has a potentially lethal weapon in their hands so take care!

Archaeology in Essex

Most people don't expect Essex to be a County rich in Archaeology, but it has many sites which were undiscovered until the builders moved in. Then there is a race against time for the archaeologists to do their work before the developers take over. Sites currently being worked on include excavating a late Iron Age village at Cressing which may have been levelled by the Romans in the aftermath of the Boudicca revolt. There are also Roman salt making and fish processing sites in Thurrock. Harlow has a site where there is evidence of occupation from the Neolithic to the Medieval Period. Essex was nearly all covered in trees of which only Hatfield and Epping Forest remain. Both these forests were popular hunting grounds for mediaeval kings and queens. Travellers Site

UDC has decided that they will not be seeking a judicial review. [Note: A full report of the meeting can be found in the December edition of the Birchanger Village Magazine. In addition, the letter from Peter Holt setting out UDC's position can be viewed on the Village website].

Footpath 15

The footpath has now been cleared, although some of the cut-down vegetation has been left in situ. There is some concern that after heavy rain this could cause a blockage. The clerk will contact Robin Wallbank from ECC Public Rights Of Way and ask that the vegetation be cleared.

Junction 8 roundabout improvements

The current plan is the same as previously in that, when the roundabout at the top of Birchanger Lane has been removed, residents will be allowed to cross the A120 in the direction of Dunmow Road. This crossing will be controlled by traffic lights. David Sprunt of Essex Highways has offered to attend a meeting with the parish council to explain the full plan.

Allotments and Recreation Ground

Estimates for repair to both sites have been received. It was suggested that the allotment gate be secured with a coded padlock. The code would be given to allotment holders. This was agreed and a suitable lock will be purchased.

Motor Cross track off Forest Hall Road

An area of land off Forest Hall Road has been designated as a motor cross track. Permission has been given for this use on 14 days each year. A group of local residents has advised that the track has been used many more times than this and has asked the Parish Council if it could intervene. The PC has contacted Sarah Marshall at UDC. She has responded advising that there had been staffing issues within the Planning Enforcement Team. The officer who covered the area in which this site falls, left in April of this year and the vacancy was only filled in September. As such there have been delays in dealing with cases such as this. The case has now been reallocated to the new case officer, Oliver Sear, who will be attending the site to view the situation.

Donation to Royal British Legion. A donation of £35 was agreed.

UDC Local Plan

Technical consultation. This has now been submitted and the parish council awaits the outcome. The next consultation is scheduled for March 2022.



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FLY LESS!

To coincide with the start of the COP26 international climate change summit in Glasgow last month, Stansted Airport Watch ('SAW') launched a "Fly Less" campaign which is being publicised on the SAW website and social media, and supported by posters and car window stickers.



In addition, SAW has written to the chairmen of the top 100 UK companies, encouraging businesses to play their part in combatting climate change by reducing business flights. First and Business Class flights have a far

higher carbon footprint than economy class, and private business jets can be up to ten times more damaging, in terms of emissions per passenger kilometre. In 2019 aviation accounted for 9.4% of UK carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions and is predicted to be the largest single source of UK CO2 emissions by 2050. In the same year, Heathrow was identified as the UK's largest single source of CO2 emissions and Stansted was said to be the largest single source of CO2 emissions in the East of England.

Importantly, aviation has a climate warming impact far in excess of that caused by the CO2 alone. The overall impact of aircraft emissions at high altitudes, including nitrogen and sulphur oxides, aerosols and contrails, is estimated to be two to four times the impact of the CO2 emissions.

The Government's independent Climate Change Committee has called for a freeze on UK airport expansion until the aviation industry can show a significant reduction in its emissions. To date, the Government has rejected this call and for the time being is putting its faith in technological solutions.

SAW Chairman, Brian Ross, commented: "This is not about telling people that they must not fly or that they cannot have a well-deserved annual family holiday. This is about asking people and businesses to try to reduce their carbon footprint. The train is often a realistic

alternative to a domestic flight and a Zoom meeting can often avoid the need for a business flight. It doesn't require a huge change in lifestyle to make a m e a n i n g f u l reduction in your carbon footprint."



FORGOTTEN GARDENS OF EASTON LODGE

After the Christmas and New Year break our focus at the Gardens quickly moves on to the jobs we need to get done before our snowdrop season and to the preparation for the rest of the year. Our first jobs in the new year are to finish winter pruning and tree planting. We have planted many apple and pear trees in the walled kitchen garden, which need to be pruned in the winter to keep them in good shape and productive. The soft fruit bushes and autumn raspberries also need pruning in January or early February.

We have also been planting specimen trees to extend the range of our collection. More flowering cherries, acers and sorbus, amongst others. But many of the trees in the Gardens were planted in Victorian times and some cannot expect to last for ever. So, increasingly, we are also thinking about succession planting, new for old. And our archivist is planning to produce more guides to our trees for visitors.



We will also be working on our deadhedging around the edge of the Gardens. Unfortunately, the hedging is unlikely to be good enough to keep out the local deer population, so we will still need to have wire cages around tender plants and accept that we may not see our early iris reticulata, which the deer seem to find particularly tasty. But we are hopeful that better deadhedging in some places will act as an extra barrier to cold winds and frosts and tidy up the rough edges of the Gardens. We have quite a few maintenance jobs to get on with too. We hope there will be no down time but our work in January is very much determined by the weather, whether it is icy, wet, or beautifully sunny and it can be any of those!



The Hundred Parishes Society

Hundreds of prisoner of war camps were set up in the UK during the two World Wars, with several in The Hundred Parishes. Camps varied in design and size. Some started as rows of tents with the prisoners engaged in constructing huts. Most have disappeared but I would like to tell you about a few.



In 1917, during the First World War, a camp was established at Great Dunmow's workhouse, initially taking about 100 German POWs. Capacity was later doubled by moving women elsewhere and closing the infirmary. The German prisoners worked on local farms but gained a reputation for obstruction and destruction. Dunmow workhouse never reopened and was converted to the housing that today is called The Close.



Bower Hall in Steeple Bumpstead was used as a POW camp in The First World War but it fell into ruin and was demolished in 1926. Wynches POW camp in Much Hadham was situated in forty acres of parkland and in the Second World War housed both Italian and German prisoners. Ickleton Grange housed a camp for both Italian and German men. Nothing now remains.

In Mill Lane, Hatfield Heath, the remains of POW camp 116 are still clearly visible, the most complete survivor in Essex, Herts, or Cambridgeshire. The camp was set up in 1941 to house Austrian and Italian prisoners; later, German men followed. They worked on local farms and even played football against a Hatfield Heath team who were beaten 11- 0!





Radwinter North POW rehabilitation camp was situated in the grounds of Radwinter Rectory, now known as Radwinter Manor. German soldiers were allowed to visit local families.

Karl Weschke was one; he became an artist and his clay sculpture of a weeping mother and child titled "Deutschland 1946" and is held in Saffron Walden Museum.
