

Following the presentation at the village hall a few years ago by Essex Council and Highways, plans for the new crossroads have now been changed according to residents wishes which will allow vehicles exiting Birchanger Lane, driving towards Bishop's Stortford to cross the A120 into Dunmow Road rather than go round the J8 - M11 roundabout. There will also be a pelican and cycle crossing over the A120.

This will be accomplished by retaining the present exit from the lane and the installation of traffic lights. There would be another left turn exit for traffic wishing to go to J8 - M11. It remains to be seen whether this improves the traffic flow, but one thing is certain, we will have months of disruption throughout the lane whilst work is going on which is due to start very soon.

On the plus side there will be a clearway along Birchanger Lane from its junction with the A120 down to Duck End, which will stop fly parking and taxis etc., using the lane as a car park.



pizzerias there is a proper pizza oven, but the barbecue dishes were too enticing this time. The restaurant is not exactly cheap, but the food on offer puts the usual half term fast food into the shade. For the parents, the wines by the bottle or by the glass are well worth trying. Just remember you can have something undercooked cooked more, but over cooked food is a big disappointment, and that was our main disappointment when we visited.

The Art Group was visited in December by a local artist, Bill Morris, whose demonstration they found inspirational, and sixty-five members came to the Christmas Lunch at Bury Lodge with entertainment provided by Stansted U3A Singers. It was a lovely meal, and a good time was had by all.

At the General Meeting on February 17th in St John's Hall, 1.30 for 2.00pm, Tanya Fern-Smith will be speaking about the long and varied history of Stansted Hall. Stansted was gifted by William the Conqueror to a nephew in 1066 and by the 16th century there was a Tudor Hall whose owners included the de Vere family, the Earls of Oxford, and the Duke of Norfolk. This was later replaced by a Jacobean Hall and the grounds redesigned by Repton.

Following a fire in the 19th century a new hall was commissioned in 1876 which was purchased by Arthur and Gertrude Findlay in the 1920s. During the war it was loaned to the Red Cross as a convalescent hospital. It is now a training college and headquarters for the Spiritualists National Union. It is hoped that this talk will be relayed to Stansted's twin town, Rungis in France, as part of the Town Twinning Association's programme for 2022.

Beating County Lines

Essex police have been making strides in their struggle to rid the county of County Lines Gangs. The gangs target vulnerable elderly and youngsters alike. They befriend the elderly so that they can find a safe house from which to run their illegal activities.

The elderly person becomes a prisoner in their own home, totally at the beck and call of the gang. Action is needed on two fronts. Firstly, to find the elderly who have been targeted and then to rid them of the unwanted gang which has imposed themselves on them and now rules their lives. With the youngsters it is more difficult. Their life has revolved around the gang. They are couriers for the gang in most cases, they have a good lifestyle and more money than they could have dreamt about. They only want to leave when the gang turns nasty. Then they are terrified.

We can help eradicate this in our own small way. If you know an older person who suddenly has a lot of young visitors and seems to be stressed, you could mention this to your local police and ask them to make sure the individual is all right. Let them take it from there. Do the same if you are concerned about a youngster. Tell the police of your concerns then it is up to them. These gangs are dangerous, and you have done your bit by noticing incidents and reporting. Now it is up to the experts to do the rest.





Crime Prevention

Bogus Callers/Distraction Burglaries & Rogue Traders Although it is believed the elderly are the most likely victims of these types of crime, that is not always the case. However, if you have elderly relatives or friends you may wish to pass on this advice. You may also have elderly or vulnerable neighbours that you can help protect by watching out for suspicious activity. It's handy to have a list with telephone numbers of your water, gas, electricity, telephone etc., suppliers by the phone should you need to make



If you have a caller – STOP. Are you expecting anyone, is the back door locked, sometimes while you are at front door someone will slip in the back. Have a look out of a window by the front door and if possible, speak to them first from that window or through the closed door. If you are on your own, pretend you are not by calling over your shoulder that you will answer the door. There is no longer a "Water Board or Electricity Board" they now have particular company names so if this is stated that should "ring alarm bells" – CHAIN. If you decide it's safe to open the door, put the door chain on before you open it – CHECK. Ask for an ID card, if in doubt ring a telephone number from your relevant correspondence from that company to verify the identity (not a telephone number from their ID card as it may be false).

If in doubt keep them out

Call the police on 999 or if you have a carer alarm, activate it and speak to your control room. If you do let someone in your home, always make sure you close the door behind them so that no one else can get in while you are busy with your visitor. With most of the utility companies you can now set up a password with them so that when one of their employees calls you can verify that they are genuine, speak to your relevant company.



Rogue traders may call at your door claiming to be qualified tradespeople offering to do work on your home. These people may claim you need services like repairs to your roof, lawn or fences, your driveways power washed, repaired, or replaced, garden services, or waste clearance. They may seem friendly and persuasive but too often they target vulnerable, elderly people.

A genuine trader won't:

- call without an appointment.
- ask you to go to a bank to withdraw cash or make a money transfer.
- offer to take you to the bank to withdraw cash for payment.
- insist that you make a decision about work they're offering to do on the spot.
- bully or scare you into doing the work.

It's your doorstep so you can choose if you want work carried out or not. If you do need some work doing, ask a friend for a recommended trader or contact a Trading Standards 'Buy with Confidence' accredited trader <u>www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk</u>. Get a number of quotes and get a written estimate detailing exactly what work will be carried out, how much it will cost and what the terms of payment are. Take your time to make sure you're happy with what you're undertaking and ask a trusted friend/relative for advice.



Life in All its Fullness

Hello, by now the joy and sparkle of Christmas has all been packed away for another year and we are engrossed in the new term. For this term, our topics will focus on the skills and knowledge of history. Our younger children in KS1 are learning about the Victorians and in particular they are looking at the lives of Sarah Bonetta and Queen Victoria. She lived in this country for many years before returning to Africa with the support of Queen Victoria and the Royal Household.

Is Air Travel Losing its Charm?

An article in the Financial Times on 14th January highlighted the decline in air travel caused by the Covid-19 pandemic and reported that a quarter of business travel will not be coming back.

If true, this is very bad news for airlines because, on average, business flights account for about a quarter of all air travel and they are highly profitable. For major airlines such as British Airways and Lufthansa, it is estimated that business travel generates almost half of their profits.

The likelihood of a long-term decline in business flights chimes with our own evidence. Last November, as part of our 'Fly Less' campaign, I wrote to the Chair of each of the UK's largest 100 companies. My letter didn't request a reply, but I was pleasantly surprised to receive a large number of replies. And there was a common theme: I was pushing at an open door.

Major companies are happy to support a 'Fly Less' policy because this makes perfect business sense. The pandemic has forced a reduction in business air travel and shown that much of this can easily be replaced by 'Zoom' meetings.

Business leaders also point out that reducing business flights helps protect employee health and wellbeing and improves productivity, as well as generating substantial savings in travel budgets.

Finally, almost all major UK PLCs now have a commitment to help tackle climate change by reducing carbon emissions, and one of the best ways of reducing your carbon emissions is to fly less. The Financial Times article reported as follows:

"If you want to spend £100 in the most polluting way possible, buy an airline ticket. That's because the ticket price includes virtually none of the true cost: the UK subsidises flights by more than £8 billion a year, just by not charging VAT or fuel duty."

However, major UK companies now have so many good reasons to reduce business flights that even an £8 billion annual subsidy may not be enough to protect the aviation industry from a long-term decline in business travel.

Welcome to the new horticultural year of 2022

Happy New Year! Well, we have made it through Christmas, New Year and January, so we can now celebrate the days getting longer and the new horticultural year, starting with the snowdrops. It is two years since we had a proper snowdrop season, without storms or the pandemic, so this year we are spreading the joy. With four days available for visitors to see the snowdrops, with capped numbers and pre-booking there won't be too many people.

Our normal booking policy is that if the day has to be cancelled, there will be refunds. So, the snowdrop Open Sundays are on 13th and 20th February, and we will have our normal catering, with soup, bacon/cheese/hummus rolls, homemade cakes, and hot and cold drinks. As usual, snowdrop Sunday hours are 11.00 am to 4.00 pm, last entry 3.00pm and we will have a plant stall as well as snowdrops in the green for sale and our own Gardens merchandise.

The Hundred Parishes Society

Under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, Natural England can designate any area of land considered to be of special interest by virtue of its fauna, flora, or geological features as a "Site of Special Scientific Interest" or SSSI. This designation ensures that the area is appropriately managed and protected. The Hundred Parishes has more than twenty SSSIs. I will mention a few that can be visited.

In the parish of High Easter, Garnett's Wood comprises twenty-five hectares (62 acres) of ancient, coppiced woodland (meaning the trees have been regularly cut down to ground level). Mentioned in the Domesday Book, this wood, in which the lime is the dominant tree, was given in the 12th century by Henry II to a knight called Geffrey Garnett. A stump of a tree has been carved to depict the knight, still watching over his wood.



Amwell Quarry, formerly an area of gravel pits, has been transformed into a 37-hectare wetland environment, important in particular for wintering wildfowl and regarded as England's premier site for dragonflies.



Patmore Heath in Albury parish is an 8-hectare grass heathland, now a scarce habitat in South East England. It is managed by Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust. A variety of native grasses grow here, and the heath's ponds are home to all three native English newt species: great-crested, smooth and palmate.



Best-known and by far the largest of our SSSIs is Hatfield Forest which covers more than four hundred hectares, around 1.5 square miles. It was a royal hunting forest from around 1100 AD until the 15th century. It has never been ploughed and has been managed for centuries by coppicing and by pollarding (cutting trees to a height above which livestock and deer cannot reach the new shoots). It has been owned by The National Trust since 1924.

Well now we have come through Epiphany, the period that follows our celebrations for the birth of Christ but what does Epiphany mean to you? Traditionally the season of Epiphany refers to the Magi, wise men who travelled to Bethlehem following a star to find the new born Christ.

Today, Epiphany is not a word that is in common use; perhaps one of the reasons is that this season of the year is largely overlooked.
