

Government strips UDC of powers to deal with planning applications Story By Hollie Ryder – Bishops Stortford Independent

The Government has stripped Uttlesford District Council (UDC) of its powers to decide major planning applications in a move that has placed the district on the verge of "environmental disaster".

In an announcement made on Tuesday morning (Feb 8) on behalf of the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, Michael Gove, with immediate effect the Residents for Uttlesford (R4U)-led authority will no longer be able to determine schemes of 10 or more homes. It is believed to be the first time since 2014 that a council has had control over planning seized from its grasp and follows a failed bid to stop expansion at Stansted Airport, which ended with an award of costs against Uttlesford. The 'Notice of Designation' means all future applications will now bypass the authority and be decided by the Government's Planning Inspectorate.

UDC will remain in 'special measures' indefinitely in response to what the Government deemed was poor decision-making over major planning issues, which has seen the number of schemes overturned on appeal exceeding the 10% target set for local authorities.

Reacting to the news, R4U said that it was undertaking a widespread 'improvement plan' of the council's planning department and intervention was not merited, and that Saffron Walden Conservative MP Kemi Badenoch's Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) had stepped in to stop the council refusing too many planning applications. A spokesperson for the DLUHC said that Mrs Badenoch, who is minister for levelling up communities, had not been involved in the decision-making process.

The notice was issued by MP Christopher Pincher in one of his last acts as housing minister, before his appointment as deputy chief whip in the Commons in yesterday's Cabinet reshuffle. The notice said: "The Secretary of State, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 62A of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990... considers there are respects in which the local planning authority are not adequately performing their function of determining applications for planning permission for major development under Part 3 of the Act."


Opposition groups claimed the notice would effectively result in a "total loss of democratic control". With no Local Plan yet in place – UDC's third attempt is currently being drafted – a criminal investigation under way and its accounts still not signed off, they accused the authority of "failing" residents. "This is another significant failure that R4U have caused the district," said Cllr George Smith, speaking on behalf of Uttlesford Conservatives. "They will undoubtedly blame everyone else, including the Government. But it is the decisions that they have taken that has led the Government to conclude that Uttlesford District Council should be placed under Designation Status."

Since May 2019, the council has refused 43 major applications against officer advice and 39 of those have gone to appeal, costing the district £200,000. "It is under R4U that the planning function at Uttlesford has become dysfunctional," said Cllr Smith, the Tory member for The Sampfords. "R4U councillors have to accept they cannot ignore planning law for political gain – that's what's led us to where we are today and why we have the worst-performing planning function in the country.

As a result of this decision the council can no longer decide major planning applications but will have to pay for the privilege of the Planning Inspectorate to make those decisions instead. What impact this will have on the Local Plan remains to be seen, but if the council cannot decide the future vision of our communities, all residents will suffer. Carefully considered development brings cross-generational benefits and this blanket 'no' approach that R4U have adopted is damaging to all of our communities."

He added: "Having presided over a failure to get their accounts signed off, critical governance failures and a criminal investigation into one of their own, this is further evidence that R4U are not able to govern the district effectively. Our communities are suffering at the hands of the incompetence of this administration. Uttlesford deserves better."

UDC's Liberal Democrat group leader Cllr Melvin Caton, of Stansted South and Birchanger, said the situation reflected poorly on both R4U and the previous, Tory-led administration as the



review covered its last year in office and the arrival of R4U.

"It is an environmental disaster for the district with a total loss of democratic control over major planning applications and we do not know how long it is going to last," he said. "Data shows that between April 2018 and March 2020 we were exceeding the criteria of 10%, at 16.5%. The Government expects only 10% of decisions on major planning applications to be upheld by the Planning Inspectorate. (Cont. P2)

Cllr Melvin Caton continued, "In the last two years from 2019-2021 that figure has gone up to 17.65%, so we're going in the wrong direction. But that poor performance was something which was happening over the previous administration as well. "R4U are currently in a reorganisation of the planning department which has backfired because it wasn't done early enough. We are shortly to have a fit-for-purpose planning department which will be circumvented by developers who will go straight to the Planning Inspectorate from now on.

"R4U were elected to sort out the planning debacle but haven't done it quickly enough and, with the first draft of the Local Plan expected in the summer, the timing is not great. Not having an up-to-date Local Plan is a major contributory factor, I am sure."

Fellow Lib Dem Cllr Alan Dean, of Stansted North, said the move had "damaged Uttlesford's reputation really badly". He added: "I put that down to R4U hiding its head in the sand with bad planning decisions and now we're really in a bad state. I do think the administration needs to be called to account, we cannot drift along like this. It is taking away both local knowledge and local democratic control."

The R4U administration at UDC claimed it had inherited an under-performing planning function from the Conservatives, which included two failed Local Plans at a cost of £6 million. Cllr Petrina Lees (R4U, Elsenham and Henham), leader of Uttlesford District Council said: "We've all seen the reports in the national press of huge donations to the Conservatives by property tycoons. We don't 'dance with donors' – we stick up for residents. But for a decade Boris Johnson and his predecessors have said 'Build, build, 'Residents have repeatedly said no to unsustainable development and locally voted the Conservatives out. So now they've decided that instead they want to be able to approve thousands of new houses via the back door."

She added: "To be clear, this intervention is by the department of which our MP is minister of state. The excuse they are using to seize control comes from their claim that UDC isn't winning enough planning applications on appeal – but poor development in our towns and villages must be fought for residents. "In truth the vast majority of applications today are approved, with just the poorest being refused, and fewer going to appeal for further review. This removal of local decision-making is an unwarranted and cynical political move by the Conservatives.

"They have decided that civil servants from an agency of our MP's department will now decide what gets built in Uttlesford and where. This brings the very real fear that the developers, who under the previous Conservatives' proposals looked to put large new towns on the outskirts of Dunmow, Chesterford and Stebbing, will this time go right to Government for approval. It is an appalling betrayal of local democracy."

A statement on UDC's website this afternoon said: "The letter of designation is very disappointing, although not surprising – the council has commissioned its own independent expert peer review of the planning service, published in October 2021, and

has already put in place a thorough and comprehensive improvement plan. Progress against this plan was reported most recently to the council's scrutiny committee last week (3 February).

"The council will put together a response to the Government's letter over the coming days and will recommit to making the substantial improvements necessary to its planning function as set out in the peer review report. "Councillors and planning staff are hard-working and passionately dedicated to delivering an effective planning service that supports quality development. Both the ongoing improvements to the planning service and the emergence of a new Local Plan are critical to the successful future of the district, and the council is already making steady and welcome progress in the right direction."

Birchanger Lane A120 Roundabout Concerns

Residents of Birchanger will all, no doubt, be aware that the works on the Birchanger Roundabout and the links to Junction 8 of the M11 are now underway and the last edition of the magazine set out some of the basic elements of the design. People have raised some concerns about the control of traffic leaving Birchanger Lane and whether it will be possible to travel across the A120 and go straight into Dunmow Road to access Bishops Stortford. Hopefully, those issues have been answered but, just to confirm, there will be traffic signals controlling the Junction and yes direct access to the Dunmow Road will be part of the scheme.

Having said that we now move on to the details of how this will all be constructed and what the impact will be on residents of Birchanger whilst the work is being completed. I think we have all been aware that at certain times during the day there has been an increase in traffic with people trying to avoid any delays on the A120 and that is a concern that I have made very strongly to the Contractor (John Sisk and Son Ltd) who are completing the works.

One of the proposals is that for a time there will be a closure to Birchanger Lane, in part to allow the civil works to be carried out, but also to prevent the rat running that will otherwise occur. At the moment the Contractor is detailing the final programme of their works, so we await the timing of that. It must be hoped that the significant inconvenience of having Birchanger Lane closed will, in part, offset the issues of excessive traffic speeding through the village.



Green Homes Grants

It your income is less than $\pounds 30,000$ per annum, or you are in receipt of any benefits, it may be that you are eligible for a grant of up to $\pounds 10,000$ to insulate your home and improve your central heating system. Application is made to the Green Homes Grant Scheme which is usually delivered by the local authority. The online form is available through the Green Homes Grant Scheme or Essex County Council.

How Safe Are Your Household Appliances?



If like me, you do not always register your household appliances with the manufacturer, either because you simply forgot to do so or may be worried that you may be bombarded with another ton of unwanted Junk Mail, there is another way to find out just how safe your appliances are by registering them with your local fire brigade. You will find out quickly just how

safe your appliances really are. Ovens, hotplates and toasters are among the worst cooking appliances found to be unsafe, but other non-cooking appliances have the potential to catch fire as well. 11% of household fires were caused by fridge freezers, tumble dryers, washing machines and dishwashers. When you get a new appliance the best thing to do is to register it with the manufacturer as soon as possible. That way you will get notice of any safety issues with your appliance directly. For the 49% of us who have not registered their appliances, this scheme offers another opportunity to secure your home's safety.

Knife Amnesty in Uttlesford

Hopefully, nobody in Birchanger needs this, but if you do have a knife that you think is illegal or is very sharp and you need to dispose of it, you can wrap it up and take it to a knife amnesty travelling centre which is travelling around the villages in Uttlesford. The nearest collection to us is on March 3rd in Farnham Church car park between 2.00 and 3.00 pm and at Manuden Village Community Centre also on March 3rd between 12.30 and 13.30. Knives must be well wrapped and if you have one you can also get rid of your telescopic truncheon, flick knife well wrapped and knuckle duster as well. The items are simply dumped anonymously.

Levelling Up in Essex to Prevent Crime

Essex County Council has a new strategy to help reduce criminal behaviour across the county by improving housing and neighbourhoods to promote community spirit. They want to design places in a way in which crime can be reduced. No more dark, unused car parks, unlit areas, but better designed housing which tend to look outwards onto the street scene rather than inwards. Trying to bring communities together more and not to create areas where people do not want to go to at night. The idea of the creation of more open, resident friendly safer communities has been around for a long time. The UK's National Cyber Security Centre carried out analysis of passwords leaked in data breaches and found that more than 23 million users worldwide used 123456 as a password. Here are some top tips that will make your life easier and your online accounts more secure:

1: Creating memorable passwords

A good way to create strong, memorable passwords is by using 3 random words. But remember, don't use words that can be guessed (like your pet's name). You can include numbers and symbols if you need to. For example, "RedPantsTree4!"

2: Saving passwords in your browser

Saving your password in your browser means letting your web browser (such as Chrome, Safari or Edge) remember your password for you.

- This can help:
- make sure you do not lose or forget your passwords
- protect you against some cybercrime, such as fake websites It is safer than using weak passwords, or using the same password
- in more than one place.

3: Email account passwords

- If a hacker gets into your email account, they could:
- reset your other online account passwords

• access personal information you have saved about yourself or your business.

Your email password should be strong and different to all your other passwords. This will make it harder to crack or guess.

'Life in all its fullness'

During each academic year we have focus weeks or days to highlight areas that reflect our vision statement of 'Life in all its fullness.' This always includes wellbeing as we believe that in order for children to fulfil their potential, they need to be healthy and happy.



The first morning at the start of each half term is dedicated to wellbeing. These sessions are used to highlight the NHS programme '5 Ways to Wellbeing'. These mornings are a great way to remind the children of how to keep themselves healthy. We also use our weekly newsletter, 'The Buzz,' to give parents information and links to useful websites that support children's wellbeing and mental health.



Just before half term the staff and children celebrated Children's mental health week. Mrs Cook, our mental health and wellbeing lead, organised a 'Walk and Talk' session. This initiative has been set up by Essex County Council and it is designed to encourage people, young and old, to go outside and notice the beauty of their environments. As well as the health benefits of being outside, Walk and Talk encourages people to talk to each other as they walk as a good way of getting to know another person and maybe share a worry or two. This was a perfect time for this activity following two years of class bubbles and social distancing. All of the children in KS1 walked the school grounds and all of KS2 walked the grounds and the areas around the school talking to others outside of their classes.



Mrs Cook also spoke to the children about what they would like to do during Children's Mental Health week. The children told her that they would like to be able to express themselves in a way that was personal to them. This led to our 'Great Create' where



some children created junk models, wrote songs or made-up dance routines. Other children chose to make jewellery, to draw, or paint a picture, many of which went home to their families as a present for mum. The children worked in groups, either on a

joint project, or whilst everyone completed their individual activity alongside others doing the same thing.

The children loved this week and we loved watching them having such a lot of fun which is at the very heart of strong wellbeing. *Claire Berry - Headteacher*



Are We Serious About Climate Change?

Aircraft emissions are amongst the fastest growing causes of global warming and yet the Government continues to support airport expansion projects all across the UK.

In the past year, the Government has approved major expansion not only at Stansted Airport but also at Bristol, Southampton and Leeds Bradford airports. In addition, expansion proposals for Gatwick and Luton airports are at an advanced stage and they also have Government support.



And the biggest airport expansion project of all, at Heathrow, also has Government support, endorsed by MPs in the House of Commons, voting 415 to 119 in support of a third runway.

Taken together, the airport expansion proposals that have been approved in the past year, and those in the pipeline, will increase UK airport capacity to over 500 million passengers per annum. This compares to 297 million passengers handled in 2019, before the Covid pandemic.

In December 2020, the Climate Change Committee, recommended that there should be a total freeze on UK airport expansion until such time as the aviation industry could demonstrate that it was on track to achieve net zero emissions by 2050. However, the Government has decided to completely ignore this advice from its own independent experts.

Covid has had a huge impact on air travel. UK airports handled just 74 million passengers in 2020 and 65 million in 2021 – less than a quarter of the pre-pandemic level.

No-one yet knows when - or even whether - the demand for air travel will return to its pre-pandemic level of 297 million passengers per annum. However, it seems safe to say that airports will struggle to find the demand to utilise the planned annual capacity of over 500 million passengers.

Covid has dramatically reduced aviation's impact on global warming over the past two years, but both are damaging to human health. We need to find a better way of reducing aviation's impact upon climate change. We need to fly less.

We welcome new volunteers all year round, but on the new volunteers' day we show potential recruits the range of work we do, including gardening, maintenance and carpentry work, catering, and other visitor experience roles. 

The Hundred Parishes Society


Hundred Parishes book completely sold out

The Society has now sold all 800 copies of its first hardback book The Hundred Parishes: An Introduction. There will be no reprint, although we have open minds on the possibility of a second book. Preparation of our first book took several years and was only possible because of the vast resource of what had already been written, in far more detail, about individual places, people and events. The Society holds more than 300 local books and pamphlets.



The Society's website www.hundredparishes.org.uk has recently been updated to ensure, amongst other things, that individual parish introductions include references to their share of available literature.

A good number of local books are available, in person or online, from the four excellent outlets that each sold many copies of the Hundred Parishes book: Harts and the Tourist Information Centre in Saffron Walden, the TIC in Bishop's Stortford and Between The Lines bookshop in Great Bardfield.



A few parishes, as yet, have no book of their own, or perhaps just a pamphlet available in the church, whilst other places have extensive coverage. One of the Society's trustees, Peter Sanders, conducted research for 30 years before compiling a definitive history of Stansted Mountfitchet. Another easy-to-read classic, Littlebury: A Parish History, was produced by a team of authors.



I have recently been absorbed by a largely pictorial history of Sewards End and by the 4th edition of Around Cold Christmas, not least because the latter has frequent references to my wife's distant relatives. Clavering's Jacqueline Cooper always seems to be working on yet another book about Clavering or Saffron Walden. Several local history societies have generated books or booklets, or have work in progress. So rich is our local history that there is no shortage of reading material or potential subject matter.
