

Most of you will know about the planned work on the M11 junction roundabout, either from the local press or because you received a letter from National Highways. Not all of you will have seen Peter Sampson's post on Facebook reporting National Highways' announcement that the work has been postponed. This is the latest situation.

The roundabout at Junction 8 crosses the M11 on two bridges. National Highways needs to repair and resurface these bridges so will be closing them on several weekends from 9pm on Friday night until 5am on Monday morning.

North bridge (towards the airport, Takeley and Dunmow): Friday 10th - Monday 13th, 17th - 20th and 24th - 27th June.

When the north bridge is closed, to get onto the south (London) bound M11 or the eastbound A120 from Birchanger you'll need to head up the M11 towards Cambridge until you reach junction 9a at Stump Cross, near Great Chesterford. You'll then have to come all the way back to Birchanger Green to get onto the M11 or A120. This diversion is over 30 miles.

South bridge (carrying traffic from the airport, Dunmow and Takeley towards Birchanger): The website has errors here but it appears that the bridge is closed from Friday 1st July. It's reasonable to assume that the works will be for the same periods of time (9pm on Friday until 5am Monday) and will require three weekends. Therefore the bridge will be closed on the weekends of 1st - 4th, 8th - 11th and 15th - 18th July.

When the south bridge is closed, traffic using the M11 from the north or the A120 from the east will be unable to get to Birchanger from junction 8 so are supposed to use the M11 to junction 7 at Harlow then come back along the M11 to Birchanger Green. That's a diversion of over 20 miles, although some time will be saved if the new junction 7a at Church Langley is open.

These dates are weather permitting, so subject to last minute change.

According to National Highways, 'non-motorway users only' can use Forest Hall Road, Church Road, and Bury Lodge Lane (or vice versa) to cross the junction (see their map below). It isn't clear whether non-motorway users means those not intending to use the motorway, or those unable to, but in any case the diversion via Forest Hall Park will save a lot of time and fuel whatever your intentions towards the M11.

Would You Know if a Colleague Has Suffered Abuse?

Domestic violence is a crime which often goes unseen. Victims do not want to talk about their injuries and go to great lengths to cover them up. They are incredibly loyal to the abuser and will rarely admit that they are in trouble as totally mistakenly they feel ashamed.

The police are aware of this and are encouraging colleagues in the work place to look out for a colleague who may suffering abuse. Long sleeves on a hot day, neck coverings, unexplained limping, person withdrawn and sometimes vacant.

In the first instance a friendly word is what is needed continuing throughout the next few days in an attempt to gain the victims confidence.

There are groups out there who know how to help. Getting the victim to seek their support is sometimes very difficult. We have to remember that sadly domestic abuse is common and all too frequently the victim ultimately does not survive.

There can be bullying in the workplace as well. If your company does not have a mechanism to deal with this, it could be a matter for the police.



It is not too late to volunteer to help in some way; we still need stewards, people to help with refreshments and of course helpers to create flower arrangements.



The children are now able to mix freely at break and lunchtime with children from other classes, which was something that was not possible last year. We are also able to hold events for our parents and families to come into school. Hopefully by the time that you read this, our nature garden will have been finished, thanks to support from the Human Roots charity and helpers from our school. We would also have held another of our Open Classroom sessions for Year 6 in May and we'll be getting ready for the big events that we traditionally hold at the end of a school year.

Our small school is back to being a busy place full of children, staff and parents and governors. We also have a number of professionals who we employ for the delivery of PE, music, speech and language support, occupational therapy and counselling. We also need to mention our volunteer readers, who give so generously of their time each week.

Into our bustling little school, we have accepted twelve new faces recently. These twelve children are all refugees who are living in our village. Our new children have a spread of ages, and we have children in all of our classes except for one. Between them they reflect many different nationalities from around the world. What they have in common, is that they have had a traumatic past and have come to this country (and our village) for peace. All have very limited resources now that they are with us.



We have been bowled over by the support that our school community has shown these children and their families. Our parents have donated uniform, money to buy uniform and clothes for outside school. These donations have been welcomed by the families who are very touched by the kindness shown to them by people who they do not know. If you would like to support these families with us, then please contact the school and we can give you some advice and details of how you can contribute.



Over the next few weeks and months, we shall settle the new children into our school which will include creating lessons which support their learning across the curriculum along with enhancing the spoken and written English that they have. Most importantly we shall be extending the school's vision of 'Life in All its Fullness' and the school's Christian values of love, care, courage and truth to these children as they settle into British life.

Missed Targets

A recent report ('Missed Targets', May 2022) by the respected environmental think tank, 'Possible' highlighted a consistent failure of the aviation industry to meet its own targets for reducing greenhouse gas emissions, particularly CO2.

The report concluded that the purpose of these overambitious targets was to try to convince government that the aviation industry had the problem under control and so there was no need for any measures to limit the growth in aviation.

These same arguments were presented by Manchester Airports Group (MAG) at the Stansted Airport Public Inquiry in 2021. MAG argued that, allowing for projected efficiency gains, Stansted's CO2 emissions would be virtually unchanged at an annual throughput of 43 million passengers compared to its 2019 emissions when it handled 28 million passengers.

Stansted Airport Watch (at that time, SSE) provided counter evidence to the Inquiry showing a consistent pattern of missed targets by the aviation industry between 2008 and 2020. Quite simply, the projected efficiency gains were never delivered.

However, the Panel of Inspectors accepted MAG's projections at face value, just as successive governments have been repeatedly reassured by the unrealistic targets published by the aviation industry for reducing its emissions. The consistent pattern of the industry failing to meet its projected efficiency gains is simply overlooked.

The report by "Possible" noted that by 2019, aviation had grown to 9.4% of the UK's CO2 emissions, and continues to be one of the fastest growing sources of greenhouse gas emissions in the UK, Europe, and globally.

Today, the aviation industry continues to paint an optimistic vision of a future where aviation will play its part in tackling climate change by having 'net zero' emissions by 2050, without any need to limit its growth.

Commercial aircraft powered by electricity or hydrogen may well be viable options at some point in the future but these technologies are still in their infancy. A commercial aircraft has an average lifespan of about 24 years. Aircraft coming off the production line today – and those on the order book – will still be in service in the 2040s and into the 2050s.

The aviation industry's record of missed targets does not inspire confidence. *Brian Ross*.

The Hundred Parishes Society

Stained Glass

Stained glass has been with us for over a thousand years, traditionally used in windows of places of worship. The Hundred Parishes has some beautiful memorial windows, mostly from the 19th and early-20th centuries, but I would like to briefly describe a few examples that are more recent.

The Parish Church of St. Andrew in Much Hadham has a window on the west wall of the tower based on an etching by the renowned sculptor, Henry Moore. The window, depicting the Tree of Life, was created by Patrick Reyntiens and celebrates the joint use of the church by Church of England and Roman Catholic congregations.



In Broxted, 13th-century St. Mary's church has two modern stainedglass windows, the Hostage Windows. They were installed following the release in 1991 of three men: Terry Waite, Brian Keenan and local man John McCarthy. All had been held hostage in Lebanon for five years. One window is called the Window of Captivity and the other the Window of Freedom. They were designed by John Clarke and replaced two Victorian windows.



In Little Easton, the parish church is dedicated to St. Mary the Virgin and has two stained glass windows in the north chapel that honour the American air crews of 386th Bomb Group (known as the Crusaders) who lost their lives in WWII. The windows are the Crusaders Window and the Window of Friendship and Peace.



Another window dedicated to American airmen can be found in St. George's, Anstey. The Millennium Window records the names of all the men of 398th Bomb Group who died in WWII, etched onto butterflies.





When you are out and about, I hope you will pause to look in our churches at the wonderful range of craftsmanship, some old and some not so old.
