Local Animal Rescuer Helps Save Dogs in Ukraine

My Ukraine Experience

My name is Steve Sommerfeld and I live with my wife Nadine in Birchanger Lane. I recently returned from Ukraine where I was a humanitarian aid volunteer for two weeks, with a further two weeks on the border. This was specifically to do with dog and animal rescue from the front lines.

Like so many others, my wife and I sat and watched in disbelief as Russia launched a vile and barbaric invasion of Ukraine in February. We hopped from news channel to news channel, glued to the TV, and as the weeks went by more atrocities emerged - each one more shocking than the last. We kept donating to humanitarian aid charities but for me somehow it just wasn't enough. I was restless and had to get my 'boots on the ground', to get in there and help somehow, some way.

As keen dog rescuers (we have three dogs plus two cats) my wife was closely following some UK charities that had gone into the war zone, to help the forgotten dogs of war. She brought the various charities to my attention, and I answered a call for help at the border with Romania to help build a shelter that was to temporarily home the Ukrainian rescued animals. I jumped on a plane and helped at the site for a couple of weeks. It was extremely rewarding, and I met a great team of people from many countries including the USA and Canada.



home it wasn't long before a plea volunteers to come into Ukraine itself emerged, and after positive support from both my wife and my employers, I was back on a plane and into Ukraine at the start of June.

After meeting up with a dear Canadian friend I had made at the shelter build, we were collected and the experience really began. Our initial 6-hour drive from the Romanian border to the organisation's compound half-way to Kyiv was surreal and surprisingly calm. The Ukrainian countryside is beautiful - it could be compared to provincial France - and as the miles passed our appreciation of this incredible country grew, with only the sand-bagged checkpoints to remind us that we were actually in a country at war. The 'compound', as it was called, was run by an ex-military team who had arrived deep into Ukraine almost immediately the war had started. They are called 'Breaking the Chains', and their unique operation saw them risk their lives on an almost a daily basis – going right up and into the 'red zones' to rescue and collect stray, starving, traumatised and sometimes severely injured animals of every description.



The BTC compound was a place of refuge, where the animals could decompress, heal, and be nursed back to health whilst being given all the love and support humanly possible. Once again, the full timers and the part time volunteers like my friend and myself were from all over the world. But we all shared the same drive; to give the innocent and defenceless pets a second chance of life and to bring them to safety where, in time, they could be reunited with their owners or rehomed with loving adopting families. Some of the wounds I witnessed there were truly shocking, yet somehow the care given by the volunteers meant that the dogs (and cats) seemed unaffected by their new disabilities.

The Ukrainian people are friendly, proud, strong and resolute. Their country will prevail. Being back home now in peaceful Birchanger Village seems like a world away. Breaking the Chains rely entirely upon charitable donations. If you feel you wish to help them, please donate what you can to:

The fact is, village organisations are finding it difficult to continue without new volunteers coming in. Beware of Phishing!

What is phishing and how does it work?

You wouldn't let a thief enter your home, but what if the thief was masquerading as someone familiar, such as a postman, and tricked you into opening the door? Phishing works in a similar way - criminals impersonate trusted organisations by creating legitimate-looking messages and websites in order to trick people into opening the doors to their personal information. Once criminals have this information, it can be used to perpetrate fraud and cyber against you, or in your name.

How big is the problem?

Phishing attacks are a common problem faced by both individuals and businesses on a daily basis. As of 31st May 2022, the National Cyber Security Centre received over 12 million reports from the

public, and removed over 83,000 scams and 153,000 malicious websites.

How can you protect yourself from phishing scams?

Most of the phishing scams reported to us have one thing in common, they started with an unexpected email or text message. Whether it's an email asking you to "verify" your bank account details, or a text message claiming you've been in close contact with someone that's got COVID, the goal of a phishing attack is usually the same - to trick you into revealing personal and financial information.

- 1 If you have any doubts about a message, contact the organisation directly.
- Don't use the numbers or address in the message use the details from their official website. Remember, your bank (or any other official source) will never ask you to supply personal information via email.
- 2 If you think an email could be a scam, you can report it by forwarding the email to: report@phishing.gov.uk. Send them copies of emails that you believe are suspicious, even if you're not certain they're a scam.
- 3 Most phone providers are part of a scheme that allows customers to report suspicious text messages for free by forwarding it to 7726. If you forward a text to 7726, your provider can investigate the origin of the text and arrange to block or ban the sender if it's found to be malicious.
- 4 If you've lost money or provided personal information as a result of a phishing scam, notify your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud: www.actionfraud.police.uk For more advice on how to protect yourself online, visit: cyberaware.gov.uk

Trying La Bonta

La Bonta is a small cosy family run Italian Restaurant in the middle of the Priors Green Estate, Bennet Canfield in what was supposed to be the village centre. Access is through the housing estate but by following the main route the centre is not hard to find. On the night we were there early in the week parking outside was easy. There has been a lot of expectation and hype about La Bonta and we anticipated a very special meal. All members of our party were used to enjoying Italian food and wine.

The menu was more limited than I had assumed. There was no gluten free pasta which meant all the pasta dishes were off for me. I chose a fish casserole type of dish, adequate but I was not exactly blown away by this. Pasta dishes were pronounced good and the main courses reasonably



priced, even if they were not as inspirational as I had hoped. Service was prompt and friendly, I have to say that after the build-up, my personal experience was disappointing. The food was good but not amazing. There were two wines at £25 but the rest were upwards of £50! The food prices were as expected in any other higher end restaurant. This restaurant has some way to go to become the good food hub it aspires to be. I wish the enterprise well and hope to be back with more success in a few months' time. (Editor's note! I have dined here twice with others and all parties agreed the food was excellent. I guess it's a matter of opinion.)

If you are travelling through Stansted Airport, you will find both uniformed and non-uniformed police looking after passenger safety this year. They will also be collaborating with drone pilots,

dog handlers and firearms officers to detect and disrupt anyone who causes trouble or harm to anyone using the airport. Their presence will be unpredictable but for bona fide passengers, or anyone seeking assistance they are there to help. They are trained to be very approachable and are ready to answer questions and to give advice. This is not all one way as they rely on passenger help to report anything they see which might be suspicious. Talk to them or any one of the airport staff. They are there to try to help with difficult situations which might arise this summer. Have a good holiday.

You are guaranteed problems at airports, in fact some airports are extremely unwelcoming towards their customers simply because they cannot cope with their numbers. Insufficient staff they claim. Airport Fly-Parking

This menace has caused all who live around Stansted Airport endless problems for years. We are all aware of incidents in the village. The offenders simply park their cars, call a taxi, and head off to the airport for a couple of weeks holiday. Under the MAG group with their high parking costs, this practice has only got worse in recent years. There is very little the authorities can do. It is not unusual for these parked vehicles to be vandalised by angry residents which means the fly-parker will end up with a hefty repair bill. The police will not be interested unless the vehicle causes an obstruction. With an uncooperative airport and no help from the authorities, this nuisance will continue for yet another holiday season.

Don't Put the Wrong Items Into Your Recycling Bin

Did you know that placing the wrong item into your recycling bin can render the whole load in the recycling bin useless? The contents of the lorry are then just sent regardless to landfill. A huge waste of time, money, and resources. Please be careful what you put in your bin and if in doubt check on the council website. If you can't find it there use the old adage, when in doubt don't. The most common nasties are nappies, electrical items, and food waste, (we have the food caddy for that). Please help to reduce these costly mistakes.

Getting Emergency Police Help to Those Who Need It Most

We often forget to use the 101 service to report activity which is suspicious or a crime that has already happened. You can also use the 101 service when you need to speak to a police officer or to share information. For emergencies please call 999 if you, or other individuals are at risk of harm, or there is an ongoing incident which may need police help, such as a Road Traffic Accident. Use 999 to report a crime where life or property is at risk. There have been occasions when the 999 call-line has been blocked by non-emergency calls, causing real emergency calls to go unanswered.



Beware of the sun.

Yes, you want that golden brown tan but do it gradually! Five or more sunburn episodes and you double your risk of melanoma. Start your sun exposure gradually, 10-20 minutes max on the first

day then slowly increase sunbathing a little more each day using plenty of protective sunscreen. There are sunscreen swimsuits around now for everyone not just for babies and children. Most people these days are very clued up, but I have known some suffer burns and scarring after too much exposure early on. Avoid exposure between 10 am and 3 pm if you can when the UV rays are the highest. Apply sunscreen 20 minutes before you go out using a minimum of factor 30, even on cloudy days. Use a waterproof sunscreen when swimming before you start. A few basic ideas, but hopefully you will all have a brilliant holiday. We have all seen the lobster red sunburn sufferers feeling sick with splitting headaches or the leather skinned turtle backs. Not exactly the best look!

A Step in The Right Direction

Maxine Williams, or Max as she is more commonly known in the village, is a local dance entrepreneur. Her love of dancing from an early age culminated in her becoming the proud owner of Apton

Dance Studio, a popular and well-established dance school. The studio was originally founded in 1986 by Grahame Mizen in Bishops Stortford as a school for Latin American and Ballroom dancing. Max began dancing there as a student at the age of seven and has been there ever since! I asked her to tell me about her life as a dancer and as a business owner.

"Well let me think" answered Max. "I used to help out at Apton in the kiddies' classes aged 13, worked part time at 15 and was taken on full time aged 18. I became the manager of the studio at 24 and then in January 2020 my 'dancing dad' Grahame, retired and I became the owner and managing director of Apton Dance Studio".

"I trained under the 'International Dance Teachers Association' (IDTA) which is a leading dance qualification awarding body and membership association for professional dance teachers. Whilst there, I gained an associate qualification in Latin and Freestyle and became a fully qualified teacher in Latin and Freestyle. I won the Scholarship in Freestyle when I was 20 and attained the examiners nominate associate candidates for the John Dilworth Scholarship Awards in the four core subjects of Ballroom, Latin, Classical Sequence and Freestyle. Nominees must be outstanding candidates attaining a mark of Distinction or above."

Today, Apton teaches Latin, Ballroom, Salsa, Swing, Rock'n'roll, Street, Line-dancing, Chart video and Sequence. They teach children from as young as 3 and adults up to 93 years old. They teach wedding first dances, flash mobs, school productions routines and private lessons for small groups or 1:1.



"Classes are held at Birchanger, Hertford and Great Chesterford. In Birchanger, group classes are held in the evenings and children's classes on Saturday mornings in the village hall. Private lessons are offered in the evenings and on Friday mornings also in the village hall. Adult classes are 45 minutes and just £8 pp. We host social and dinner dances throughout the year as well as dance weekends away and afternoon tea dances.



Every other year we arrange a cruise with dance lessons and this year's cruise to the Norwegian Fjords include dancers from Birchanger. I'm so lucky to have a job that I love. I get to meet so many people and have made many friends through dancing. It's actually how I met some of my closest friends and my husband. If I can help people to dance and have fun, make them laugh and help them forget their troubles for 45 minutes a week, I consider that a job well done," concluded Max.





As we came to the end of our school year, we received our report following our Ofsted inspection in May. The two inspectors had spent the day with us on the 5th May and during their visit they watched lessons, looked at the books and they spoke at length to the children, staff and governors. We have a small school, so we felt by the end of the day, the inspectors had come to know the school very well. We received our report before the end of term, and you can read it in full if you visit our website. However, if you would like a quick overview of their findings, I have included some of their major comments here.

Pupils are happy and feel safe at school.

They care for each other and enjoy learning together.

Pupils agree that lessons are calm, and pupils can concentrate on their studies.

During breaktime and lunchtime, pupils move around the school sensibly and demonstrate the high levels of responsibility that the staff expect.

Pupils told us that bullying does not happen at the school.

Pupils appreciate the work of the Year 5 'anti-bullying' champions. Pupils learn well about their own emotional needs and how to regulate their responses to social situations.

They confidently identify the emotions they are feeling.

When pupils' negative feelings get 'too big', they know to share with staff, who provide effective help.

Pupils work hard and learn well. Pupils enjoy the regular celebrations of success that they experience at school.

Pupils are very proud of their work.

They are being well prepared for life when they move on from primary school.

In September we shall be excited for our new school year. At the start of the year, we shall be joined by sixteen wonderful children who will form the reception class and on November 3rd we shall hold our New Parents' morning for those people who are looking for a school place in September 2023.

Holiday Tips



As local residents, we mostly speak about the negative aspects of having Stansted Airport on our doorstep. However, when it comes to booking a summer holiday, there's an obvious

advantage in being able to travel from your local airport. We put up with a noisy neighbour all year round, so we're entitled to the upsides now and again.

Stansted is the UK's third largest airport. It's also the UK's most expensive airport for car parking, shops, food and almost everything else.

Ryanair, which accounts for four out of every five of Stansted's passengers, wants its landing charges kept to a minimum. This means that the airport has to make its money in other ways, so watch out! Here's a few tips to avoid being ripped off at the airport.

If you're being dropped off at the airport, the basic charge is now £7.00 but local residents can apply for a discount card. If you live within 5 miles of the airport, you'll pay just 50p drop-off charge, and within 10 miles it's £1.00. To obtain an application form, send an email to DD Carparking@stanstedairport.com.

The next tip is never buy your foreign currency at the airport. A spot check of the exchange rates (on Friday 15 July) found that £500 would buy you €469.40 at Stansted Airport but €629.50 euros at Tesco, Bishop's Stortford – a difference of €161.10 (34%). For US\$ the difference was even greater. £500 would get you \$472.40 at the airport and \$643.50 at Tesco – an extra \$171.10 (36%). And if you shopped around, you might well find an even better rate than Tesco's.

When it comes to food and drink at the airport, the best advice is \underline{not} to arrive hungry or thirsty. WH Smith will charge you £2.59 for a bottle of water. Costa Coffee charges £3.50 for a medium latte and you won't get much change out of £10 for a burger at Burger King.

You might spend two hours or more at the airport waiting for your flight, so when you're packing your passport before leaving home, perhaps you should also pack a sandwich and a bottle of water.

Finally, when you arrive back at the airport at the end of your holiday, there's yet another potential pitfall to beware. Stansted allows only one taxi company to have a desk inside the terminal and taxi stands on the forecourt. That company pays a small fortune for the privilege, which is why the fares are exorbitant. For example, the fare from the airport to Birchanger (4 miles) is a staggering £28.50. Happy Holidays.

The Hundred Parishes Society

I make no apology for talking again about walking routes. During school holidays, they can provide a framework for family outings and also a slightly structured opportunity for children who like an adventure on their own or with friends. A hundred local walk descriptions on www.hundredparishes.org.uk can be freely downloaded and printed. They offer outings throughout the Hundred Parishes and for distances from 1 mile to 17 miles. If you have access to the railway network, many of our walks start and finish from stations; all these have been reviewed in 2022 and descriptions updated or expanded to talk more about what can be seen along the way.



Hundred Parishes walks are certainly not the only routes available; our area is particularly rich in footpaths and bridleways and anyone with an Ordnance Survey Explorer map can devise their own routes. A number of long-distance trails offer challenges that will take more than a single day. These trails knit together established rights of way and are often well signposted, with maps or descriptions available from Tourist Information Centres, bookshops or online.

The Walks section of our website provides links to other walk routes and walking groups, while specific organised walks appear in the What's On section of the website. When exploring our lovely countryside, please be sure to follow the Countryside Code.



I summarise a few points that are mainly common sense:

Respect everyone • leave gates and property as you find them • be nice, say hello • keep to marked paths.

Protect the environment • take your litter home • keep dogs under control and in sight • pick up your dog's poo • do not disturb wildlife.

Finally, be prepared for the English weather with layers of clothing, rainwear, sunglasses, sun cream and sun hat. Enjoy!
