# UDC Allow Planning Application for Caravan Site on Green Belt Land!

Once again, protection of our Green Belt is in question due to Uttlesford District Council's (UDC) decision allowing the travellers to submit a retrospective planning application for their caravan site. The Travellers were originally required to produce a Site Development Scheme (SDS), approved by UDC within 11 months – i.e., by 8<sup>th</sup> September 2022 – setting out their plans for the layout, lighting, drainage, and landscaping of the site.

The Inspector's condition allowed for the possibility that UDC might not approve the SDS and ruled that in such circumstance, the Travellers had to appeal to the Secretary of State by 8th September 2022. Neither of these requirements took place prior to the 8th September deadline. The Inspector was clear as to the consequences of the Travellers failing to meet this condition:

"The use hereby permitted shall cease and all caravans, structures, equipment and materials brought onto the land for the purposes of such use shall be removed and the land restored to its condition before the development took place within 28 days of the date of failure to meet any one of the requirements"

The 28 days allowed for the Travellers to clear the site expired on 6th October!

Despite objections from Birchanger Parish Council and several Birchanger residents, UDC has decided to ignore the Inspector's directive and have allowed the Travellers to retrospectively submit a planning application and site development scheme.

A spokesman from UDC stated that it is very likely that once the UDC had used resources to draft and serve notices to the Travellers, carry out an equalities assessment and complete the process, that the applicant would either simply appeal and submit the SDS or submit an identical planning application but with an SDS.

The Inspector's last decision would be a material consideration in both scenarios and would carry significant weight in any future decision taken. In short, seeking a retrospective planning application was considered the most appropriate response.

Birchanger Parish Council continue to be in contact with UDC and voice their objections.

# **Knife Trauma Kit Refused**

Following a suggestion by Elizabeth Godwin in last month's magazine, we thought our village should have a 'Blood & Knife Trauma Kit' in case of serious injury in the village, so we decided to go ahead and buy the appropriate trauma kit and donate it to the village. Through Peter Sampson, we approached Birchanger Parish Council to offer the lifesaving kit for the village but were surprised at the negative reaction from the council. They refused to take on the responsibility of the kit because it was for indoor use only and suggested that we talk to the club or pub to see if they would keep it on their premises. No constructive ideas of how we could best use the kit and no official thank you. As a last resort we offered to spend £400 to buy an outdoor cabinet, as the one we bought was for indoor storage only. The response from the council was that WE should find a place to install and maintain it - probably at the club or pub - and ask their permission. In this difficult time, we spent our Christmas money on a gift to the village to make us all feel safe, the result is that Birchanger does not have a knife trauma kit. We tried!

# Response from Birchanger Parish Council

We certainly feel that this was a kind and thoughtful idea. We did ask Mr and Mrs Williams through Peter Sampson to attend our monthly council meeting to discuss the trauma kit, but they decided not to attend. The Parish Council does not own any buildings. So, as with the defibrillator outside the club, permission would be needed from the club, or pub. If installed outside, the kit would entail the extra cost of an external cabinet which Mr Williams offered to purchase. However, the materials inside would need to be maintained and replaced periodically. If the kit were kept indoors, this would require the steward or pub manager being available 24 hours/day and being prepared to answer the door at any time of the day or night to hand over the kit. After considering all the factors, the council decided against taking responsibility for the kit. Our apologies to Mr and Mrs Williams if they thought they were treated unfairly.



# Poppy Collection 2022

Despite everything, the Poppy Appeal in Birchanger raised a total of £872. An increase of £263 on last year.

You might be if you live in a home with a low energy rating and have an income of less than £30,000 a year, are unemployed or receive a health or disability benefit. If this looks like you, call 0808 1968 255 Monday to Friday 9-5 to discuss your eligibility. If you are eligible, the agency known as Warmworks will contact you to discuss the way forward to make you an energy efficient home. You will need to provide evidence that your household income is under £30,000. #### Don't Lose Your Dog



Sadly, many people do and most will never know the fate of their pet. Even if the dog only disappears for ten minutes it is very upsetting. Dog theft is on the rise and all dogs are particularly vulnerable in these dark evenings. The law is hopefully about to change making dog theft a specific offence but not just yet. New cross border police operations

aim to track down and prosecute all dog thieves where they can, but it is up to owners to keep their dogs as safe as they can. All dogs should be microchipped. And when your dog is outside, make sure they are in view all the time. Never tie them up and leave them outside a shop. Many dogs have disappeared by owners doing just that. Use a dog tag with your surname and contact details only, preferably just a mobile number, but not your dog's name. Make sure you have plenty of good pictures of your dog from all angles, clipped and unclipped for identification purposes and try and train your dog to come when called!

#### **Scam Spotting**

Become an expert. Some of the latest tricks include pretending to be your energy provider, then telling you that they need your details as they owe you money. Rubbish! The real energy provider has them already, hang up. Someone claiming to be from your bank asking for your passcode. Banks will never do that. This is a criminal trying to use a stolen card who needs a pass code. Banks don't contact you in this way. One way which might help is to set up payment alert for unusual transactions. Check the cash machine before using it. Does it look alright? Do you think it might have been tampered with? Unsure? Move away. Christmas time is bonanza time for criminal types. Everyone is busy or rushed and hassled by crowds. We are just not as careful as we should be. Just remember we are all at risk!



# **Another Trip to Ukraine**

Following on from my humanitarian aid trip to Ukraine in June, my next two-week 'mission' saw me returning in October. For this trip I wanted to up-the-ante. Rather than flying, I wanted to drive over and achieve more – to collect and deliver aid on the outbound leg, and to bring those in need back to the UK on the return part.

The preparation and planning for this turned out to be immense. I needed an appropriate car plus I needed a trailer. Consultation with learned colleagues narrowed down the type of vehicle needed, and by luck I found one for sale locally in Bishops Stortford. So, the 7-seater 4x4 was sorted and now I needed the trailer. A friend heard about the planned trip and kindly donated his own trailer to me.



With the incredible help of my own community here in Birchanger I departed with around a metric tonne of donations, plus the funding needed to make the trip happen. A very special thanks must go to the ladies of 'BAGS'. Your kindness and generosity are incredible.



on some Ukrainian social media groups, I recruited a wonderful volunteer called Natasha who is a refugee now living in Chicago, USA. She helped by interviewing and assessing those who responded to my offer of a free ride out of Ukraine. Our criteria was that this offer was for

those struggling to get transportation because they refused to abandon their pets. Also, that they had UK sponsors ready and waiting and that all their paperwork was in order.

Whilst in Ukraine we delivered the aid to charities in Lviv, Vinnytsia and Kiev. It was further distributed to Kharkiv and Donetsk. Things were 'lively' and our base town of Vinnytsia was shelled twice whilst I was there. We wanted to fill the car for the return, and we did. A family of three (Anna, a mum and her two daughters plus their cat, Austin) and a young lady called Luidmyla with her Labrador called Binny. The family had survived Kharkiv, and Luidmyla had survived the horrors of Mariupol. The three-day journey from Ukraine to the UK was partly filled with their stories and experiences. Some truly terrible anecdotes that will stay with me forever.



Anna and family are settling into their kind sponsors' home in Chester, and Luidmyla is in the countryside on the outskirts of Glasgow. When the war is over, they (and Natasha) will return home to rebuild their lives. We achieved this as a community – you should all be proud!

# Aircraft Noise - Summer 2022

In recent months, many people have asked whether flight paths have been altered or whether aircraft are flying lower since they have experienced more noise. However, flight paths haven't changed nor are aircraft flying lower. What has happened is that we have experienced unusual weather patterns in recent months and, since aircraft take off and land into wind, this affects the runway direction in use and hence the amount of noise annoyance and sleep disturbance experienced by local residents.

The prevailing winds are mainly from the south-west and so, on most days, aircraft take off and land towards the south-west. This is known as runway direction 22. The other runway direction is when aircraft take-off and land towards the north-east. This is known as runway direction 04.

The long-term average usage of runway 04 (north-easterly) is 27% and runway 22 (south-westerly) is 73%. However, in recent months the average usage has been as follows:

Month	Runway 04	Runway 22
April	60	40
May	22	78
June	29	71
July	31	69
August	58	42
September	44	56

So, except for May, the usage of runway 04 has been relatively high, especially in April, August and September. The result has been a higher incidence of noise annoyance under the 04 flight-paths.

Other factors that affect perceived aircraft noise are atmospheric conditions, such as humidity and inverse temperature gradients, again more pronounced this summer. These have the effect of holding noise down so the perceived level is higher. Additionally, the airport is now back to 90% of pre-pandemic levels so traffic levels have been increasing.

Birchanger is not directly under a flightpath but is affected by airport ground noise. This is more pronounced when the runway is operated to the north-east (runway 04) and there has been more of that in recent months. The main sources of airport ground noise are the use of reverse thrust on landing and excessive revving of engines before take-off. During warmer weather, people often want to keep bedroom windows open at night and so these noise impacts are more noticeable.

focus is more likely to be on care and maintenance: lots of mulching to look after the plants and new trees that have made it through the year and work on our infrastructure too.

By the end of December, we will be starting to think about snowdrops! We have set the dates for two Snowdrop Sunday Open Days, on 12th and 19th February and two Snowdrop Thursdays, on 16th and 23rd February. As for this year, our Open Sundays should be bigger affairs with access to the Gardens of Warwick House as well as "our" part of the Gardens and a full catering offer, including savoury rolls. Snowdrop Thursdays are restricted to "our" side, and we will provide drinks and homemade cakes. This year we only managed 2 of the four days, so we hope to improve on that record in 2023! Details will go onto our website in due course, but why not save the dates?

So, wishing you all the best for a happy festive season. And, if you are beginning to think about your new year's resolutions, you might like to



consider joining us as a volunteer gardener, baker, or front of house person? Or perhaps as a Trustee? We are always happy to add to our happy team!

# The Hundred Parishes Society

Before the middle of the twentieth century most people did not have watches; they relied on public clocks which could be seen at railway stations, post offices and other public buildings - and on church towers. This reminds me of the lines written in 1912 by the homesick poet, Rupert Brooke:

"Stands the church clock at ten to three And is there honey still for tea?"

The Hundred Parishes has a variety of interesting church clocks. In Furneux Pelham, St Mary's clock is topped by Old Father Time and the words "Time Flies, Mind Your Business". One wonders what prompted those words to be included.

The bell tower at Sheering has two clock faces which were installed in the 1940s to remember those who served in the War. The north-facing one tells us to "Work and Pray" whilst the west-facing proclaims "Today Is Yours".

The church at High Wych was built in 1861 to the design of local architect George Edward Pritchett. Its clock is almost as wide as the thin flintstone tower on which it is mounted.

Hinxton possibly has our oldest church clock, believed to date from 1700 AD, albeit extensively renovated in 1809 when a new face was fitted.

Artist Eric Ravilious lived in Great Bardfield and his wood engraving of the church of St Mary the Virgin clearly shows the enormous clock that was added to commemorate the coronation of King George V in 1912. One assumes the residents of Great Bardfield are never late for work or church. The engraving has been adopted as the logo of The Hundred Parishes.

I hope you will keep an eye open for the variety of clocks to

be found around the Hundred Parishes.

The recommendation is to spray all the woodwork in church to prevent any further damage but because we have bats roosting in church, we must get authorisation from Natural England for chemicals to be used. Arrangements for an up-to-date bat survey are in hand
