

Birchanger Parish Council Issues 2023 Annual Report



The junction with Stansted Road and the lane has been the scene of many accidents over the years but these have increased recently. Just a few years ago Highways solution to this dangerous bend was to put in two sets of bollards. Clearly these have been ineffective with one set being completely demolished having been hit by various vehicles. The Parish Council have requested that another solution be found. An assessment is to take place but, as we know from previous experience with Essex Highways, this could take a very long time.

A consequence of vehicles not being able to exit Birchanger Lane or to progress along Stansted Road towards the roundabout following an accident is that many drivers use Tot Lane which, as we all know, is unsuitable for two-way traffic as it's a narrow single-track lane. A few years ago, the Parish Council requested that this lane be closed or at the very least be made one way. This was refused but we are trying again. Of course, this will need to go through the same assessment process so don't expect a quick answer.

The saga of the travellers site continues and has regularly been reported in the village magazine but to refresh your memories, they were granted planning permission by the Planning Inspectorate on October 9, 2021. There were conditions set and condition 8 stated they had to have an SDS (site plan) approved by Uttlesford District Council within 11 months, i.e., September 8 last year. Failure to achieve this meant they had 28 days to leave the site. The plan was not agreed and they did not move out. We had expected UDC to take enforcement action requiring them to leave but instead of this UDC invited them to make a retrospective planning application! Naturally, the Parish Council protested, as have many others. At this point I must thank those villagers who knocked on every door encouraging residents to write to UDC if they did not agree with UDC's actions. We had hoped that the application would be decided by the Planning Committee on March 8. However, because there is still one report the travellers have yet to submit, they have been given a further 3 months in which to provide it.



Again, the parish council has written to UDC stating our disappointment and concern at this decision. Indeed, it seems to us that UDC Officers have already decided to recommend the Planning Committee grant permission regardless of the objections hundreds of us have. Another issue with UDC's decision is that if the planning application is not heard until after the local elections, the Planning Committee members will doubtless have changed and may very well contain District Councillors who have no experience in Planning. This application is not straightforward and deserves to be decided by experienced Councillors. I have made this point to UDC but have yet to receive a response. We will, of course, update everyone as soon as we have further news.

In 2019 the Parish Council appointed Birchanger's own Police Community Special Constable, an unpaid volunteer policeman. He was with us for about 3 years but last August he left and so far, we haven't been able to find a successor. The good news is we now have a new Police Community Support Officer, PCSO Keeley Twitchett. She has a huge area to cover including Takeley and Elsenham but will be regularly visiting the village at various times of the day and night. She will also visit the Wednesday tearoom once a month so you can chat to her there. You can meet her on the 3rd May. Future dates will appear in the magazine.

The dates for stages of UDC's Local Plan have been put back for various reasons. This means that the draft local plan, part of which will show the selected sites, will not now be published for consultation until sometime this summer. It is anticipated that the final plan, having been approved by the Planning Inspectorate, will formally be adopted by the council in October 2025. As you all know, the village is surrounded by green belt and we have been assured previously that sites offered around us will not be included. However, I won't believe this until I see it in writing. So again, this year we'll put the resolution before you regarding protecting the green belt.

Stop Stansted Expansion has now changed its name to Stansted Airport Watch. However, as none of us knows what the future holds and whether Manchester Airports will seek further expansion at Stansted, we're still going to put forward the resolution rejecting any expansion. Brian Ross will be updating us later in the meeting regarding current SAW activity.

Over the last three years the PC has been utilising our reserve funds to support the Parish Council Precept. These reserve funds have been accumulating slowly over many years and our auditors had requested their reduction to maintain the PC's financial balance. This has resulted in an advantageous reduction in Council Tax for the Birchanger council taxpayers for the past 3 years. However, now that the reserves have been reduced to a level that is acceptable to the auditors and, in order to ensure that the service provision and costs that are supported by the PC are maintained, the precept has been raised to around the same level that it was 3 years ago i.e. averaging £20.000 for the year.

Last year we celebrated the Queen's Platinum jubilee, sadly to lose her just months later. On the 6th May King Charles III will be crowned and so coronation events in Birchanger are planned to take place on the day at the club and in the village church hall.

Being a Parish Councillor is unpaid but not normally too onerous, we meet once a month except in January and August, but quite a lot goes on in the background like inspecting the recreation ground, meeting allotment owners and contractors, emails, and phone calls etc. We can have up to 9 Parish Councillors and at the moment we have 7 so if anyone is interested in volunteering, please speak to me at the end if the meeting.

Finally, I would like to thank our clerk, Keith Williams, and all my fellow councillors, all of whom have greatly supported me over the previous year.

Don't Forget Your Photo ID on Voting Day

On Thursday 4^{th} May, residents will go to the polls to have their say on who represents them at a local level.

In Uttlesford, there will be elections to select councillors for all 39 seats on the District Council as well as in the town and parish councils where seats are contested.

These will be the first elections where voters will be required to show photographic identification at a polling station. Valid forms of voter ID include a passport, driver's licence and some concessionary travel passes. Voters will be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo. Photo ID shown MUST be an original document – copies or images on mobile phones will not be accepted. Voters will not be required to provide photo ID if they vote by post.

Birchanger Lane / A120 junction Roadworks Progress

In April, the barrier on Birchanger Lane at the Duck End corner was moved further up towards the A120, just past the hotel entrance. From the hotel up until the new A120 junction, the lane will be completely dug up for realignment and drainage work so no access will be possible from that side. Access was previously given to the hotel entrance and travellers site from the A120 side. However, vehicles will now only be given access from Stansted Road, through the village and up to the barrier near the hotel. This work should be completed around the end of May or beginning of June at which time Birchanger Lane will be completely open and the temporary traffic lights on the A120 bypass will be removed.

The new traffic control lights planned for the top of Birchanger lane junction with the A120 will not be installed until the road works are fully completed, at which point all the traffic lights will have been connected and tested. They estimate this will be finished towards the end of the year! During this time, it will not be possible to cross the junction towards Bishop's Stortford or to turn right onto the A120. Instead, vehicles will need to turn left and go around the J8-M11 Junction. Temporary give way signs will be installed.

The Lane is Still Closed but You Can Use the New Footpath The frustrated motorists have to remain that way for a while longer. However, the new footpath to the hotel is now open for pedestrians.



There may be some difficulties during construction working hours, but you can use the route to the hotel and according to what work is being done on weekdays, brave pedestrians should be able to access the far side of the A120 carriageway with care as road works continue on the new Junction.

It seems that East Herts does not want Essex residents using their facilities at the refuse centre in Bishop's Stortford. Despite the fact that Birchanger is just a few minutes over the border, they want us to drive all the way to Saffron Walden instead! However, according to some local reports, Birchanger residents are being allowed to continue using the Bishop's Stortford facility if the have proof of their postal address. To make matters worse, if you do use the Saffron Walden site or any other Essex County Council Refuse Centre you will need to pre-book a time slot.



You can book up to two weeks ahead and are allowed to take one carload only. You have a choice to book as a car or a van but must use the vehicle you made the booking for. Booking online is through the Essex County Council website and is fairly simple, but it's just another nuisance. Blue badge holders can turn up at any time without booking. It seems they will check the items you are tipping. You are allowed to tip up to three toilets per month and three internal doors in an effort to deter commercial users. For domestic users there is no charge - yet!

Have You Heard of Clare's Law?

Perhaps you may have concerns that your existing partner, whose personal history is still unknown to you, may have had a violent past and could be a risk to yourself and your family. There is a new law known as Clare's Law which gives everyone the right to know about any previous violence and abuse associated with a partner. This way it is hoped that further violence can be prevented.

Distraction Tactics at the Cashpoint on the Rise Again

Most of us either know someone or have been victims of cashpoint robbery. Sadly, this crime is once again on the rise. Criminals use



distraction tactics and then snatch your card while your attention has wandered. They either bump into you, distract you by striking up a conversation or set up an incident nearby. When using your card, remember to keep a firm grip on your card. Never leave your handbag open as you pay at a till. Unseen hands can take vital

contents out of your bag as you continue making your payment particularly at self-service tills. That happened to me. My card was used to make numerous small payments before being abandoned. I was lucky, my bank covered the unauthorised payments, but banks don't always pay up if you have been careless, so be careful.

Avoiding Holiday Fraud

Yes, the scammers are into this now! They will use a website which looks just like all the other holiday websites, except there is no holiday and victims realise their holiday is a scam only when they arrive at their destination to find that the property or booking does not exist and of course there is no trace of the



fraudster. It looked like a totally normal and genuine destination online, so how can you avoid this happening? They will often use photos of villas or hotels copied from other sites. You can use Google Images to check whether the image has been used. They may even be claiming that they are registered with ABTA. Check with ABTA to see if this is true. You can check to see if the property has its own website. If there is no telephone number send an email asking for it. Fraudsters will nearly always want payment up front by bank transfer to an account separate from their website. They will offer a special discount for you to do this. Always pay by credit card if possible it is more secure. Holiday bookings of all sorts are usually safer through an approved travel agency or friend's recommendation. In their absence play safe and check out this property every way you can before making any booking.



Cargo Flights

In contrast to the collapse in passenger numbers during the Covid pandemic, freight tonnage at UK airports actually increased in 2019 and 2020, with Stansted being one of the main beneficiaries. About 2.5 million tonnes of air freight are handled at UK airports each year and Heathrow accounts for over 60% of this. East Midlands is the UK's second biggest freight airport, accounting for about 17%, and Stansted is in third place, handling 11% of UK air freight.

There is, however, a big difference in the way freight is handled at different UK airports.

At Heathrow, about 95% of its air freight is carried in passenger aircraft - known as 'bellyhold' freight but it is the other way around at Stansted. In a typical year, only about 3% of Stansted's freight tonnage goes bellyhold. The remaining 97% goes in dedicated cargo freighters, and therein lies the problem.



Stansted handled a total of 177,000 flights last year of which only 9,300 were cargo flights and so it's a relatively small proportion of Stansted's flights. However, cargo aircraft fly in and out of Stansted from all over the world and they tend to be larger, older and noisier than the typical passenger aircraft which use Stansted. Moreover, they are very often scheduled to arrive or depart during the night.

This helps explain why cargo flights generate a high proportion of noise complaints from local residents. Many complain, in particular, about the McDonnell Douglas MD11 aircraft operated by Fedex. Some of these are more than 30 years old and were originally built as passenger aircraft. As they became more elderly, and unsuitable for passenger use, they were converted to cargo freighters.

Looking to the future, plans to reopen Manston Airport, near Ramsgate, as an air cargo hub are at an advanced stage. When Manston closed in May 2014, most of its cargo business transferred to Stansted. However, there is now the prospect of Manston re-opening within the next year and once again competing with Stansted for cargo business.

Plainly, that would not be welcomed by the residents of Ramsgate but it could mean a little less sleep disturbance for those most affected by night cargo flights at Stansted.

What do you know about the Countess of Warwick's socialism? Volunteer guides have always featured this in their tours of the Gardens, and the Trustees thought it is a part of the countess' life worthy of being told in a bit more detail at our 21st May Open Day. The countess became a fully-fledged member of the Social Democratic Federation in 1904, campaigned for Independent Labour Party candidates in 1906 and installed socialist vicars in the parishes of Tilty and Thaxted. The Trust's archivists will be displaying fascinating stories, photos and details. Why not come and find out more?

On 21st May, as usual for a Sunday Open Day, there will be a range of plant, craft, honey, produce and information stalls. Local duo Karen and Tony will be playing music and of course a delicious range of homemade cakes and savoury snacks including bacon, cheese and hummus rolls will be available.

The Gardens usually look at their best in May and are open every Thursday through the month, allowing visitors and dogs on leads to explore while the Trust's volunteers are hard at work. The Trust's volunteers provide hot and cold drinks and homemade cakes and visitors are welcome to bring picnics.



In May, the wild areas of the Gardens are full of fragrant cow parsley, with wild orchids in the long grass towards the end of the month and last year bee orchids too. It is iris and allium season, with yellow flags in the pond, blue iris, purple alliums and allium christophii punctuating the borders with vivid style. Everything is lush and green and there are still flowers on the trees – the apples and pear blossom, with luck the laburnum (for some reason it sometimes skips a year!), and also the chestnuts.

Milestones can still be found all around us!


Milestones have been part of our heritage for centuries. They were an important element of the Roman road network, positioned to indicate the distance travelled or to be travelled. In 1767, milestones were made compulsory on all turnpikes, the toll roads managed by turnpike trusts, although many local milestones were in place before then.

There are around 40 surviving milestones within The Hundred Parishes, mostly along three highways that run between London and Cambridge. These highways are now called B1383 (formerly A11), B1368 and A10. The milestones are marked on Ordnance Survey maps as "MS".



One of the earliest and most visible milestones can be seen in Barkway, a historic coaching village. It was installed in 1728, one of 16 milestones funded at that time by a trust established in 1586 by a former master of Trinity Hall, Cambridge.


Additional milestones were added by the Wadesmill Turnpike Trust in 1742, some along the old Roman road. Ermine Street, now A10, and others along the alternative route, now mostly called B1368. Over time, the inscriptions became weatherworn, and many stones were upgraded in 1804 by the addition of a cast iron plate.





Most milestones in Hertfordshire and Cambridgeshire are listed but only one in Essex is included on the National Heritage List the large, three-sided iron milepost in the centre of Stansted Mountfitchet on the B1383. This is probably the newest in the Hundred Parishes, having been installed in the early 1900s. The earlier milestones along the old A11 would have been installed by the Hockerill Turnpike Trust

which was responsible from 1744 to 1870 for 28 miles of highway between Harlow and Stump Cross.
