Speed Watch Reduces Speeding

Community Speed Watch (CSW) was out early morning between 07.30 and 09.00 in Birchanger Lane on Thursday 14th September. Amazingly no one was caught speeding! The traffic was relatively light and slow moving.

No doubt the Speed Watch warning signs had the effect of reducing drivers' speeds. It is in fact a legal requirement for these warning signs to be visible to drivers. CSW is also limited as to the location of the speed checks, which must be positioned on public property and approved by Essex Police. At least we had calm traffic on our lane for a day!



Birchanger CSW has recently increased their voluntary membership by 10 persons, so it is hoped to increase the frequency of speed watch days in future. Speed watch training, which is also a legal requirement for volunteers, will be held in the Village Church Hall on Thursday 5th October. However, this training is only for those villagers who have officially volunteered in writing.

Dear Editor

Birchanger Residents Association Stand for Protection of Green Belt

I understand that you have been asked about Birchanger Residents Association ('BRA'), what it stands for and who are the organisers.

Let me try to deal with the points that have been raised.

BRA has the simple objective of seeking to protect the Green Belt around Birchanger. We try our best to support the Parish Council in this regard and to represent the views of local residents who share this objective.

I act as BRA chairman and Paul Ferret is the secretary. Together with a number of other local residents, we were behind the well-attended public meeting in Birchanger Village Hall in November 2021 on the contentious issue of the encroachment of the traveller site onto Birchanger Green Belt. BRA was born out of the concerns raised by local residents at that meeting.

To be clear, the issue is purely about protecting our Green Belt, without fear or favour, or any form of discrimination, regardless of who is responsible for any encroachment.

For example, as some of your readers will know, I took Uttlesford District Council ('UDC') to the High Court two years ago for granting permission for a small housing development on Green Belt land in the village. On that occasion the developer was a wealthy landowner, but the issue had nothing to do with personalities. It was purely about protecting the Green Belt. Fortunately, the High Court Judge agreed that the Green Belt which surrounds Birchanger deserved protection and he over-turned that planning approval.

As for the current encroachment onto the Green Belt at the end of Birchanger Lane, some 330 local residents submitted objections and UDC refused permission. The case will now be heard at a Planning Inspectorate ('PINS') appeal hearing on 16 November. UDC, BRA and the Parish Council have all now made submissions to PINS. The underlying theme is the protection of the Green Belt which surrounds Birchanger. Finally, I understand that there has been some criticism for the fact that we don't widely publicise our names, addresses etc, but some local residents have concerns about that. However, representations to UDC and PINS cannot be sent anonymously and so my own name and Paul's name (as BRA secretary) can be found at the above website address.

To protect the things that you care about, you sometimes have to put your head above the parapet!

Unauthorised Caravan Sites

Apparently, police have speedily dispersed illegal traveller encampments all over Essex by three quarters of their total numbers. It is a great pity that although notified as soon as the travellers arrived here in Birchanger the police did not take immediate action over the installation of caravans on green belt land! Apparently over the rest of Essex, encampments are now 75% fewer! This makes next month's appeal all the more important to our community. Should the travellers appeal be upheld, the current encampment must be made to toe the line. Police now boast that they can move unauthorised traveller communities within hours of arrival. Unfortunately, too late for us!



What to do if You Suspect a Fraud?

Maybe you are a victim, or perhaps you have come across something online which you think is suspicious and you don't have a clue what to do about it. Most of us just close the site and move on. Most frauds can be reported online directly to Action Fraud at https://www.actionfraud.police.uk/ or call them on 03001232040. There are a few special options: Business or tax fraud should be reported to HMRC, while benefit frauds go to GOV.UK. Immigration fraud is the responsibility of the Home Office. Online child abuse can come in many guises and if you are worried about something you suspect could be happening to a child you know, tell the Child Exploitation Centre Online Protection Command (CEOP) at: https://www.ceop.police.uk/safety-centre/ All bullying or hate crimes should be reported directly to the local police.

Keeping Safe Online

Never share personal information online with anyone. Remember anything you put online is no longer yours. You are right out there so think before you post or give any personal information to anyone. You could spend a very long time regretting it. Not everyone out there is your friend.

Car Thieves Get Smarter

They are always very good at finding new ways to steal your car. If you have a vehicle with central locking keyless entry, thieves can tap into your key's signal from outside the house or supermarket, gain entry and drive your vehicle away in minutes - and you won't even know it's happened!



You can prevent this by using a 'Faraday Pouch' to store your key's to prevent thieves from picking up your keys signal. They are readily available online from Amazon or eBay for just a few pounds. Some key signals can be switched off when you are not using the car, so if you have this feature, you can find out how to use it from the vehicle's manual. The old-fashioned steering wheel lock or other physical devices are

still a good addition to keep your car safe from modern day thieves.

Did You Know That Your Vehicle May Have a Tracker Device

Apparently, many newer vehicles are equipped with a tracker device. Thieves are aware of this and will leave newly stolen vehicles parked up in lanes and out of the way places to see if anyone comes to claim them. These tracker devices also help the police in tracing all sorts of vehicles and machinery. If after a period of time nobody claims the vehicle, the thieves will return and collect it and sell it on to their usual contacts. If you find a vehicle parked up in one of the country lanes that looks suspicious, tell the police. It could be just an innocent walker but if it is left for more than a day or so, it may be stolen. You can find out if your car has this very useful device from the dealer or your handbook. Some may need to be activated.

New Safety Map Created by Women

Essex police in conjunction with Essex County Council and Essex Fire and Rescue Services have created a new safety map marking the places in Essex where people tell them where they feel safe or unsafe. This is an initiative which is being rolled out across the county. The combined team are inviting people to tell them where they feel safe or unsafe across the county to create an online map which people can access. The team can be contacted by email at community.safety@essex.gov.uk, or by phone on 03330320647. The map will be available online and it will help all the emergency services to help you. Are there places where you feel unsafe? Contact the team and have the area you are concerned about included on the map. It will help all the emergency services and hopefully in the end reduce crime and keep everybody safer with better area policing. The police are rarely seen in Birchanger but not everybody feels safe.

Will a Poor Summer Affect Our Health

Is This the End of Parish Churches?

I was recently given three articles on a topic entitled "Loss of hundreds of parishes rings death knell for Anglican Church", "The Church of England no longer understands our Common Anglican tradition" and "Britons have given up on the church".

There is a group called 'Friends of Friendless Churches' that do their best to care for unused or closed ancient churches of which there are many dotted about the countryside. All of these relatively small buildings are keepers of centuries of our history which is locked within their walls. In the main, they have been forgotten by society that views them now as being unimportant, but they are full of traces of the local people who used to revere them. They are venerable buildings that need treating with dignity and respect.

In an increasingly secular life people have moved away to towns and cities leaving these ancient buildings behind and forgotten. These people have moved away from their roots and from God. It seems to me that wherever you look there is someone expressing their views about the demise of small parish churches such as ours. The reasons given are varied as are the suggested solutions so, as one of the churches under discussion, where does it leave us?

Apart from reading the articles that I have mentioned I also purchased a book called "The Big Picture for Small Churches". I hoped that within its pages I would find some inspiration for what we could do to increase our congregation but, sadly, no. The writer rambled on and on about quotes from the gospels – nothing that we have not heard before and nothing that I felt would encourage new parishioners through our door.

So, for now, it is up to us to carry the burden of history here in St Mary's even though it is sometimes a heavy burden to bear. However, despite the gloomy outlook recorded in the most recent Church of England statistics I do feel that we have good reason to have some hope for the future. The statistics show that between 1969 and 2021 the Church of England disposed of 2013 churches, 500 of which were demolished and there is concern that the after effects of the pandemic will accelerate these closures. It is estimated that over the next three years a further 368 Anglican churches will close. Other denominations are in a similar position.

It has been said that an ancient and beautiful church fulfils its function merely by existing whether it has a congregation or not as it is a perpetual reminder of spiritual values. Something embedded in the very fabric of the stones consecrated long ago by a priest or bishop which has been added to by centuries of human activity and emotion. People have over the years brought to churches such as this their hope and anguish, their offspring for baptism, their dead to be buried. All of their emotions form the fabric of this and other old churches. The walls hold our joy and our grief.

St Mary's Church transcends time. It embodies the spiritual investment of our congregation as much as it ever did and ever will. It is our legacy to the community that has to a large extent abandoned it. It is full of shared human experiences that survive here as a monument to thousands of ordinary people whom most people have forgotten about.

As I see it, we are at a tipping point and the various heritage institutions cannot cope but I do feel that there is good reason to hope for a change. Whilst the pandemic may have caused some people to stay away from services, that same event may be the catalyst that brings people back to God. Many are now looking to move away from urban areas into the countryside which is where most of our abandoned churches are. At this moment in time, it seems that it is the older generations that are making this move but I do think that younger families will in time follow. My hope is that if this trend continues, at least some of those who left the areas where they grew up, will eventually return and just maybe they will look to renew their faith in God. I truly hope that I am right.

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It's more fun being an Ostrich

Many of us want to bury our heads in the sand when the experts tell us that unless we move away from burning fossil fuels our climate will continue to warm and weather patterns will become more unstable and erratic.

Almost all sectors of our economy now have a plan to switch to renewables. By 2030 about 95% of our electricity will come from renewables. Also, by 2035, we will no longer be able to buy a new petrol or diesel car, as part of the UK's commitment to achieve net zero carbon emissions by 2050.

While everyone else is reducing their carbon emissions, one sector of our economy wants to continue increasing its emissions, and that's the aviation industry. In fairness, there is no easy substitute for kerosene and there are, as yet no obvious alternative technologies.

That is why the Climate Change Committee ('CCC') recommends a slowdown in the growth of air travel. The CCC is independent; it bases its advice on the scientific evidence; and it has a statutory duty to advise Government of the measures needed to reach net zero emissions by 2050.

In its latest advice to Government, the CCC has said that no new airport expansion plans should be approved until such time as the aviation industry starts to reduce its emissions rather than increasing them year on year. However, the Government intends to reject the CCC's advice and will not call a halt to airport expansion projects at Gatwick, Luton, London City, Farnborough and Manston, which are currently in the planning system. A Heathrow planning application for a third runway may not be far away.

Everyone knows that there are no votes to be won by forcing people to buy electric cars, or by banning gas boilers – or by stopping people taking overseas holidays. But that's not what the CCC are saying. They simply want to ensure that demand for flights is no more than 25% higher in 2050 compared to today and the UK already has more than enough airport capacity to cope with a 25% increase in demand.

So, are we serious about tackling climate change, or is it more fun being an ostrich?

The Nostalgia of Thatched Roofs

Thatch has been used as a roofing material for thousands of years. It was once common in rural areas because the material was cheap and readily available. Now, a thatched roof is much more expensive, but the skill of the thatcher can still be seen throughout The Hundred Parishes. A thatcher undertakes a five-year apprenticeship with a master thatcher before becoming a master thatcher himself.



Most properties in the UK use either long straw, wheat reed or water reed. Many thatched properties are listed and when re-thatching is needed there is a requirement to use the same type of material as before.

In medieval times wheat grew

to nearly 6 feet tall, while today's modern farming methods produce shorter-stemmed wheat, and this has weakened the straw and its longevity. Now specialist growers produce taller-stemmed varieties, grown especially for thatching.




There is some debate about the longevity of a thatched roof. To some extent, life expectancy relates to the material used, but it is also dependent on factors such as pitch, orientation and air circulation. A good thatch will typically last from 20 to 50 years, providing excellent insulation. The ridge, along the top of the roof, will last between 10 and 20 years, so requires more frequent attention.





Traditionally a new layer of material is laid over the seasoned roof; this is called "spar coating". The bundles of straw taken up onto the roof are called "yelms". Twisted hazel sticks known as "spars" or "gads" are used to secure the thatch in place. A thatcher may mark his work by placing a distinctive straw finial on the ridge.



Thatch appears not only on houses. There are several thatched pubs, a thatched church at Duddenhoe End in the parish of Elmdon, and a partly-thatched village hall in Ashdon.
