Planning Inspector Visits Birchanger's Travellers Site



On the 16th November at Uttlesford District Council Offices in Saffron Walden, the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) held the hearing to consider the traveller's appeal against refusal of their planning application. Birchanger Residents Association had submitted over 100 pages of evidence in order to defend Birchanger's Green Belt by ending the encroachment by travellers more than five years ago.

Seven Birchanger residents attended including two Parish Councillors and three from the Birchanger Residents Association. One of our District Councillors also attended. The Case Officer, Enforcement Officer, and the Environmental Health Officer from Uttlesford District Council also attended. There were approximately ten travellers, not all of whom are resident on the site. Their agent was there along with a barrister, a noise consultant and a drainage consultant.

The Inspector explained, this was a Hearing not an Inquiry, so it was supposed to be more of a discussion than a cross examination. The Inspector had various points that he needed clarification on. A great deal of time was taken up with the issue of noise pollution.

Everyone had the opportunity to speak to either put forward an opinion or to respond. Following the Hearing the Inspector made a site visit in Birchanger. The decision will be published before December 13th.



The number of people who find it cheaper to park their car in Birchanger and get a taxi to Stansted Airport, always peaks at holiday time. It is up to us disgruntled residents to deal with the problem. You should report these vehicles using the online form at <u>www.stanstedatf.com/fp</u>. You can also report any issues such as obstruction etc., to the local police or to the DVLA on their website.

Still Time to Give Your Views on The Local Plan

This consultation is still open for responses to the proposals on the policies and plans which will shape our district right up until 2041. If you wish to read the plan the best way is online where you can also give your feedback. There are allocations for around 6000 additional houses at locations around the larger settlements: Great Dunmow, Newport and Saffron Walden, Stansted, Takeley and Thaxted. There will be no development in smaller villages other than modest infill, and none whatsoever in open countryside. 35% of the homes will be 'affordable'. If you would like a paper copy of the comment form, they are available at the council offices or libraries. Written responses can be sent to the council offices at Saffron Walden, Post Code CB11 4ER. The final version of the plan should be out for consultation next year before submission to the Secretary of State for examination by a Planning Inspector.

A recipe for mayhem and we got it! We've had convoys of rat runners driving at speed through the village. We have had separate contractors wanting to block both ends of the lane simultaneously. The normal ten-minute trip to Bishop's Stortford has become a forty-minute traffic crawl as everyone is sandwiched onto one route which is also subjected to road works and yet more additional temporary traffic lights. At the time of writing there is barely a mile of road left clear in the Bishop's Stortford/Stansted area. We lose one set and another two come to take its place!



Scammers Don't Stop at Christmas Be careful when on social media, especially on dating sites Without realising it, you are in danger of disclosing too many personal details, where you live and what you do.

Watch out for the so called 'pigbutchering' scam. Victims caught up in romance scams are now likened to pigs being fattened for slaughter, due to clever social engineering carried

out by fraudsters. Rip Off Britain has heard from viewers who met someone on a dating site and felt they'd made a real connection over a long period of time, but later realised they'd been groomed by a scammer - often losing large sums of money in the process. Chef Alexandr Gutu, from Moldova, has lived in the UK since 2016. He was working two jobs to try and save a deposit for a house. By the end of 2022 he'd saved up £42,000. Around the same time, he set up a profile on Tinder, hoping to find love. Alex, 33, was soon matched with Kristine and they quickly grew close, messaging each other for several weeks. "We had a really nice chat about the future, about plans, kids," he told Rip Off Britain. "I really felt I can trust this person." When Alex shared his plans to buy a house, Kristine said her uncle was a professional cryptocurrency trader who could help him grow his savings pot. They were introduced, and Kristine's 'uncle' soon won Alex's trust. Alex first invested £850, followed by bigger sums as he saw his investment growing. Alex's online relationship with Kristine was also blooming, as they frequently messaged each other off the Tinder platform. "I was feeling really happy," Alex told Rip Off Britain. "I was thinking after a long time, I found a really good girl who can potentially be my wife and we can create a family." Alex had deposited £40,000 into crypto accounts, but when he asked to withdraw some of it, Kristine's 'uncle' went silent. He and Kristine both blocked Alex's phone number, and Kristine's profile disappeared from Tinder, leaving him with no way of contacting her. Reality hit, as Alex realised he'd been the victim of a long and cruel scam. "I lost everything. I was feeling like, I am still alive but mentally I was dead," Alex said. Take note and please take care this Christmas.

Local Bus Information 7 & 7A

A number of residents have asked for information on the local bus routes from Birchanger to Bishop's Stortford. So here goes!

Technically the service is now run by Stephensons and no longer Central Connect. The drivers will pick up/drop off at any point (subject to safety) in Birchanger Lane virtual bus stops. The maximum single fare is $\pounds 2$. At the moment they're turning around at the club as Dunmow Road is closed, so for those residents on the lower lane they have two chances to catch it! Generally, the drivers are very helpful.

Bus routes, planning and travel times can be found online at <u>https://www.intalink.org.uk/</u> There is also a good phone app that can be downloaded to your smart phone, also showing bus routes, travel times and real time position of the bus you are waiting for. Go to the App Store and download the 'Travel Essex' app.

The 7/7A buses are guaranteed to operate until 2026 BUT if there are insufficient passengers during this time, this route will almost certainly be discontinued. So, use it or lose it!

STANSTED AIRPORT WATCH – THE NEXT CHAPTER

Stansted Airport Watch ('SAW') has announced its intention to convert into a Trust Fund to be known as the Stansted Airport Watch Foundation. The proposal will be put to a Special General Meeting of its members later this month and, in accordance with the SAW Constitution, will require a two-thirds majority of the members present to be approved. SAW Chairman Brian Ross explained the reasoning behind the proposal:

"Some of the most experienced members of our Executive Committee have recently retired and others, including myself, have signalled their intention to retire in the near future, after having given more than 20 years' voluntary service to the campaign. As they say, none of us are getting any younger!"

If the proposal is approved by SAW members, the Executive Committee would then proceed to establish the SAW Foundation and to wind down SAW, a process which would take several months. All of SAW's assets would be transferred to the SAW Foundation. It is anticipated that this would amount to a sum of around £90,000, to be invested in an accumulation fund aimed at achieving long term capital growth.

To provide continuity, the five initial trustees would be current long-serving members of the SAW Executive Committee but, over time, the intention would be to replace the initial trustees with representatives from local district, town and parish councils.

Consideration is being given as to how the trustees of the SAW Foundation, either individually or collectively, might continue to provide advice and support to local district, parish and town councils and the wider local community on the environmental impacts of Stansted Airport.

In the longer term however local district, parish and town councillors and our local MPs will need to become more directly involved in dealing with the environmental impacts of Stansted Airport.

Brian Ross concluded: "We hope SAW members will support this proposal, which is an opportunity to make a virtue out of a necessity. By establishing the SAW Foundation, we will be laying down the seed-corn for the future. In particular, if the threat of a second Stansted runway re-emerges, funds would be available from the outset to kick-start a new campaign.

FORGOTTEN GARDENS OF

NEWS FROM THE GARDENS OF EASTON LODGE

It is difficult to judge our biggest achievements this year as the Gardens have looked wonderful throughout. The snowdrops in February and later the daffodils, bluebells and tulips culminating to the wonderful perennial borders, including the prize-winning dahlias.

Our volunteers have produced and sold fantastic quantities of fruit, veg, jams and jellies. And one of our volunteers has presented the history of the Gardens to a record number of local history and gardening groups. We have all worked



really hard and made great friendships in the process. In December we will be quietly getting on with winter jobs when the weather permits. Leaf clearance, bulb and small shrub planting should be finished but we are likely to be still planting one or two young trees. Excitingly the trees will include two new ones for the Gardens. A Ginkgo, which becomes a stunning tree, with distinctive leaves and lovely autumnal colour; and a Cercidiphyllum, also known as a katsura, which has heart shaped leaves and apparently has a slight smell of caramel when its leaves fall in the autumn!

In the warm, we will be looking at what vegetable seeds to grow; and working to arrange completion of the path, so that it runs right from the car park and to sort out our plans for re-paving the Italian Garden. The latter is a longer-term project, so is not likely to be in place for a while yet.

The Hundred Parishes Society


Two brothers born in north Wales in the 16th century have significant links with The Hundred Parishes. Thomas and Hugh Myddelton were younger sons of Richard, governor of Denbigh Castle. Both came to London to seek their fortune.

Thomas Myddelton was born in 1550, the fourth son. He did indeed make his fortune in trade and became Lord Mayor of London in 1613.

In 1615, Thomas bought the manor of Stansted Mountfitchet as his country seat and began the erection of a new Stansted Hall. He died in 1631 and was buried at St Mary's Church. His funeral was lavish; the family even paid for the mourners to be suitably dressed. There is a fine memorial inside the church with a life-size effigy under a decorated arch.

Hugh Myddelton was born in 1560, the sixth son. In London, he was apprenticed to a goldsmith and later became Royal Jeweller to King James I.

Hugh became a self-taught engineer. He was largely responsible for construction of The New River which ran for some 20 miles, taking fresh water from springs near Great Amwell into London. He helped fund the project and also secured financial help from the king.





The New River was opened in 1613, following the land contours so that gravity carried the water all the way to the Clerkenwell area of London. In 1620 a half mile extension was dug to supplement the supply by taking water from the nearby River Lea. After 400 years, the man-made New River still takes fresh water to the citizens of London; it is now operated by Thames Water.



Hugh Myddelton died in London in 1631. A memorial stone was erected on an island in the river at Great Amwell and various roads and properties along the route bear his name.
