

The information that was submitted in association with the application has been fully considered by the Highway Authority. The Highway Authority will protect the principal use of the highway as a right of free and safe passage of all highway users.

From a highway and transportation perspective the impact of the proposal is NOT acceptable to the Highway Authority for the following reasons:

1. The proposal fails to demonstrate that a safe and suitable accesses can be provided in accordance with the current standards, in terms of visibility. The lack of such visibility would result in an unacceptable degree of hazard to all highway users to the detriment of highway safety.

Therefore, this proposal is contrary to the Highway Authority's Development Management Policies, adopted as County Council Supplementary Guidance in February 2011, and Uttlesford Local Plan Policy

GEN1.

- ii. Whilst visibility splays have been demonstrated on DWG no. 20 Rev 1 Titled Proposed North Access (dated 19/04/24) and DWG no. 04 Rev 1 Titled Proposed South Access (dated 25/01/24), these visibility splays appear to be over land outside of the applicant's control, and therefore not achievable. Furthermore, no evidence of a covenant or other such legal document has been submitted to demonstrate that the area of land required to provide the visibility splay is to remain clear and unobstructed in perpetuity.
- iii. It is unclear if the applicant has obtained formal information relating to the widths of the PROW.
- iv. No information has been given about the status and maintenance of the PROW as a result of the proposals (change of surfacing ls proposed).
- v. No information on mitigation measures for PROW no 15 (Birchanger) has been submitted.

Summer Bonfire Complaints

Early morning and early evening are the best times for bonfires. While you can't always coordinate your bonfire around all your neighbours, letting them know you're planning to burn one will help them defer any washing they might have been planning on hanging out, or how they'll use their garden that day.

Junction with Birchanger Lane and A120

Some weeks ago, I spoke to Alex Bedford, the Senior Contract Manager at Sisk regarding a problem with exiting Birchanger Lane due to vehicles on the A120 heading to J8 blocking the exit. I was told that the phasing of the lights was to be checked and that should ease the problem. I suggested that a yellow hatch junction be installed. His response was it would need monitoring, so I further suggested that cameras be installed. Alex didn't think Essex Highways would pay for this but he would ask. Unfortunately, the answer as predicted, was no. I've been told, and have seen complaints on Facebook, that the situation at the junction hasn't improved despite the phasing being checked. Be Careful When You Buy Tickets Online

Is that ticket I just bought online the real thing? I wouldn't know. Apparently, I should check the website to see if the ticket can be resold or transferred first. I hadn't. Do You Know About the what3words System?

I didn't know either, but this system enables the emergency services to find someone very quickly after a 999 call.

Many people need to call 999 can be travelling and do not know exactly where they are. This means valuable time is lost in reaching the callers. This system is designed to make it easier for the emergency services to understand exactly where the caller is and get help to them much more quickly. The system works by assigning three distinct words for every three-metre grid square on a map. The only problem is you have to have the app on your phone. This can be downloaded to both android and iOS. In an emergency find the three word address for your current location on the free what3words app, dial 999 and tell the call handler the three word address for your location. The emergency services can then coordinate a response directly to your exact location.

Time to Secure Your House

In the run up to Autumn it is a good idea to check your security lighting for the coming winter months. Good lighting helps when you are struggling to come back home on a cold dark winters evening. There is low level lighting which comes on automatically when it gets dark which is probably the easiest way of doing it without an electrician. This low-level lighting is ideal for lighting a porch and garden patches and enables you to get into your house more easily. If correctly sited, you will also be able to see just who is at your door after dark. These lights are low level, and correctly positioned should not be annoying to your neighbours.

Turned Away From Your American Holiday!

Some people have been. USA may have information on you that you have a conviction for an offence, which although it may be spent still shows up on their records. Entry to the United States is usually without the need for any kind of visa, but if you do have a conviction somewhere in your more recent past it would be best to check whether you could be refused entry before travelling. New Government – New Policies?

Since May 2010, Government aviation policy has been that there should be no new runway at Stansted. This marked a reversal of the previous Government's policy which supported a second runway at Stansted. With the recent change of Government on 4 July 2024, is there a risk that the policy will again be changed, with the possibility of a new threat of a second Stansted runway? It is worth recapping on the history.

The idea of developing Stansted to an airport bigger than Heathrow, goes back to 1964, when a proposal to expand Stansted to four runways was first mooted. However, an independent inquiry in 1966 concluded that "It would be a calamity to site a major airport at Stansted and there was no national necessity to do so".

Two further independent inquiries – Roskill in 1971 and Eyre in 1984 – also rejected major expansion of Stansted and concluded that it should not be developed beyond the capacity of its existing single runway. Nevertheless, in July 2002, the then Labour Government, under Prime Minister Tony Blair and Transport Secretary Alistair Darling, shocked the local community by announcing outline proposals for up to three additional runways at Stansted, which would make it twice the size of Heathrow.

Following fierce local opposition, the final proposal which emerged as official Government policy was for one extra runway at Stansted. This was still widely considered totally unacceptable and fierce local opposition continued. Nevertheless, BAA continued to advance its planning application for a second Stansted runway. However, after eight years of active campaigning and intensive political lobbying, a commitment was secured from both the Conservative Party and the Liberal Democrats to cancel plans for a second runway at Stansted. Thus, in May 2010, when the Labour Party lost the election and a Conservative Lib-Dem coalition government came to power, the plans for a second Stansted runway were abandoned.

This new Labour Government claims to have far stronger green credentials than its predecessors and has acknowledged the adverse impact of aviation emissions on climate change. We should therefore expect the new Government to follow the recommendation of the independent Climate Change Committee and refuse to approve any further major airport expansion.

A key test of the Government's green credentials will be its decisions on expansion proposals for Luton and Gatwick. These proposals are currently being considered by the Planning Inspectorate who is expected to make recommendations in the next few months. It will then be for the Government to make the final decisions.

Will our new Government prioritise its pro-growth agenda or its pro-environment agenda?

The Hundred Parishes Society

The Hundred Parishes has an exceptional depth of ancient buildings. More than 6,000 are "listed", meaning that they appear on the National Heritage List for England. Each property listing includes a description and many of these descriptions take their text from the guidebooks produced by one exceptional man, Nikolaus Pevsner.

Pevsner, an architectural historian, was born in 1902 in Leipzig, Germany, the son of a Russian-Jewish fur merchant. In 1933 he moved to England and settled in Hampshire. Following the outbreak of World War II, he was taken to an internment camp but was released three months later.

Work on his series of architectural guidebooks, The Buildings of England, began in 1945. The edition covering the whole of Hertfordshire was published in 1953; Essex and Cambridgeshire followed in 1954.

Most of the ancient architecture in The Hundred Parishes is mentioned by Pevsner in these three editions, either in general terms or in great detail. One example in Essex is Manuden, which he describes as follows: "Manuden has a specially pretty, short village street with timber framed cottages with oversailing upper floors near the church and a small assortment of Georgian houses a little further west".



In Cambridgeshire, he described the Norman interior of Ickleton's parish church as having few equals in the country.



In Hertfordshire, the 17th-century almshouses in Buntingford were described by Pevsner as "the stateliest almshouses in the county".



Nikolaus Pevsner was granted British citizenship in 1946, appointed CBE in 1953 and knighted in 1969 "for services to art and architecture". In total, he was responsible for 46 county-wide guides. He died in Hampstead, London in 1983.



The website www.hundredparishes.org.uk has more than a hundred walk routes that can be freely downloaded. The route descriptions draw attention to some of the listed buildings that are passed.
