What Do You Do With a Dead Badger?

We found a dead badger outside our house one summer morning. Sadly, it was very dead, and we did not have a clue what to do with it, except call the council, who were less than delighted to get our call. If it were outside our property they would arrange collection, but if it were inside, they would not. I imagine that anyone getting that type of response when a badger was found dead in their garden would be tempted to drag the badger outside their property or face an expensive trip to the vet for disposal. Anyway, as this was quite clearly outside the house they agreed to come out. We were surprised at what happened next. That same afternoon there was a knock on the door from a member of the Uttlesford Badger Group coming to collect our dead badger. I was totally unaware of this group, but very glad to see their representative.



He checked first that the badger was really dead, he was, and that it was not a nursing mother, otherwise they would be visiting the set to pick up any orphaned cubs. They are anxious to

pick up these as soon as possible so that they can care for them until they are ready to return to the wild. Badgers are rarely seen. If you do find one in daylight the chances are it is a sick badger. In this case the badger group would like to hear from you as soon as possible. They will collect the badger and try and nurse them back to health before returning them to the wild. If it is a female, they will check the set to find out if there are any cubs. Badgers are territorial and their entry point to your garden should be easily found. They can be very annoying in a garden and the badger group would rather you called them for help and advice before taking any action of your own. Badgers tend to follow the same route so the entry point to your garden should be easy to find.

It is best to consult the experts before taking any action of your own. Uttlesford Badgers can both advise you and help you about the care and rehoming of any badgers you may have found causing a nuisance or damage. It is an offence to do any harm to badgers no matter how annoying they may be. Our badger had been hit by a car. If that happens to you, remember this number below where you can get help to do the right thing for the badger, whether it is alive or dead. They are the experts. Since writing we have found another dead badger in the lane. Clearly killed by yet another speeding car. It died a slow death after its injuries finally got better of it and we found her in the morning. We called the badger group and they were here within twenty minutes. They checked it was not a nursing mother otherwise they would have been searching for the cubs. None were found. Helicopters Flying Over the Village Again

A number of residents have reported an increase in helicopters flying over Birchanger and the accompanying noise that it brings. Stansted Airport have advised pilots to take a specific route around the village. However, it seems some pilots simply ignore these instructions. The only way in which to prevent helicopters overflying Birchanger is if residents report each incident to the airport. You can do this by emailing: stanstednoiseline@stanstedairport.com or online at: https://complaint-eu.emsbk.com/stn11

Apart from complaining about helicopter disturbance, you can also report air quality, aircraft fumes and oily droplets.

If you wish to make a complaint, please ensure you include your full postal address and specific dates and times of the noise disturbance you wish to complain about. Please note that screen shots from flight-tracking websites can only be accepted if you also include the date and time of the flight in question. STANSTED AIRPORT WATCH TO BECOME A FOUNDATION

Earlier this year, at a Special General Meeting, Stansted Airport Watch (SAW) members approved a proposal to convert SAW into a Foundation. The conversion process has been protracted but will be completed on 30 September at which time SAW will become a Community Interest Company (CIC).

The SAW Foundation will have the same key objectives as the current objectives of SAW. It will be a not-for-profit entity established for the benefit of the local community and to help protect the local environment. By establishing the SAW Foundation, we will be laying down the seed-corn for the future. All of the residual net assets of SAW will be transferred to the Foundation on 30 September, expected to be in the region of £85,000. The aim will be to protect and grow these funds over the years ahead so that, if there is a renewed threat of major expansion at Stansted Airport, funds should be available from the outset to kick-start a new campaign.

Whilst there will be certain benefits in establishing the SAW Foundation, there will undeniably be adverse consequences from winding down SAW. It will no longer be a member organisation and so there will be no subscriptions, no newsletters, no website and no office services. Noise Complaints will no longer be via the SAW website, but via stanstednoiseline@stanstedairport.com, with a copy to the local MP as appropriate. SAW has in fact been struggling for some time to find the volunteers needed to maintain these core services.

The SAW Foundation will not engage in any significant level of active campaigning but it will not be entirely passive. The directors of the Foundation, either individually or collectively, may wish to continue to provide occasional advice and commentary on key airport-related issues.

Ultimately, however, local district, parish and town councillors and our local MPs will need to become more directly involved in dealing with the environmental impacts of Stansted Airport. This will include dealing with local residents' concerns about the airport's activities and holding the Department for Transport and other government departments and agencies to account, as required.



This will be my final regular monthly article under the banner of Stansted Airport Watch but, when there is an important airport-related news story to report, I will aim to keep local residents informed via the magazine, under the heading 'Airport News'.

FORGOTTEN GARDENS OF

This is our last month of the open season at the Gardens and after the disastrous snowdrop season, it has turned into a decent year!

In October, our volunteers will be continuing with deadheading and weeding to ensure that the Gardens are still looking lovely for visitors. The Italian Garden and walled kitchen garden retain their colour right through to the end of the season, from their roses and dahlias, with some seed heads, sedum and Michaelmas daisies adding an autumn vibe. Both areas can be beautifully warm, as they keep out the wind. Who knows when the autumn leaf show will start this year on the acers, red and scarlet oaks, ornamental cherries and Persian ironwood, but it can be anytime from mid-October onwards.



Visitors will be encouraged to walk to the bottom of the Glade, where some of the prettiest acers are, and where volunteers will be working to extend the Japanese style garden. There will be pumpkins and squashes for sale, as well as our chilli crop and jams and jellies.

The Gardens will be open every Thursday, from 11.00 to 3.00. The last Sunday Open Day of the year is on Sunday 13 October, from 11.00am to 5.00pm, and there will be Halloween activities and Bishops Stortford Ukelele Society will get visitors singing along to popular classics. The Hundred Parishes Society

Many of the walks on our website provide opportunities to pause and enjoy a panoramic view from a vantage point. The layout of roads, settlements, woods and fields is a visual record of many centuries of human activity.

Checking with an Ordnance Survey map, it is possible to pinpoint significant landmarks and features such as hedged field boundaries. From the 16th century, assorted records of land ownership have survived, but the most complete set of records was gathered by surveyors for the mid-19th century Tithe Awards, a forerunner of today's rating assessments for council tax and business rates.




Prepared between 1837 and the 1850's, these documents were the result of painstaking work by surveyors whose task was to map and list the details of land ownership, occupiers, size of plot and land use. Buildings, gardens and names of fields were recorded. Subsequent research by local historians has revealed that some field names can be traced back centuries, an indication of the close association of communities with the land that provided their food and opportunities for employment.



Field names are varied, some give just the size in acres while others mention specific persons such as Old Harry's Field.

Some are more descriptive such as Hop Ground, Twelve Acre Pasture, Thistley Field, The Rookery, Mill Hill Field, Further Pasture, Ozier Ground and Crab Tree Field.

Comparing these old parish maps with recent maps highlights the significant loss of hedgerows with the creation of much larger fields



to allow agricultural machines to work the land. For anyone interested in local history, the details within these tithe awards may be a useful resource – they are held by the Public



Record Office for 80% of the Hundred Parishes' parishes. For further information please see https://www.nationalarchives.gov.uk/help-with-your-research/research-guides/tithes/
