# The New A120 / Birchanger Junction Under Review

Due to the continuous traffic delays at the junction of Birchanger Lane, Dunmow Road and the A120 caused by traffic tailbacks approaching the M11, Birchanger Parish Council and District councillor Ray Gooding requested an investigation by Essex Highways. The request was made several months ago but at the time of publication of this magazine no solution has been decided. The request was for the installation of a yellow box and possible cameras.



The issue was recently handed over to the Road Safety Audit Team (RSA) for review, which is independent of the road design team. The audit team auditors hold the Highways England approved Certificate of Competency in Road Safety Audit, enabling each team to carry out road safety audits on the UK Strategic Trunk Road and Motorway network.

Ray Gooding was due to have a meeting in mid-November to discuss the RSA 3 works with the contractor along with a programme of works to complete. "Taking the aforementioned into consideration I am hopeful the yellow box junction along with other RSA comments will be completed within a couple of weeks" stated Cllr. Gooding.

## New Church Signpost Blessed

The Reverend Colin Fairweather, vicar of Birchanger, blessed the newly installed Church signpost in November.



The Church of St Mary the Virgin Church Birchanger is a bit tucked away. It's a bit of a hidden gem and that can occasionally cause problems finding it. For example, some years back, a warden had a funny turn one Sunday morning, and the ambulance that was called couldn't find the

church! There's been talk about installing a signpost ever since, so this is actually the culmination of many years of discussion and prayer.

"I hope the sign to the church will also serve as a reminder that Birchanger is not only a village, but also an ecclesiastical parish" stated Rev Colin. "It has a parish church with a duty of care for everyone in Birchanger, and not just people who go to church services. The ancient name for this duty of care is the cure of souls. It's a legal responsibility for Birchanger that I have as vicar, and that I share with the Bishop of Colchester, and the Bishop of Chelmsford".

"You'll see the signpost also points to the car park. We are always being asked where the car park is, so hopefully this will make things clearer for everyone. Thanks are due to Pam Lee, who drove this project forward, and to Mark Taylor, who made the sign and also put it into the ground".



## Highlights of Parish Council meeting 5th November

## Offer of land along Tot Lane to Parish Council

A meeting was arranged with the owner of the land. The landowner suggested that the Parish Council may wish to build a village hall or similar structure on the small parcel of land which he is prepared to donate. The Chair pointed out that the Village already had a Village Hall and that the land on offer was within Green Belt. The Parish Council is strongly opposed to any building on Green Belt land. The Chair thanked the landowner for the offer and said that in view of the Council's comments the Council would decline the offer. The landowner thanked the Council for the opportunity to discuss his proposal and the meeting was terminated. It is believed that the land owner may have planned to develop the site and offered part of the land to build something for the village, thus negating the green belt status!

## **Planning Request**

UTT/24/2440/HHF-99 Birchanger Lane Erection of garage [Objection on road safety grounds. ST to compile response and pass to Clerk for submission to Planning].

#### **Road Layout Suggestion**

Exit from Birchwood. A resident has highlighted that there is a sign just after the Village Hall directing traffic to Birchwood along a lane behind houses fronting Birchanger Lane. This road here is narrow with no pedestrian walkway. As traffic can go in both directions this is a potential safety hazard. There is a turning just before the Club which takes traffic to Birchwood from Birchanger Lane. The resident has suggested that the narrow road be made one way. Cllr Ray Gooding has already applied for LHP consideration and advises that this is up for discussion in January 2025.

#### Dog Bins

As the bin on the sand track near the barn at the end of Harrisons seems to fill very quickly It was suggested the purchase of a second bin for this site. The clerk will obtain prices.

#### **Recreation Ground**

HAGS have completed maintenance of the zipwire. Erection of the sports nets was completed on 5th October. Still awaiting a quotation from HAGS for replacement of the climbing frame.

## Highways

There has been no response to the request for a yellow hatch box junction box with cameras at the junction of the A120 and Birchanger Lane. However, Essex Highways is looking into this.

There is no progress on making Tot Lane one way. RG advises that he is still pursuing this.

There has been another accident at the junction of Birchanger Lane and the B1383. Has there been any progress in devising a solution to this safety issue? Cllr Ray Gooding advised that there has been no action as yet, but he is trying to get Highways to keep this under consideration.

Footpaths have not yet been repaired and the current 8-week slot has been missed. It will be included in the next timing slot.

## The Revd Robert Andrew Bathurst Connection to Birchanger School



Robert Bathurst was born in Marylebone London on 22 January 1817. The son of Sir James Bathurst and Lady Caroline, He was educated at Winchester College and later graduated from New College Oxford. While at Oxford he was a cricketer for Oxford University.

The Bathurst family were steeped in the Church of England. His brother Frederick was rector of Diddington and later of Biggleswade. His Uncle Henry Bathurst was Bishop of Norwich.

Robert Bathurst came to Birchanger in 1851 at the age of 34. He appears in the 1851 census as a visitor to Theophilus Pelly at the rectory. Who left the village that same year.

In 1852 Bathurst married Jane Harkness the daughter of another cleric. In Victorian times a parish priest would be financed by the income from his "glebe" (various parcels of land farmed by tenants). In 1853 however, the Rector, the Reverend Robert Bathurst, gave up part of his glebe for a new school. (The old Birchanger school) It included the village recreation ground and the "Rectory Cottage" built next to the school.

Revd Bathurst remained Rector of Birchanger for 13 years until 1864 before departing for the parish of Brockworth in Gloucester. He died in 1906.

## U3C Stansted Mountfitchet

This December, we will be celebrating the festive season with a Christmas lunch at Bury Lodge and by hosting the inaugural meeting following our move to St Theresa's Centre with a Christmas Tea Party. Stansted Mountfitchet u3a is then set to launch the new year with two exciting events in January.

In 2025, the UK along with the rest of Europe will commemorate the 80th anniversary of VE Day which is celebrated on 8th May. Throughout the year, this significant event will be marked by various activities within the u3a. The first of these takes place at our General Meeting on Thursday 16th January, featuring a gripping personal story from World War II.



The presentation will focus on one of the most daring RAF missions, involving low-level bombing with pinpoint accuracy.

The mission, Ramrod 564, The Amiens Prison Raid, launched from RAF Hunsdon nearby in Hertfordshire in February 1944, was crucial in the lead-up to D-Day. Guy Thomas, Denis Sharp and Susan Sedgebeer will recount the story of the raid, featuring a first-hand account from the navigator of the second Mosquito to drop its bombs, breaching the outer wall.

For those who attended Mike Howgate's Saturday Seminar in May 2024, where he challenged the theory that birds evolved from dinosaurs, the upcoming seminar on Saturday 18th January offers the perfect follow-up. Professor David Norman from Cambridge University will present the opposing evidence, aiming to prove that birds did indeed evolve from dinosaurs. Whether you joined the previous seminar or not, this promises to be a fascinating session from one of Cambridge's leading paleobiologists.

We are hoping for a good cold December! Early December 2022 we had hard frosts for many days on end, the ground was frozen solid and mid-month there was snow. We lost perennials and shrubs because it was so exceptionally cold that winter. Whereas in December 2023 we didn't have any frost that I can recall, followed by mild temperatures in January and rain galore over the whole winter season, such that we had to cancel most of our snowdrop open days. The early season was then blighted by the slugs and snails which had overwintered, multiplied and were voracious. So, although there are risks from frosts, we have our fingers crossed for a decent blast of freezing air!

Our winter works are progressing, with lots of effort put into leaf clearance to put into new bays to make leaf mould. We never have enough, as we have so many trees, roses, dahlias, rhubarb and fruit bushes that benefit from it. We also put out a call for manure and have spent happy hours barrowing that around the Gardens!

## Dawn of Schools in England

Until the 19th century, education in England was mostly linked to religious institutions or funded by wealthy donors. The Education Act of 1870 made a commitment to the provision of education to all on a national scale.

The Hundred Parishes has some fine examples of schools that were founded prior to this time and continue to educate young people today.





Felsted School was founded in 1564 by Richard Rich, the first Baron Rich. Under Henry VIII, he accumulated immense wealth whilst overseeing the dissolution of the monasteries, and he was later appointed Lord Chancellor of England under King Edward VI.

Dame Joyce Frankland, 1531-1588, lived at Rye House in Stanstead Abbotts, the wife of the lord of the manor. Her son was killed by a fall from his horse. In her will, Dame Joyce remembered him by providing funds for the education of boys at many locations including the "ffree Grammar Schole" in Newport, now The Joyce Frankland Academy.



St Edmund's
College in Standon
parish is the oldest
Catholic college in
England. The main
building dates from
1769. The school
chapel is a Grade I
listed building,
built in the mid19th century and
designed by

A.W.N. Pugin whose best-known work is the Elizabeth Tower, the clock tower of the Houses of Parliament - more commonly known as Big Ben.

Some schools built after 1870 have adopted the names of notable locals. For example, Leventhorpe Academy in Sawbridgeworth was established in 1965 and named after the Leventhorpe family.



Sir John Leventhorpe died in 1625 and has one of the finest memorials in Sawbridgeworth parish church.

Ralph Sadleir School in Standon was founded in 1971 and named after Sir Ralph who was born in 1507 and knighted in 1543 by Henry VIII. When Queen Mary I came to the throne, Sir Ralph retired to live quietly in Standon.
