Barn Conversion To Go Ahead

The planning application for the barn conversion situated on the sand track near Harrisons has been accepted. Paul Hunt, the Planning Officer for Uttlesford District Council, explained the reasons in a letter sent to the parish council as follows:

In making the decision the LPA was careful to fully acknowledge every point of the Parish Council, and we and the officer sincerely understand the reasons for residents and the PC to object to the scheme and the history at the site. In the Officer Report the planning team try to lay out all the areas which the national legislation and government guidance explicitly exclude us from taking into account.

Applications under Class Q and other 'Prior Approval' application under Permitted Development rights do not allow the LPA to use all policies and narrowly limit what can be considered. The headline change is that the building now meets all criteria to be converted because national legislation was changed in early 2024. The Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development etc.) (England) (Amendment) Order 2024) explicitly removes our previous control and allows many of these types of buildings to be approved for conversion.

As per the officer report, under the new legislation they must only show the building is in an agricultural unit and applicants no longer need to even consider the building's own history. We are required by case law to read the legislation in a common-sense manner and we cannot argue that the building is outside of the whole farming unit, even taking full account that the building is on the fringe of the farm and has not been used as part of the arable farm.

In my professional view based on 9 years' experience refusing Class Q applications in four rural districts, based on the new legislation it would have been unreasonable to refuse the application and opened the Council up to an appeal that I believe we would have lost incurring cost to the taxpayer.

In terms of the access and construction management, we

have put on a condition to plan out construction traffic and noise control during works. Use of the main road by HGVs is a Highways matter and a matter for the developers to resolve be it with smaller deliveries or another access on their property. Planning permission does not overrule any Highways restrictions, the developers' responsibilities under other legislation or private covenants on the land and access. However, we must make clear that these are not Planning Law and are outside of the planning department's control.

In the LPA's approval, noting the concerns over use of the Public Right of Way (PRoW), the report makes clear that if the applicant has a right to drive on that track, which is not uncommon on PRoWs across the country. Because the track has passing points and is clearly a decently finished track that is safe for a sensible driver to use, even with it being busy with walkers and horses, then we are confident we would have lost any appeal if we had refused it on grounds of use of that access. Driving on a PRoW does not constitute obstruction and the law on what does count as obstruction is very specific. Any obstruction that occurs should be referred to Essex County Council Highways team as the statutory Public Rights of Way authority.

I hope this information is helpful, and again we appreciate the Parish Council's position on protecting the village character and especially the Green Belt, however these are issues that central government have reduced our control over through new legislation.

We Are Going Digital

Digital phone lines, also known as voice over IP (VoIP), are replacing traditional landlines. Whether we like it or not, land lines will be replaced by digital lines throughout Essex in the near future. Most residents should have their switchover completed by the end of 2025 but those classified as vulnerable will have their switchover delayed until 2027 to make sure they are moved over safely. Not sure about that. Seems they are expecting problems, although it is your provider who will tell you of any steps you need to take. Essex County Council is warning that there may be many scams during the switchover period. If you receive any requests for money call Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040. Looks like there could be a tricky period ahead but to help you there are various events to explain the changeover to digital. Who are Vulnerable in the Digital World?

If you are over 75, have a personal alarm, do not have broadband at home, have no or poor signal on a mobile phone and have special needs you are classified as a vulnerable person and need to register as

such. You can do this by using the telephone number on your latest telephone bill and tell them you are a vulnerable person and will need extra support and possibly some additional equipment. Vulnerable people could receive a free battery backup unit. They can choose which types of back up unit is best for them, and they can nominate a trusted friend to assist them with the switch. Nothing will change if you do not have a landline and only use mobile phones in your home, or already use a digital phone line. All this may seem like a recipe for *Continued on page 4*

confusion for some people, but there is supposedly plenty of help to support those who already have problems with the internet. If you need help you must say so. No Broadband? Complicated Business Connections? You will be helped temporarily with special equipment to keep you connected while your permanent connection is sorted out. Hopefully, the switchover will be just a matter of plugging your phone into your broadband router, but your broadband provider will contact you with any action they need you to take. Remember that after the switchover your phone sockets will stop working for most people. You will be notified when you need to act and what you need to do. If you need help, contact your provider. At the time of writing there is no known date for the switchover in Birchanger, but it is set to happen this year.

Speed Warning

Police say that one factor which determines serious injury in a road accident is speed. Police are appalled at the number of serious injuries they find at the site of an accident which could have been entirely avoided if the driver had kept to the speed limits. With this in mind they are checking motorists' speeds on all roads around us at various sites and different times of day. They know the trauma speeding accidents can cause. Most of the rest of us don't and most accidents are avoidable and down to a speeding driver. We might not believe it but the police know it!

Nearly 100 drivers were caught speeding in just two hours on two of our major roads as police officer's work to keep you safe. Our Roads Policing Unit and Special Police Officers carried out speed enforcement on the A12 at Mountnessing and on the A120 in Takeley on Sunday (9th February). In just two hours they captured 95 drivers speeding, including five going more than 100mph.

War on Fly Tipping in Essex

The war on fly tipping Has begun. At last, Essex County Council has woken up to the fact that fly tipping is the scourge of the Essex countryside. To help the towns and villages tackle this problem, Essex County Council will support a new campaign in an attempt to educate Essex households on the blight of fly tipping across the county. This may be good publicity for Essex, but stopping Fly Tipping is a major project. There are roads going through our area which are supposedly cleared three times a week, and it seems like nothing has happened. The remains of an entire meal are frequently found. Why would anyone do that? Whatever Essex does for its residents, the rest of the country needs to step up and do the same.

Is too Much Expected of Our Police?

They are faced with a rising workload. Some of it very serious and complicated. They are now expected to campaign to make sure that newly qualified drivers follow their probation rules. In their first year there are a lot of new rules with which the new young drivers must comply. As most of them never wear their probation plates they will only be identified when something happens. There are so many tragic accidents leading to unnecessary deaths and survivors whose lives are ruined, and it is yet another responsibility for the police. We know we can't recruit enough police for the entire country, but why not use more civilians for the desk jobs, some of which do not actually require a fully trained policeman other than in a supervisory capacity.

Edited Minutes of Birchanger Parish Council meeting held on Tuesday 4th February 2025

1314. Planning

1.UTT/24/3011/PAQ3 - The Barn

It is noted that this application has been approved. There is some concern regarding access for construction traffic.

2.UTT/25/0104/HHF - 1 Birchwood, Birchanger

Proposed alterations and two-storey extension - No objections.]

1315. Draft Local Plan

The Plan was submitted in December. Two inspectors and an administrator have been appointed. It is likely to be Spring 2026 before completion.

1316. War memorial

GD advised that the memorial is in poor condition and needs renovating and cleaning. He is awaiting an estimate for the work to be carried out. It was agreed that the memorial be registered as a Listed Monument.

1317. Birchwood

The condition of the pavement in certain places, which was referred to Highways some time ago, has still not been addressed. Some orange markings have appeared but no action. GD suggests that the lack of action should be publicised. It was agreed that GD should approach the local newspaper.

1318. Village Green

ST had produced a detailed report. It sems that the existing borders cannot be altered.

AD suggested that the Village Green be registered with the Land Registry and that the PC should employ a solicitor to make the application. It was agreed that AD should obtain an estimate of the solicitor's costs.

There is now a provisional Tree Preservation Order (TPO) in place for the Millenium Oak.

A quotation of £730 has been received for pruning and balancing the Millenium Oak. KE pointed out that as the tree now has a TPO the contractor will need to obtain permission before commencing any work. This was agreed. It was further agreed that the work should proceed subject to the permission being granted. ST will make the application.



Child Criminal Exploitation

Child criminal exploitation is when someone uses a child (under 18 years old) to commit crimes for them. It includes things like forcing a child to work on a cannabis farm, or targeting, grooming, coercing and exploiting a child to sell drugs in county lines operations.



Child criminal exploitation can involve bribery, intimidation, violence and/or threats. The child does not need to have met whoever is exploiting them - children can be exploited via the internet or using mobile phones. They can also be targeted via social media platforms and gaming forums.

A child may have been exploited even if it looks as if they have been a willing participant. Many young people do not see themselves as victims.

Children can be exploited by individuals or groups, men or women, and adults or young people. People who exploit children use the fact that they have power over children, because of an age difference or some other factor like gender, intelligence, strength, status, or wealth.

Any child can be a victim of child criminal exploitation. Look out for signs of exploitation or abuse.

Is a child or young person:

- Travelling alone, particularly in school hours, late at night or frequently?
- 2. Looking lost or in unfamiliar surroundings?
- 3. Anxious, frightened, or displaying other behaviours that make you worried about them?
- 4. In possession of more than one phone?
- 5. Carrying lots of cash?
- 6. Wearing expensive designer clothing and/or jewellery?
- 7. Being instructed or controlled by another individual?
- 8. Accompanied by individuals who are older than them?

Recycling... Let's Get it Right!

If recycling bins containing non-recyclable items – such as black plastic sacks, nappies, food waste, polystyrene, or garden waste – are not spotted by the crews before they are picked up, this can cause a whole lorry load of recycling to be spoiled.

A very small percentage of non-recyclable items in the bin can result in tonnes of otherwise reusable waste being diverted away from recycling and sent to landfill.

We must stop this from happening!

If refuse crews identify a recycling bin which contains non-recyclable items, a bin hanger, like the one in the picture on the right, will be attached to the bin highlighting which items need to be removed. Once these offending items have been removed by the householder the bin will be emptied on the next scheduled



collection. The crew will not return to empty the recycling bin before this. You have been warned!



The increased provision of comfortable seating was necessary for the first General Meeting to be held at St Theresa's Centre, when a record audience of 107 gathered to hear a personal account of one of the RAF's most daring World War II missions: the raid on Amiens Prison, often referred to as "Operation Jericho".

The following Saturday, the first Seminar of 2025 took place at the same venue.



Our next Saturday Seminar on 8th March is entitled "Rockets and Space flight". The speaker, Professor Tony White is an Emeritus Professor of Systems Engineering, Middlesex University and is a member of Stansted Mountfitchet u3a.

The seminar will start with the history of rockets from their invention by the Chinese

to the rocket pioneers in the 20^{th} century. It will move on to the rise of amateur rocket groups in the 1930's to the massive expansion during WW2. It will cover post-war delivery systems, the moon shots and manned space flights along with a comprehensive explanation of rocket propulsion.

A wonderful collection of short stories has been published by the Stansted Mountfitchet u3a Creative Writing Group. Entitled "After the Twa Corbies and Other Stories" it contains a fascinating pot-pourri of styles and genres; from surreal to the ridiculous. Loss, love, mystery, nostalgia and humour; it's all there. The limited edition of 100 copies was so popular that it sold out by Christmas 2024. However, the book will be available in the local library for those who were unable to purchase a copy.

Having negotiated any difficulties in producing their first book, the group, which meets monthly and has been running for 5 years, is intending to publish a second in time for Christmas 2025. With even more stories, it promises to be just as sought after. Will there be a third? That remains to be seen!

FORGOTTEN GARDENS OF EASTON LODGE

NEWS FROM THE GARDENS OF EASTON LODGE

Daffodils follow on from the snowdrops at the Gardens and have a lovely long season. Did you know, there are 80 wild species (only 2 native to the UK) and over 30,000 different varieties of cultivated daffodils on the International Daffodil Register?

At the Gardens we have planted Tete-a-tete for their early show – they give a really vibrant splash of colour along the top of the Italian garden from late February. They are followed by a host of naturalised varieties near the elephant statue and in the Lime Wood. Some of those were on the market in the early 1900s, so were probably planted when Peto redesigned the Gardens and built the treehouse for the Countess of Warwick in 1902.



The memorial area in the Glade was established with daffodils and hyacinths. More recently we have planted late flowering narcissi to complement Camassia in the mini orchard at the top of the kitchen garden. This will brighten up the tree cathedral in the Glade. We will also add to the Japanese style garden near the platform with views onto the fishing lake.

The Gardens are not routinely open to the public in March but, if the weather is set fair, we sometimes open on Thursdays in late March. We announce this on our Facebook page, Instagram, or website www.eastonlodge.co.uk.

So, keep an eye out!

Of course, our volunteers, who keep the Gardens looking so lovely see the flowers as they emerge week by week. We take on new volunteers all year round and will be holding a new volunteer's session on Thursday 20^{th} March. As well as gardeners, we are pleased to welcome volunteers who like to help with maintenance work, catering and front of house roles. There is something for everyone! The Hundred Parishes Society

One of the main crops of the rich agricultural area covered by The Hundred Parishes is barley, the main ingredient of traditional ales and beer. In the past, much of the barley was malted locally before being taken to a nearby brewery to be combined with water, hops and yeast for fermenting into beer.

Brewing was initially a domestic activity in the home for family consumption, on farms and estates for the landowner's family and workers, and in various institutions such as religious communities for those who lived in and visited them. As the demand for beer grew (safer to drink than 'fresh' water at the time) so did the brewing industry: public houses having their own brewhouses, commercial brewers working out of stand-alone breweries, and then the development of industrial scale brewery complexes.

Stansted Mountfitchet - Brewery House



Evidence of all these different types of breweries is to be found within the Hundred Parishes in the form of place names such as Brewery Lane in Stansted, Brewery House in Little Hadham; Little Brewers, a cottage in Matching Green; Brewery Cottage in Sewards End; and Brewers House in Dunmow.

There are also surviving examples of the breweries from each of the various phases of the development of the industry. At Audley End House the estate's brewhouse survives although the internal features have been lost. An example of a public house brewery survives as The Old Brewery in Radwinter, now a private house. In Hatfield Heath, the former stand-alone brewhouse was converted to a corn mill before becoming commercial offices.

Three examples of brewhouses which were a part of industrial brewery complexes survive in Furneux Pelham, Wethersfield and Hartford End in Felsted. All three have been renovated and converted to private residential use.
