

Ready – Steady – Gone!

On a freezing cold evening in the middle of March,

two Parish Council members together with District Councillor and farmer Nick Church along with his trusty tractor gingerly lifted, removed and brought down the village sign on to a pallet after which it was stored inside the social club's cellar ready for collection by renovators.

The sign was originally erected in 2002. It was paid for using funds raised by the 'Birchanger Open Gardens' group. Various people in the village were involved and the final design was drawn by Birchanger local artist Heather Brown. After many years adorning our Village, the sign is now in desperate need of renovation. Unfortunately, since its installation in 2002, the weather has taken its toll on the revered sign and the paint is flaking away. The parish council has therefore decided it is time to do something about it. The sign was cleaned and touched up some years ago but now, more drastic action is deemed necessary. To this end the Norfolk company 'The Village Sign People', a specialist in this kind of work, has been contracted to carry out the renovation.

The sign will be cleaned and repainted by the company at a cost of approximately £2,000. This is being paid for by the Parish Council together with money raised by the art exhibitions that was held in the village prior to the Covid epidemic. The wrought iron framework will be separated from the painted panel to enable it to be gently grit blasted and then finished with a black satin finish enamel paint, then powder coated & baked.

The cast aluminium sign panel will also be gently grit blasted to remove the old paint. It will then be commercially treated with a polyester etch primer/undercoat and hand painted with topcoats of sign writer's high quality coloured enamel paint.

It will take several weeks before the newly renovated sign is ready for reinstallation.

Getting Used to Being a Blue Badge Holder

I never thought I would actually qualify for a blue badge! The Doctor wanted me to have one, friends and family were very keen that I applied. Everyone but me thought it was a very good idea. Somehow, I couldn't get my head around it. I wasn't really disabled. I coped. Then someone sent me an application form. Eventually I looked at it. Like all government forms, it was repetitive and tricky to fill in. Eventually I thought I'd cracked it and finally sent it in and waited and waited hearing absolutely nothing. Nearly a year after submitting the form I phoned the application office up. They'd lost it and I had to do it all over again. There was a quicker response this time, only 6 weeks wait, and I was going to get a badge.

I was embarrassed to use the badge at first. Not for me, I didn't need it, big mistake! For a while it sat in my bag, then one day while attending the surgery I used it. I could park nearest the surgery for free. That had to be a bonus. The amount of time I was spending there, the closeness of the disabled parking places and mostly free parking was a real game changer. Although different locations have different charging rules, it has made the difficult process of growing old that little bit bearable. I now get cross when people use disabled parking places, particularly at hospitals or surgeries.



Sometimes the Stansted spaces are all filled by cars without blue badges. That can make life extremely difficult for those who actually need to use it. But take care, if you do take a chance and

jump into a blue badge parking space that you are not entitled to, the parking patrols will fine you up to £100, as the row of cars with parking ticket penalties proved. My car was the only one without a ticket. Do you think you need a Blue Badge? Your GP can help with this, or another health professional who is familiar with your case. I have to admit, albeit still reluctantly, my blue badge is a valuable aid for me.

We are well passed our 'Use by date' and believe a fresh team is required in order to introduce new blood and new ideas for 2026.

We are asking villagers to step up to the challenge and consider offering a little of their free time to fulfil the above positions going forward. There is very little experience required, and training will be given by the outgoing team. The magazine is a non-profit publication run on a voluntary basis.

A brief description of the positions is as follows:

Chair: Heading the team, the Chair controls the direction of news and maintains the integrity of the publication, holding monthly meetings, oversite of the finances, and general running of the magazine. It requires 2-3 hours per month.

Treasurer: The treasure takes care of the finances of the magazine; receiving payments from advertisers and paying invoices by bank transfer. Procuring new and maintaining current advertisers and donors. It requires 2-3 hours per month.

Editor: Receiving local news, reports, and notices from existing sources, editing and layout of text and photographs, liaison with advertisers and producing adverts when required. Liaison with the Printer. Writing the occasional editorials and maintaining the 'What's On In The Village' page. The magazine uses a simple publication software to produce the magazine. It requires 10-12 hours per month.

Walking the Southwest Coastal Path From Minehead to Poole I start the walk on the 28th March. I'm walking the 'Salt Path' in aid of 'CRUK' – funds being directed to the Cambridge research centre. 

The Gardens open for visitors on Thursdays from 3rd April, in time for the bluebell and blossom season at the Gardens and the last daffodils. Bluebells thrive in the dappled shade of the woodland margin at the bottom of the Glade. The lush greens of the grass and fresh leaves on the trees and emerging perennials set off the pink and white of the blousy apple and cherry blossom; the vibrant reds, oranges, and purples of the tulips; and the first roses, the yellow canary birds, in the Italian Garden.

Hopefully, lovely sunshine and early spring warmth, will mean these flowers provide lots of nectar and pollen for the bumblebees and other insects, which we hope might start to do well again after the terrible year they had from the cold and wet spring and early summer of 2024. On Thursdays, the gate is open from 11.00-3.00 and hot and cold drinks and homemade cakes are available.

The Hundred Parishes Society

Late 19th-century Ordnance Survey maps record the location of numerous ponds in farmland across lowland England, but since then farming practices have changed and many have disappeared.

Well-maintained ponds are hot spots for biodiversity, supporting special plants and animals. Responding to concerns about the loss of such habitats, researchers at the Pond Restoration Research Group at University College London joined forces with others to investigate the potential for restoring such lost ponds and produced advice about the best ways to create new ones.

Following on from this, Essex Wildlife Trust identified 17,200 Essex farmland ponds on these old maps but noted that 10,400 had since disappeared. A few have been restored, and the team is working with the Farming & Wildlife Advisory Group to secure funding to help more farmers reinstate their lost ponds. However, pond restoration can be challenging - as evidenced by the difficulties faced during the project to resolve problems with Doctor's Pond in Great Dunmow. In recent years it has been polluted by toxic blue green algal growth. Ambitious and costly plans were drawn up to desilt the pond which necessitated the safe removal of fish so they could be returned in due course. Work commenced last October with the installation of safety fencing and the draining of water so that a digger could be used to help remove over 1,900 tons of contaminated silt. Heavy rains made the silt very slippery, and the digger became stranded in January. By the end of February all the silt had been removed.



Future plans include landscaping of the surrounding area and replanting with suitable vegetation once the pond is refilled. It is anticipated that in the coming months this attractive pond will once again provide a great habitat for ducks, fish and dragonflies.
